A message from Revd Mary Brown

Dear Friends,

I had a wonderful day last Sunday welcoming visitors in different forms. My first service was a baptism to which the family brought 40 guests! The second was the pet service where we welcomed 17 animals and their humans, as well as some humans who came representing their pets past, present, or hoped for. (There are some pictures below). I've been reflecting on that day, and on the upcoming events in the rest of August: the Friday Markets, Carnival Weekend in Aldeburgh, Regatta Weekend in

Thorpeness, the blessing of the new RNLI boat, various weddings and further baptisms. All of these events give us, as the church in Alde Sandlings, the opportunity to offer the hospitality and love of Christ to visitors to the area, as well as visitors to our church buildings.

I've been thinking a lot lately about the Parable of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15), reflecting on the extravagance of God's love for us, his welcome and hospitality towards us, as represented by the father in the parable. God loves us in such an abundant way. Like the son in the story that Jesus told, we come to God and find ourselves welcomed as beloved sons and daughters, clothed in the best robes, with a family ring of belonging on our hand. God's hospitality is such that a feast is had in celebration of each one of us when we turn back to him.

In Matthew 25 Jesus tells his disciples that when they offer hospitality to strangers, they are actually offering hospitality to Christ himself. For you, in your particular circumstances during the month of August, what might it look like to allow yourself to receive God's loving welcome? And what might it look like to offer that same hospitality to those around you?

Collect

Almighty God, who sent your Holy Spirit to be the life and light of your Church: open our hearts to the riches of your grace, that we may bring forth the fruit of the Spirit in love and joy and peace; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Isaiah 5.1-7

Let me sing for my beloved my love-song concerning his vineyard: My beloved had a vineyard on a very fertile hill. He dug it and cleared it of stones, and planted it with choice vines; he built a watch-tower in the midst of it, and hewed out a wine vat in it; he expected it to yield grapes, but it yielded wild grapes. And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and people of Judah, judge between me and my vineyard. What more was there to do for my vineyard that I have not done in it? When I expected it to yield grapes, why did it yield wild grapes? And now I will tell you what I will do to my vineyard. I will remove its hedge, and it shall be devoured; I will break down its wall, and it shall be trampled down. I will make it a waste; it shall not be pruned or hoed, and it shall be overgrown with briers and thorns; I will also command the clouds that they rain no rain upon it. For the vineyard of the Lord of hosts is the house of Israel, and the people of Judah are his pleasant planting; he expected justice, but saw bloodshed; righteousness, but heard a cry!

Second Reading Hebrews 11.29-12.2

By faith the people passed through the Red Sea as if it were dry land, but when the Egyptians attempted to do so they were drowned. By faith the walls of Jericho fell after they had been encircled for seven days. By faith Rahab the prostitute did not perish with those who were disobedient, because she had received the spies in peace. And what more should I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets-who through faith conquered kingdoms, administered justice, obtained promises, shut the mouths of lions, quenched raging fire, escaped the edge of the sword, won strength out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight. Women received their dead by resurrection. Others were tortured, refusing to accept release, in order to obtain a better resurrection. Others suffered mocking and flogging, and even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned to death, they were sawn in two, they were killed by the sword; they went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, persecuted, tormented-of whom the world was not worthy. They wandered in deserts and mountains, and in caves and holes in the ground. Yet all these, though they were commended for their faith, did not receive what was promised, since God had provided something better so that they would not, without us, be made perfect. Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a

cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God.

Gospel Reading Luke 12.49-56

'I came to bring fire to the earth, and how I wish it were already kindled! I have a baptism with which to be baptized, and what stress I am under until it is completed! Do you think that I have come to bring peace to the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division! From now on, five in one household will be divided, three against two and two against three; they will be divided: father against son and son against father, mother against daughter and daughter against mother, mother-in-law against her daughter-in-law and daughter-in-law against mother-in-law.' He also said to the crowds, 'When you see a cloud rising in the west, you immediately say, "It is going to rain"; and so it happens. And when you see the south wind blowing, you say, "There will be scorching heat"; and it happens. You hypocrites! You know how to interpret the appearance of earth and sky, but why do you not know how to interpret the present time?

Sermon by The Very Revd Christopher Lewis, 10th August – Eighth Sunday after Trinity

Heaven! You expect to hear about it in church when we sing and pray. But elsewhere it is not exactly common coinage. The occasional experience described as 'heavenly'. But beyond that, heaven seen as a diversion from the <u>real</u> things of the world right now: family, finances, crises in the world.

Of course, the idea of heaven can be misused. Heaven as a kind of compensation for suffering in this world; one can see how it can be said that life is tough for people at present, but the world to come will redress the balance. So it becomes a kind of encouragement to endure suffering: heaven as 'opium of the people' and a justification for living with exploitation.

Then for others, heaven features as a kind of joke: those jokes about Peter standing at the pearly gates confronting a queue of supplicants, giving them entry tests, asking for pass-words and so on, while in the background people in white night-clothes sit on clouds, playing harps.

I'm not sure how the cartoon idea of heaven came to be. It is probably something to do with a misunderstanding of art of the middle ages, where a vivid pictorial imagination was used in order to convey to people the urgency of right conduct on earth. I have seen similar pictures on modern Buddhist temples. Those medieval pictures show heaven and also hell: on the one hand paradise and on the other, devils with pitchforks prodding people while fanning the flames: the wicked suffering eternally; is that what God is happy with...people getting what they deserve?

That seems to me as odd as the opposite extreme – very popular these days – which is to think that everyone goes immediately from death to a happy retirement home, as it were 'up there'. I heard that idea of heaven mocked as being a 'kind of transcendental hotel, with nothing to do in the evenings', although actually the popular vision seems to include friends, relations, pets and maybe even possessions. A cartoon once pictured two men on clouds, carrying their golf clubs, with an onlooker saying: 'So you ...can take it with you'.

So many jokes; so much imagination and speculation. Best to go on to firmer ground. The words of Jesus in today's Gospel reading: 'Sell your possessions and give alms. Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also'. And that backed up by the reading from Hebrews which is a kind of discourse on faith in God. That most beautiful of verses: 'Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen'. And

then the passage sees these people of faith as seeking a homeland: 'they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.'

What do we learn? From Jesus, that we need to prepare here and now for life beyond death, which should be a better life, without moths and thieves. The secret is one of the heart. As we would say today.... whether your heart is in the right place. If our hearts are shackled only to material things, then they are in the wrong place ... they are not hearts prepared for heaven.

That picture fits with the one from the letter to the Hebrews. Those people of faith had their eyes and hearts set on a better place: they desire a 'better country' and have a conviction of things not seen. They are seeking a homeland, and God has prepared one for them.

So heavenly life is not something which starts at some future date, for it is to do with the heart and with a life of faith in God now. Indeed with Jesus himself, life with the Father was not something deferred, but was experienced all through his life and then beyond his death. So the mark of heaven is life with God, both now and then. That does not remove us from the everyday business of life, any more than it did with Jesus; indeed it immerses us (as it did him) even more in the struggles of the day. But at the same time, it brings a whole transcendent dimension to what we are and what we do. God's purpose for us is that we walk with him now, and then continue life with him in a better country, without worldly horrors. We do not have the material with which to give precise descriptions of that country. In the words of that verse from the first letter of John (3;2) 'Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed.'

Heavenly life is life open to God's love, open to receive his grace as we do at this Eucharist, responding in love to God and to others. Of course not all worship is exactly heavenly, but that is certainly the aim. Not all love of others is exactly heavenly either – look at the life of Jesus and of Christians down the ages.

If that is heaven now, then what of it beyond death? We do not know, but what we do learn is that it depends on life with God and that it extends beyond death and for ever, indeed in a better and fuller form than we can experience on earth. If we walk with God now, our faith and hope tells us that God would not allow something so apparently random and strange as death suddenly to cut off our life with him.

And what of hell? Sermons once majored on hell, but these days they tend to avoid it like the devil. Again, we do not know detail. But if heaven is a matter of where our heart is and of walking with God and being ready for life with him, then the logic points to saying that if our

hearts are in the wrong place and we have not been walking with God, it will be a very hard experience (a hellish one) to meet God, as it were, face to face. If I think of the times when I am at my most selfish and I turn away from God's kind of love, then I cannot imagine myself in his presence. If it is like that now, perhaps it will be like that beyond.

So I reckon that we can forget the candy-floss clouds on the one hand, and the pitchforks on the other. Yet it would be wrong also to let those jokes and all that artdivert us from seeing that heaven and hell are indeed a kind of reality, for they are a part of the teaching of lesus and therefore of the Christian faith. They should not depress us, for we have the boundless grace of God, if we will but respond to it. And we have that promise of a better country, of life more fully lived with God and stretching into the future. In the words of Jesus: 'Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.'

Post Communion

Holy Father, who gathered us here around the table of your Son to share this meal with the whole household of God: in that new world where you reveal the fullness of your peace, gather people of every race and language to share in the eternal banquet of Jesus Christ our Lord.
