The Folk of Gloucester

A beautifully-preserved 500-year-old Tudor townhouse on Westgate Street and the hub of Gloucester Civic Trust. Enjoy hot and cold drinks, homemade cake and freshly-prepared lunches in the cafe, or relax in the tranquil garden. Please note that the building contains stairs and uneven floors. Only the ground floor, cafe and garden are wheelchair accessible.

St Michael's Tower dates back to 1465. It contains informative displays on the history of the church that once stood on the site, alongside two heritage bells made in Gloucester in 1710 by Abraham Rudhall. Meet our volunteers to find out more about the history of the tower and beyond. Light refreshments and a seating area are available.

Light lunches and refreshments are available in the old schoolroom cafe. Please note: on Friday the 11th, there will be a ukulele group rehearsal from 11.00-12.30, and a regular service of prayers for the city from 13.00-13.30 to which you are very welcome.

This underground chamber on Eastgate Street reveals the remains of the Roman city defences and the East Gate dating back to about AD 68 when Gloucester was founded. **This tour is not wheelchair accessible.**

While there will be no guided walks on Sunday 13th, the chapel of St Mary Magdalene will be open from 14.00 -16.00 for general viewing.

The King's Bastion

Two metres below the ground, The King's Bastion contains the remains of a section of the Roman city wall with a defensive tower, probably constructed during the reign of Henry III. This rarely seen gem is located under a trapdoor in the King's Walk Shopping Centre, right under shoppers' feet! Tours are suitable for ages 11+ (no unaccompanied under 18s). Not accessible for wheelchairs or those with mobility issues. Please wear footwear suitable for uneven surfaces (no heels/open shoes).

Llanthony Secunda Priory ◆ G1 (some uneven paths)

 **Meet in the information room at Llanthony, Priory Junction (next to Gloucester College) GL2 5FA**

 **Duration approx. 1 hr**

Founded in 1136, by the end of the 15th century Llanthony was the richest Augustinian house in England, entertaining the court of Henry VII in 1500 and 1501. In the medieval period priory scholars created a very special library that is considered one of the richest and best-documented medieval English book collections in the country, now scattered across the world. 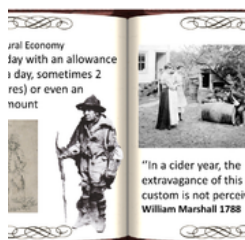

The Sanctuary Project: what we know about the wall paintings to date

The Carriage Building was constructed in 1894 by the Gloucester Carriage and Wagon Works as a showroom for horse-drawn carriages. Come and hear a short talk about the refurbishment and have a tour around this fine building, which is now on Gloucester's Local List.

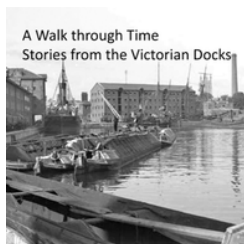

An impressive 18th century building, Bearland House has an ornamental facade, forecourt and fine wrought iron railings and gates outside and an interior with a carved wooden staircase and decorated ceilings. It is now the busy and thriving atelier of shirt-makers Emma Willis, employing many highly skilled local cutters and seamstresses.

A highlight is the replica waistcoat created by the Womens' Institute, embroidered over four hundred hours using a High Sheriff's wedding dress.

The Fleece Inn was built around 1500, one of the “Great Inns” built by St.Peter’s Abbey. By 1665, it was known as the Golden Fleece, which reflected the wool trade. The property was sold by the church in 1799 and remained in private ownership until 2004. Now owned by Gloucester City Council, it is being completely renovated. You have a chance to see the work in progress and some points of interest that were uncovered. The 12th century tunnel vaulted undercroft is thought to be the best example in Europe of a rich merchant’s warehouse. Known locally as the “Monk’s Retreat”, it was a lively and popular bar when the Fleece was last open.

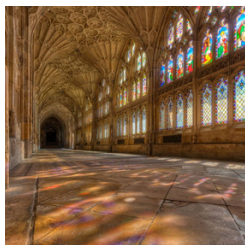

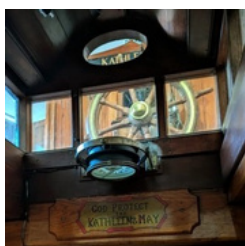

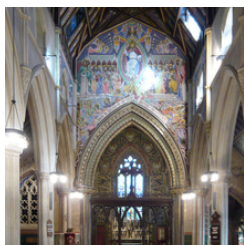

Built by the first resident Norman Lord of the Manor, Roger de Chandos, in 1142, it is one of the earliest Anglican parish churches in England to be dedicated to St George. The church site may date back to Saxon times and has witnessed centuries of village life, from medieval farming to the famous cheese rolling on nearby Cooper's Hill. Much of the building was restored during the Victorian era, while later improvements preserved the church for future generations. It was Grade I listed in 1955.

Originally called St Mary's Hall, it then moved to St Mary's Congregational Hall in 1958. The Family Haven is the chosen charity this year. Come and discover the services they provide to help disadvantaged and vulnerable families in Gloucestershire.

Depicting a congregation in silhouette, it pays homage to the people who have contributed to Westgate Street and Gloucester's fascinating heritage over time.

St Philip and St James Church

The church opened in 1851 as a daughter church of the ancient church of St Bartholomew's, Churchdown to cater for Hucclecote's growing population. It was built in medieval gothic style by the local architect's firm of John Jacques & Son, who were also responsible for the Mariners Chapel in the docks, and features some outstanding examples of 19th and 20th century stained glass.



St Swithun's Church

A Church has existed in Hempsted from 826, and the 12th Century Norman font is from the original church. In the well-kept Churchyard is "The Cavaliers Tomb" of Captain John Freeman, who was slain at the siege of Gloucester in 1643. Displays feature information on the church and village war memorial, details of the 1885 restoration work, information on plaques and stained-glass windows in the church, and people from between the 1st and 2nd World Wars.

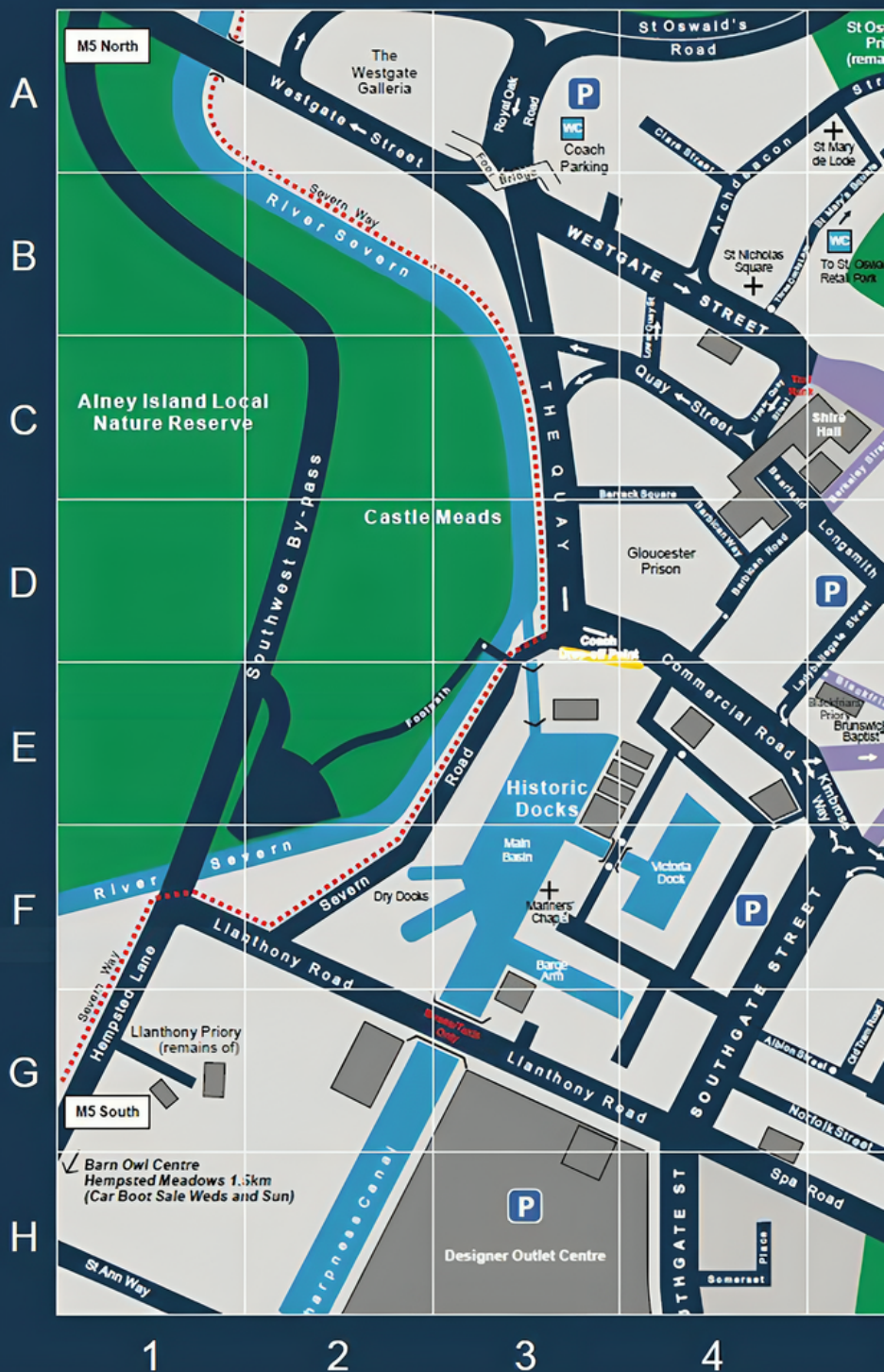
