LITURGY OF THE WORD

The Bible readings for today:

OLD TESTAMENT READING from Joel 2.1-2,12-17; Through Joel, God commands His people to repent, telling them to turn to Him wholeheartedly and to mourn. He is looking at their hearts and not at the externals

Blow the trumpet in Zion; sound the alarm on my holy mountain! Let all the inhabitants of the land tremble, for the day of the Lord is coming, it is near—2 a day of darkness and gloom, a day of clouds and thick darkness! Like blackness spread upon the mountains a great and powerful army comes; their like has never been from of old, nor will be again after them in ages to come. ¹² Yet even now, says the LORD, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; 13 rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the LORD, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing.

NEW TESTAMENT READING from Paul's second letter to the Corinthians 5.20b - 6.10; Paul wants us to become so thoroughly transformed that we become members of a "new creation."

²⁰ So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. ²¹ For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

6 As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain.

² For he says, 'At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you.'
See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation!

³ We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry,

⁴ but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, ⁵ beatings, imprisonments, riots, labours, sleepless nights, hunger; ⁶ by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, ⁷ truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; ⁸ in honour and dishonour, in ill repute and good repute.

We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; ⁹ as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; ¹⁰ as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

All the people came to him and he sat down and began to teach them. ³ The scribes and the Pharisees brought a woman who had been caught in adultery; and making her stand before all of them, ⁴ they said to him, 'Teacher, this woman was caught in the very act of committing adultery.

⁵ Now in the law Moses commanded us to stone such women. Now what do you say?' ⁶ They said this to test him, so that they might have some charge to bring against him. Jesus bent down and wrote with his finger on the ground.

⁷When they kept on questioning him, he straightened up and said to them, 'Let anyone among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her.' 8 And once again he bent down and wrote on the ground. 9 When they heard it, they went away, one by one, beginning with the elders; and lesus was left alone with the woman standing before him. 10 lesus straightened up and said to her, 'Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?' 11 She said, 'No one, sir.' And lesus said, 'Neither do I condemn you. Go your way, and from now on do not sin again.'

THE HOMILY by Fr Paul

John 8.2-11 Forgiveness

It is rare that we have the opportunity to reflect on this passage. It serves us especially well today, on Ash Wednesday.

The scribes and the Pharisees are callously cruel towards this woman in bringing her into the Temple and setting her before Jesus.

They prolonged her suffering. They used her to set Jesus up. They wanted to see if Jesus will obey the law of Moses, requiring her to be stoned to death for her sin. If he did then they could use that against Jesus, for he had a growing reputation for forgiveness and compassion. They wanted to spoil his reputation.

If he did not obey the Law, they could report that and use that against him and vilify him. One way or another they wanted to hurt Jesus.

Jesus knew well what they were doing. Jesus bent down and wrote with his finger on the ground, maybe in the dust on the ground, so that they could see what he had written.

One commentator suggests that he wrote down the sins of the scribes and Pharisees, for Jesus would know what they were.

He showed the scribes he too could write, even suggesting the stone tablets of the covenant, 'written with the finger of God.' (Ex 31.18)

Then looking up and looking them all in the eye, Jesus said, 'Let anyone among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her.' Jesus let his words sink in and do their work. He bent down again. He continued to write; the only time we know of him writing.

It is interesting that the eldest left first. They had sinned more. Maybe witnessed death more. And become more sensitive? Then all left.

They did not obey the law of Moses, but the authority of Jesus.

I think Jesus, asking the woman whether anyone had condemned her, helped her begin to restore herself. Jesus completed that process by

not condemning her. He restored her. He forgave her. He helped her feel healed and whole again. 'Go your way.' You have a fresh start and a renewed sense of innocence. She was given hope. She was given the sense that she had the capacity and strength, 'not to sin again'.

On Ash Wednesday the sign of the cross is made on our brows in palm cross ash; the priest says, 'Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ.'

We are being imbued with the capacity and strength to turn away from sin, even though it can feel as though we are addicted to sin.

Realistically the woman, like the rest of us, would sin again, not necessarily in the same way, but in some, indeed many other ways.

This story reveals the insight, understanding, compassion and encouragement we can draw on from our most generous lover of our souls, our

most blessed and wondrous Saviour, Jesus Christ.

Perhaps this story tells us that in Christ's estimate the passionate sins are less grievous than the cold, calculated ones, of evil intent.

It reminds us, too, that whenever and for whatever reason we fail, we can trust in Jesus' healing and forgiving love when we repent.

There is always another chance with Jesus. Even if we fail ten thousand times, so long as we pick ourselves up ten thousand and one times and keep on trying, we are a winner with Christ.

Of course, just as Christ is merciful to us so must we be merciful with others. Not like the scheming scribes and Pharisees longing for the discomfiture of others. We must forgive, so that we can be forgiven.

Then we are turning, '... away from sin and being faithful to Christ'. **Amen.**

PRAYERS OF PENITENCE

Let us now call to mind our sin and the infinite mercy of God.

God the Father, have mercy on us.

God the Son, have mercy on us.

God the Holy Spirit, have mercy on us.

Trinity of love, have mercy on us.

Most merciful God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, we confess that we have sinned in thought, word and deed.

We have not loved you with our whole heart and mind, and strength. We have not loved our neighbours as ourselves. We have not forgiven others, as we have been forgiven.

Lord, have mercy.

We have been deaf to your call to serve, as Christ served us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have grieved your Holy Spirit.

Lord, have mercy.

We confess to you, Lord all our past unfaithfulness: The pride, hypocrisy and impatience of our lives.

Lord, have mercy.

Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people.

Lord, have mercy.

Our anger at our own frustration, and our envy of those more fortunate than ourselves.

Lord, have mercy.

Our intemperate love of worldly goods and comforts, and our dishonesty in daily life and work. **Lord, have mercy.**

Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to commend the faith that is in us.

Lord, have mercy.

Accept our repentance, Lord, for the wrongs we have done: For our blindness to human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty,

accept our repentance, Lord.

For all false judgements, for uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbours, and for our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us,

accept our repentance, Lord.

For our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us, accept our repentance, Lord.

Restore us, good Lord, and let your anger depart from us; **favourably hear us, for your mercy is great.**

Accomplish in us the work of your salvation, that we may show your glory in the world.

By the cross and passion of your Son our Lord, bring us with all your saints to the joy of his resurrection.

Silence

We have not loved you, Lord.

We have not loved you with our whole heart. We have not loved our neighbours as ourselves. In your mercy forgive what we have been, help us to amend what we are, and direct what we shall be; that we may do justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with you, our God. Amen.

Imposition

Dear friends in Christ, I invite you to receive these ashes as a sign of the spirit of penitence with which we shall keep this season of Lent. God our Father, you create us from the dust of the earth: grant that these ashes may be for us a sign of our penitence and a symbol of our mortality; for it is by your grace alone that we receive eternal life in Jesus Christ our Saviour. **Amen**.

Please hold either last year's Palm Cross or a wooden cross, (maybe the one recently sent you), before you or just make the sign of the cross upon your own brow whilst saying the words, 'Remember that you are dust etc. ...'

Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ.

Please keep a time of quiet for reflection, gratitude and the desire to amend your life.

The Lord enrich you with his grace, and nourish you with his blessing; the Lord defend you in trouble and keep you from all evil; the Lord accept your prayers, and absolve you from your offences, for the sake of Jesus Christ, our Saviour. **Amen.**

THE PEACE

Since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, who has given us access to his grace.

Please continue to use this as an opportunity to give to the work of the church.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross. Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.
