Home Church Sunday



Questions about the episode to consider:

- How could the Pharisees, Zealots, and others interpret the same scripture passages so differently?
- What do you rely on to help you interpret the scriptures?
- As Jesse carried out his mat, he was confronted by Shmuel who accused him of working on the Sabbath. How did this example of legalism gone rogue impact you? How/when might you be guilty of a similar mindset?
- As you witnessed the disciples' preparation for the Festival of Booths, what thoughts did you have about the significance of religious tradition/heritage? About the importance of experiencing God in community?

Pray together and say the Lord's Prayer together.

Out and about

- Before going for your walk read John 5:1-16
- Go out for your walk.
- Remember to walk slowly and to take time to stop and look, really look at things.
- Now take notice of the paths that you are walking along.
- Look at them in detail, what do you notice and how are they different?
- How you would describe them?
- Now think about the man waiting to be made well by Jesus. As he carried out his mat along a pathway, he was confronted by the Jewish leaders who accused him of working on the Sabbath. How did this interpretation of the law make you feel? How/when might you be guilty of a similar mindset?
- As you continue to walk pray about what's on your mind.
- Pray the Lord's Prayer to end your Home Church.

John 5:1-16

Some time later, Jesus went up to Jerusalem for one of the Jewish festivals. ² Now there is in Jerusalem near the Sheep Gate a pool, which in Aramaic is called Bethesda^[a] and which is surrounded by five covered colonnades. ³ Here a great number of disabled people used to lie—the blind, the lame, the paralyzed. ^{[4] [b] 5} One who was there had been an invalid for thirty-eight years. ⁶ When Jesus saw him lying there and learned that he had been in this condition for a long time, he asked him, "Do you want to get well?"

⁷ "Sir," the invalid replied, "I have no one to help me into the pool when the water is stirred. While I am trying to get in, someone else goes down ahead of me." ⁸ Then Jesus said to him, "Get up! Pick up your mat and walk." ⁹ At once the man was cured; he picked up his mat and walked.

The day on which this took place was a Sabbath, ¹⁰ and so the Jewish leaders said to the man who had been healed, "It is the Sabbath; the law forbids you to carry your mat." ¹¹ But he replied, "The man who made me well said to me, 'Pick up your mat and walk.' " ¹² So they asked him, "Who is this fellow who told you to pick it up and walk?" ¹³ The man who was healed had no idea who it was, for Jesus had slipped away into the crowd that was there.



¹⁴ Later Jesus found him at the temple and said to him, "See, you are well again. Stop sinning or something worse may happen to you." ¹⁵ The man went away and told the Jewish leaders that it was Jesus who had made him well. ¹⁶ So, because Jesus was doing these things on the Sabbath, the Jewish leaders began to persecute him.
