The creeds

Kathryn Fleming continues her series about the Christian creeds.

Whether you hear that word, "creed", and think instinctively of a great choir belting out the first movement of Bach's B Minor Mass, or find yourself wondering what you actually believe yourself, you can't spend long in most Christian churches without engaging with some kind of statement of faith.

I was once present as my diocese formally cemented a partnership with an Anglican diocese in Kenya - and, before anything was signed and sealed, right at the centre of

the liturgy, English and Kenyans standing together were asked to proclaim the Apostles' Creed. It mattered, you see, that we knew we were part of the same family, able to express clearly what we shared as the foundation for our new relationship. Despite the differences in our contexts, we stood united by the fundamental truths that characterise the life and faith of a Christian - and that is the key purpose of those statements that we use, Sunday by Sunday. 👻

Caroline Hodgson reflects on Luke 20:27-38

o you remember being very young? Even if you don't recall it, at some point in your very early development you had no notion of anything beyond the limits of your lived experience. The whole world consisted of your cot, your room, your home, and so on. As you grew, developed and explored, you started to glimpse new horizons and reshaped your concept of the world. As you crawled, then toddled and walked, you made connections with other people and learnt about friendship and love. When you went to school you were taught about other countries and cultures - and so the world expanded as you grew in experience and understanding. It's a wonderful process that's worth celebrating.

The religious leaders in today's Gospel reading are dogmatically and doctrinally attached to fixed ideas and have a very constrained view of life and the afterlife, which they assume to be a mere continuation of earthly existence. They are also mean-spirited in trying to trap Jesus. But Jesus is not to be contained, and comes back with the wonderful image of those who have died as "like angels... children of God... children of the resurrection".

Today is a day of remembrance of war. Disagreements and wars start with rigid thinking, when people fail to recognise the position of the other. So it's fitting, alongside our remembrance of war and the fallen, to think back to how we ourselves grew and developed. And in our prayers we might ask God to nurture in us that spirit of childish discovery; that we come to know everything and everyone as part of God's creation.
