From Easter Day to Pentecost

Go in the peace of Christ. Alleluia, alleluia.
Thanks be to God. Alleluia, alleluia.

A final hymn may be sung.

The Priest departs.

An organ voluntary may be played;
Please remain seated until its conclusion.

The Priest introduces the celebration and a
seasonal introduction to the confession is made.

KNEEL or SIT

**Almighty God, our heavenly Father,
we have sinned against you,
and against our neighbour
in thought, and word, and deed,
through negligence, through weakness,
through our own deliberate fault.
We are truly sorry
and repent of all our sins.
For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ,
who died for us,
forgive us all that is past;
and grant that we may serve you
in newness of life to the glory of your name.**

Amen.

The Priest pronounces God's absolution.

Almighty God,
who forgives all who truly repent,
have mercy upon you,
✠ pardon and deliver you from all your sins,
confirm and strengthen you in all goodness,
and keep you in life eternal;
through Jesus Christ our Lord.
Amen.

The Kyries may be sung during Advent and Lent
An introductory phrase may proceed each section.

The Gloria is said or sung
(The Gloria is not used during Advent or Lent).

only Son of the Father,

The Lord's Prayer

As our Saviour has commanded and taught,
we are bold to say:

**Our Father, who art in heaven,

And forgive us our trespasses,
as we forgive those
who trespass against us.**

**And lead us not into temptation,

Giving of Communion

Jesus is the Lamb of God
who takes away the sin of the world.
Blessed are those who are called to his supper.
**Lord, I am not worthy to receive you,

From Easter Day to Pentecost.

Alleluia. Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us.
Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia.

The clergy and people receive communion and
then sit.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.

The Prayer of the Faithful

KNEEL OR SIT

Prayers are offered for the Church and the World. These or other responses may be used.

Lord, hear us
Lord, graciously hear us.

Or

Lord, in your mercy
Hear our prayer.

Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord.
And let light perpetual shine upon them.

And at the end.

Merciful Father,
accept these prayers
for the sake of your Son,
our Saviour Jesus Christ.

The Liturgy of the Sacrament

STAND

The Priest introduces the peace.

The peace of the Lord be always with you
and also with you.

The following may be added.

[Let us offer one another a sign of peace.]

An offertory hymn may be sung.

The gifts of the people are gathered and presented.

The altar is prepared and bread and wine are placed upon it. Please SIT after the offertory/hymn.

The Priest says these prayers aloud or quietly during the offertory hymn.

Blessed are you, Lord, God of all creation. Through your goodness we have this bread to offer, which earth has given and human hands have made. It will become for us the bread of life.
Blessed be God for ever.

Blessed are you, Lord, God of all creation. Through your goodness we have this wine to offer, fruit of the vine and work of human hands. It will become our spiritual drink.
Blessed be God for ever.

These prayers of preparation and others may be used

Pray, my brothers and sisters that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the almighty Father.

May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands for the praise and glory of his name, for our good, and the good of all his Church.

An additional Prayer at the Preparation of the Table may be said.



The Eucharistic Prayer

The Priest then prays the Eucharistic Prayer:

The Lord be with you

and also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give thanks and praise.

The Priest prays the preface praising God.

These words change with the season.

At the end of the preface:

Holy, holy, holy Lord,

God of power and might,

heaven and earth are full of your glory.

Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes

in the name of the Lord.

Hosanna in the highest.

KNEEL OR SIT

The Priest continues the Eucharistic Prayer, recalling the words of Jesus at the Last Supper.

One of these acclamations is used:

Great is the
mystery of faith:
Christ has died:
Christ is risen:
Christ will come
again.

or

Jesus Christ is Lord:
Lord, by your cross
and resurrection
you have set us
free. You are the
Saviour of the
world.

The Eucharistic Prayer ends and all respond:

... for ever and ever. **Amen.**

or

... in songs of everlasting praise:

Blessing and honour and glory and
power be yours for ever and ever. Amen.

A period of silence follows.

The Liturgy of the Word

SIT

One or two readings may precede the Gospel

At the end of each, the reader says:

This is the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

A responsorial psalm may follow the first reading.

STAND

A Gradual hymn / acclamation may herald the proclamation of the Gospel.

Turn to face the Gospel.



The Lord be with you

and also with you.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord

Jesus Christ according to **N ❖ ❖ ❖**

Glory to you, O Lord.

At the end.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ.

SIT

A sermon follows.

Where there are candidates for Baptism we gather round the font.

STAND

The Creed is said or sung facing the Altar.

We believe in one God,
the Father, the Almighty,
maker of heaven and earth,
of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,
the only Son of God,
eternally begotten of the Father,
God from God,
Light from Light,
true God from true God,
begotten, not made,
of one Being with the Father;
through him all things were made.

For the following four lines you may bow.

For us and for our salvation
he came down from heaven,
was incarnate from the Holy Spirit
and the Virgin Mary and was made man.
