The Last Post is sounded, and a two-minute silence is kept.

Reveille is sounded to mark the end of the silence.

When you go home, tell them of us and say, for your tomorrow we gave our today.

Ever-living God,
we remember those whom you have gathered
from the storm of war
into the peace of your presence;
may that same peace calm our fears,
bring justice to all peoples
and establish harmony among the nations,
through Jesus Christ our Lord.
