### Reflection

Earlier this year, in response to the Coronavirus pandemic, the Government's lockdown measures quite rightly included restricting access to places of worship. However, only the Church of England ordered that its churches be closed completely – for the first time in centuries – even if latterly the closure order was said to be “advice, not instruction”. Many still feel that ‘advice’ – above and beyond the Government’s regulations – sent the wrong message as to the purpose and importance of our churches in their communities. Particularly painful in communities where we have striven to ensure that our buildings have remained open daily for prayer and worship.

For many of our ancient churches, the precise date on which they were first dedicated is not known, and so this Sunday in the church’s calendar is set aside to celebrate and give thanks for our church buildings, for these holy places, for those who built and have maintained them, and for their original dedication, even if the date is no longer known. Christ’s church – the universal church – is of course its people, past present and yet to come, but the places and buildings where the people who make up that church assemble in worship, praise and prayer, are important to us, as they were to Christ himself. As a boy, he is drawn to the Temple in Jerusalem and later, in Luke 4, his public ministry begins in the Synagogue as he reads from the scroll of the prophet Isaiah. As that ministry moves to its climax, he must return to Jerusalem, to the Temple, the focal point of his Jewish faith, to re-assert its proper role as a place of prayer, of worship, of healing, of restoration, of encounter with God. Even before the building of the Temple by Solomon, even when the Israelites were nomads in the wilderness, they would create these ‘encounter’ spaces, the “Tent of Meeting”, we read about in Exodus. Those of us who have served in our armed forces know the tradition of stacking the regimental drums to create a so-called drumhead altar where there is no church or chapel, even on the battlefield. And yes, we can be ‘church’ anywhere, and in many different forms, as we have been discovering this year with our use of this modern technology, but our churches, chapels, and cathedrals, our holy places, continue to provide a focal point in our communities as well as a visible link to the church both past and future.

### The Creed
