From Bishop Libby

I commend to you an article this week by +Stephen Cottrell, Archbishop of York designate:

"During the coronavirus crisis, the Church of England has been accused of ... being absent. ... I simply do not recognise it. The Church of England has been astonishingly present, albeit in many new and remarkable ways.

... a church that has set up a daily food distribution point, ... [a] church working with refugees and asylum seekers, ... a telephone visiting service has been set up as well as telephone sermon and prayer lines, ... a church that has started a Zoom Bible study group, ...YouTube assemblies.

These stories are being replicated up and down the country. Most astonishing of all, plenty of churches report very large numbers of people joining their streamed services.

Then there are the funerals we are taking and the amazing work of healthcare chaplains. Is all this a shocking absence? [Perhaps we] are looking for Jesus in the wrong place. ... Even when we do return to the sacred, beautiful space of our church buildings, with all their vital and muchmissed resonances of continuity ... it is not one thing or the other. It is not in a building or online. We want to do both.

We learned ages ago that the best way to proclaim the gospel is to live it out. Those who ... have eyes to see it [recognise it]. ...This is most likely to be the poor, the sick, the isolated and the vulnerable. They are well aware of the church's presence with them at the moment. Ask the woman whose only contact with the outside world is a telephone call from the Vicar. Or the family who are kept afloat by YouTube posts. Or those whose only food this week comes from the foodbank run by the local church. Or the bereaved whose loved ones' funeral is being taken this week. Or the two million listeners to Radio 4, or the 600,000 people online who listened to the Archbishop of Canterbury on Easter morning.

All these people recognise Jesus in what they receive. Of course, we could do more. Of course, we've probably made some mistakes.

[But] might it be better if, as well as being a little kinder to each other, we also looked a little harder to see where God is actually at work through his Church. Then we might see a stronger and more servant-hearted church emerging from this global crisis. Fortunately, the very first message of Easter is as relevant as ever: He is not here. He is risen."

Amen to that.

Revd Ian writes:

There is definitely a change in pace in the world around us as a result of the CORVID19 Virus.

It is obvious; for some life is more dangerous and hectic spent away from family, there are those who take daily risks in order for society to continue, others are isolating in order to protect others, work for some has become a memory, work for others has changed in the way it happens, 'daily bread' has taken on a whole new meaning together with those who are struggling to put food together.

We are entering a time of change and transformation and the weeks still look unfamiliar. Yet change is approaching.

For the disciples they were getting familiar in the days after Jesus' resurrection with his coming and goings, they were learning that Jesus wasn't always there but could turn up at any time. They were moving from the familiar [Jesus with them all the time] through the unfamiliar [Jesus coming and going] into something completely new. This week sees the day of Ascension on Thursday, Jesus' display that he was leaving them and returning to the Father. A second bereavement for them and yet there was his promise that life would not be the same again for them. Yet it was still unknown for them and so unsettling and disturbing.

Sounds familiar today doesn't it?

We today then are invited to enter into that story in a new way for us as the disciples

today or Jesus. The international call to pray from the day of Ascension to the day of Pentecost is 'Thy Kingdom Came'. That line from the Lord's Prayer we are encouraged not only to pray daily from Thursday but to live out in our laves wherever we are. What might it look like for Jesus' kingdom to come? Re-read Bishop Libby's letter above, quoted from Bishop Stephen, and catch a glimpse of what Jesus' Kingdom is already beginning to look like.

Not the church building here on earth but something much more important; Jesus' Kingdom in our lives and in our community. It is as though Jesus has said to his disciples 'If you won't go out into the community, I'll shut the doors of your churches so that you have to'.

So where we are today is where Jesus wants us I am sure, we may not be familiar with it, we may not fully understand it, we may not even like it, but Jesus has called us to follow him wherever he leads.

May this Ascension Time be a time for us when we look up and continue to pray 'Thy Kingdom Come'.

DENNIS REMINDS US:

'The one thing I would request is that regular givers store up their giving envelopes which we will receive once St Mary's church can be opened again.'

Just a note: the fact that we are not, at present, using the church does not mean that our costs have ceased. We are still expected to pay our Common Fund (£34,450), Insurance (£3,200), Utilities (£3,750) – most of the expenses are in the Winter months – and I would hope our Giving to Charities (£5,500) and Quinquennial (£12,000). In other words, most of our Budget Expenses will still need paying.

'Heavenly Father, give us enough to live and enough to give.' May that be the case!

A REFLECTIVE SERVICE: FOR WORSHIP IN ISOLATION

A Prayer resources for those who are unable to meet together

An action to take in italics:

Set up a candle or a cross for a focal point for your worship

Say aloud in bold type:

We come from scattered lives to meet with God.

Let us recognise God's presence with us now.

Keep a short silence, still your heart.

As God's people we have gathered;

Let us worship God now together,

Across the distance yet joined together in need.

Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful people, and kindle in us the fire of your love; through Jesus Christ our Lord, Amen.

In the light of Jesus, let us examine ourselves and confess our sins.

Keep a short silence and leave your sins at the cross

Confession:

Father, we have sinned against heaven and against you.

We are not worthy to be called your children.

We turn to you again, have mercy on us,

bring us back to yourself as those who once were dead

but now have life through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Forgiveness:

May the Father forgive us by the death of the Son, and strengthen us to live in the power of The Spirit all our days. Amen.

Declaring our faith

We affirm our faith in Jesus Christ the Son of God:

Though he was divine, he did not cling to equality with God, but made himself nothing. Taking the form of a slave, he was born in human likeness. He humbled himself and was obedient to death, even the death of the cross.

AN ORDER FOR THE OFFICE OF COMPLINE (NIGHT PRAYER)

The office of Compline (Night prayer) comes from an ancient practice of daily prayers by Christian monastic communities. It is a good way to end the day in quiet contemplation and reflection upon the past day before commending yourself to God and a peaceful night's sleep. The office should be said before going to bed in a quiet and calm way; a candle may be lit and you might like to sing a simple hymn.

The Lord almighty grant us a quiet night and a perfect end.

Amen.

Our help is in the name of the Lord who made heaven and earth.

A period of silence for reflection on the past day may follow.

Most merciful God, we confess to you, before the whole company of heaven and one another, that we have sinned in thought, word and deed and in what we have failed to do.

Forgive us our sins, heal us by your Spirit and raise us to new life in Christ. Amen.

The following or another suitable hymn may be said or listened to.

Before the ending of the day, Creator of the world, we pray That you, with steadfast love, would keep Your watch around us while we sleep.

From evil dreams defend our sight,
From fears and terrors of the night;
Tread underfoot our deadly foe
That we no sinful thought may know.

O Father, that we ask be done
Through Jesus Christ, your only Son;
And Holy Spirit, by whose breath
Our souls are raised to life from death.

The following psalm may be used.

- 1. Come, bless the Lord, all you servants of the Lord, •(pause) you that by night stand in the house of the Lord.
- 2. Lift up your hands towards the sanctuary •(pause) and bless the Lord.
- 3. The Lord who made heaven and earth •(pause) give you blessing out of Zion.

At the end of the psalmody, the following is said Glory to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit; as it was in the beginning is now and shall be for ever. Amen.

The following short lesson or another suitable passage is read:
