



What's involved in being a member of the PCC?

The members of the PCC are the trustees of the church. You can find out more about what it means to be a charity trustee on the Charity Commission website. The trustees of a charity are the people who lead the charity and make decisions about what it does.

Because children and vulnerable adults may come to our services and other activities, all PCC members must undergo an enhanced DBS check and do some online safeguarding training. If you don't have access to the internet, we can help you with this.

The PCC meets about 6 times a year. PCC members should do their best to attend all the meetings, but it's OK to send your apologies if you can't make it on a few occasions.

In between meetings you may be asked to read and comment on documents. For example, we are currently preparing our "Parish Profile" which is a description of St Luke's church and its congregation for clergy who are considering whether to apply to be our new vicar. All PCC members need to agree on what we say about ourselves.
