

Our Public worship

The singing of at Mass, with hymns and Mass settings on Sundays, has returned. We ask that masks are worn [but removed for Holy Communion]. At the Priory on Sundays we are blessed with an organ voluntary after Mass, and we ask that people either remain seated or leave the building quietly. If people wish to meet after Mass they should do so outside rather than inside.

Permitted numbers of those attending weddings and funerals are in line with numbers at regular worship.

All this has been subject to complete re-visiting of risk assessments and agreement by the PCC.

May the Priory, Clumber Chapel and S Paul's be places we love and can experience our loving God; may they be places where others learn about the Gospel; may they be places where all experience Him in a generous welcome.

The following services and activities are due to be launched at S. Paul's:



The 1st Worksop Boys' Brigade – Tuesdays 4.30-6pm for boys aged 5-10. A typical session includes an opening story/song/drama, games/sports, craft/messy activity, and a closing devotion. Boys work towards an age-specific badge and awards scheme, earning badges throughout the year.



A weekly family worship service Sundays 3-4pm for children of primary school age. Each week will have a different focus:

Week 1: Messy Church: A non-Eucharistic service centred around a shared meal/light refreshments, with messy, noisy, and engaging crafts/activities.



Week 2: Muddy Church: A non-Eucharistic, open-air service focussing on creation, stewardship, and our relationship with the earth and our environment. We meet outdoors in all weathers... children may get wet and muddy!! A typical 'Muddy Church' service includes creative prayer and songs. Instead of a talk/homily, children plant seeds, build insect/bird houses etc. At St Paul's I aim to clear a section of turf to create a vegetable plot. The children can plant seeds, transplant the seedlings, and harvest their rewards as the seasons unfold. Muddy Church concludes with shared refreshments.



Week 3: Active Church: This is a bit of an experiment! A non-Eucharistic service in which children worship through active play, sports, and exercise. Each service will have a particular focus, theme or topic and the children will explore said theme through sports/exercise/some sort of physical activity. Services will be loud and noisy; I need to source upbeat Christian dance music (if such a thing exists!) but I want the services to contain an element of silence/stillness too.



Week 4: Messy Mass: the natural stepping-stone on from 'Messy Church'. It is essentially 'Messy Church' within a Mass. The Mass itself is conducted with full reverence, but in a relaxed environment and in a manner accessible for children and unchurched families. A 'Messy Mass' will contain child-friendly worship songs, creative prayer activities, a messy craft/activity and will use the Children's Missal. Children are encouraged to explore serving roles, begin to read from the Children's Bible, or lead the prayers. Services conclude with a shared meal/light refreshments. 'Messy Mass' is an excellent way to overcome what can often be a disconnect between Messy Church and the Parish Mass.



Week 5: The 5th Sunday Special [Logo still to be created!] I am aware that with four very different services, we may inadvertently create four distinct worshipping communities. On those months with a fifth Sunday, we will have a '5th Sunday Special' in which everyone gathers for a non-eucharistic service. In this service, the children's achievements, progress, and projects will be shared and celebrated. I envisage these quarterly services to be noisy, song-filled and have a celebratory atmosphere and flavour.

For children of primary school age – drop in on the way home from school!

Like 'Songs and Stories' at Priory, we aim to create a space by which we can connect with children but of primary school age and their families; enjoy a time of food and fellowship together, begin to form new relationships and invite disconnected children to our other services/activities.

Priory and St Paul's Youth Group is to be relaunched, meeting at S. Paul's on the first Sunday and Priory on the second.

How can you help? To date, I only have one helper who has volunteered to assist at

the 3pm Sunday Family Worship services and the same volunteer has agreed to assist at the twice monthly youth groups!

I don't have any helpers to assist at the Wednesday 'Food for the Body and Soul'. If you would like to volunteer (practically) at any of the above, please do let me know. Initially, I need assistance with the refreshments and simply having another DBS-checked adult on-site for safeguarding purposes. You won't be volunteering for anything too onerous at this stage! If you are not able to assist practically, please do pray for leaders and volunteers to step forward and for children and families to come to these new services!

Organ Voluntaries for September 2021

5thSeptember [OT23]

Sometimes nothing specific in the organ repertoire really matches up with the themes of the day, and abstract music is needed. And, after much diligent co-ordination of all factors in a liturgy, some mood-music can be welcome. So, for a day about healing miracles, I will play **Bach's "great" G major Prelude**, a youthful work, brimming with joy and life – from before sorrow darkened Bach's door.

12thSeptember[OT24]

Aria by Flor Peters may seem a little different to many of the voluntaries we have after Sunday Parish Mass. it may appear a little dreamy, or quiet, or austere. The readings today are full of tension and begin to look forward to Our Lord's Passion. Aria has much tension in the harmonies and feels appropriate. It does eventually resolve with a traditional cadence. Ironically it is in a slow waltz time!

19thSeptember[OT25]

With the message of today strongly against petty quarrels among disciples, I've been seeking something purposeful and active. **Mushel's Toccata in C minor**– and lots of other keys *en route* – has drive, and a de-cluttered harmonic language, but is not glibly triumphant. Georgi Alexandrowich Mushel (1909-89) was a Moscow-trained pianist/composer, later living in Uzbekistan.

26thSeptember[OT26]

Dutch composer **Hendrik Andriessen's Thema met Varieties** (1949) offers an opportunity to look at one idea shown in many different guises. His life history (1892-1981) included being organist at Utrecht Cathedral, being held hostage by the Nazis for 5 months in 1942, and being banned from public events for refusing to join the "Culture House". His output is broad and plentiful.



Eco Balloon Race to raise money for church funds

I hope by now you have received a poster, or seen a Facebook post advertising our Virtual Eco friendly balloon race to raise money for church funds. This race is completely online, so no actual balloons released and so no wildlife harmed, which makes it much better for the environment than a traditional balloon race.

So if it is all online how does it work? Well, the Ecorace site hosts several races a year. They use real places and weather data, to run but the race takes place online. You can view and track your balloon's progress, so in some ways it's even more interactive than a traditional balloon race.



We have entered the 'School Back' race starting from Nepal on the 14th of September. The first prize is £500, the second prize is an iPad and the third prize is 10x£10 of book tokens.

Ok sounds great, how do I enter?

Please go to the following website: <https://ecoracing.co/user/page/1856>.

1. Click the blue bar in the middle of the page entitled 'Buy Balloons for you.'
2. You will then need to create an account if you don't already have one.
3. Once you have clicked buy balloons, you will be taken to a Stripe Payment page, please complete payment.
4. Once paid, you will be taken back to the dashboard. At the top there should be a banner to say you can customise your balloon.
5. You will then be taken to a page where you can change the amount of helium, the rubber thickness, the colour and shape, and you can even give your balloon a name!
6. Save any changes, and that's complete!

If the above is as clear as mud for you, please do contact tech savvy relatives or friends, particularly youngsters as we hope it is something that they will engage with. Alternatively please do contact Neil or me and we can help you.

You have until the 14th of September to buy your tickets and I do encourage you to tell family, friends, neighbours, work colleagues, the postman, the cat (maybe not), and anyone else you can think of to get involved. If we all tell just one other person, just think how many tickets we could sell!

Dying to get to safety

Afghanistan has been in conflict for over four decades meaning that entire generations have never known their country at peace. Since the start of this year alone, hundreds of thousands of Afghans have been displaced, and on the 15th of August the Taliban captured Kabul. This sparked further displacement with 5,000 people evacuated in the first 24 hours. You only had to switch on the news or do a simple internet search and find footage of refugees crowding at Kabul airport, desperately trying to climb over the walls, with even a young child being passed to a soldier. Just for a moment imagine you are an interpreter: you have worked with NATO in the past on projects helping Americans navigate the linguistic and cultural barriers. Now that the Taliban are in control you know that they will be looking for you. They have a list of everyone that has worked with foreigners in this sort of role, and you fear for you and your family's life. You packed up and fled to the nearest airfield with your loved ones only to be turned away, and told that there is no flight for you.

What about the young woman who lives across the street from you? She studied to get her qualifications so she could work at a bank in the city, and you know she loves working there. But recently she was escorted back to her house by a gunman, and told not to leave home unless accompanied by a mahram - a male family member.

What would you say to the nations of the world? What would you say to those who say that their country is overcrowded and have no room for you?

The UK government has said it will admit 20,000 refugees over the next five years. But for many seeking safety like the examples above it might be too late by then. To put it in to context, Pakistan and Iran currently host 2,215,445 refugees from Afghanistan which represents about 80% of all Afghan refugees. Last year only 454 of the 1336 asylum applications made to the UK were accepted.

Already at the time of writing time is running out to add your voice to the 53,000 others who have written to their MP asking to admit more refugees. So I encourage you to go to Choose Love's site: <https://helprefugees.org/> where you can find an editable template that sends an email to our MP.

You can also donate to Choose Love's or Care for Calais' appeals to raise funds to support Afghan refugees, and Care for Calais are also collecting clothes and supplies for their camps. Please do visit their websites to find out more.

And finally, but arguably most importantly: please pray for Afghanistan:

1. *The Afghan church. [Pray for] protection, peace and courage for our brothers and sisters in Christ who are understandably terrified. Let's pray that they experience the Lord walking with them and among them, saying: "Do not be afraid, little flock, for your Father has been pleased to give you the kingdom."* (Luke 12:32)

2. *Political and humanitarian solutions for the vast number of Afghan refugees, ordinary people suddenly displaced from their homes by the terror the Taliban. May they discover that "The Lord is good, a stronghold in the day of trouble, and he knows those who take refuge in Him."* (Nahum 1:7)

3. *Wisdom for world leaders as they seek to respond diplomatically, building an essential international consensus for peace. "Counsel and sound judgment are mine; I have insight, I have power. By me kings reign and rulers issue decrees that are just;"* (Proverbs 8:14-15)

S. Paul's PCC

6 PCC members plus M. Richardson representing Priory PCC and H. Hurt as safeguarding officer met online on the 20th of July.

At the time of meeting national restrictions had just been fully lifted and so the new risk assessment was discussed and agreed including introducing quiet singing providing masks are worn.

The current financial situation was discussed at length, it was agreed to designate funds from hall bookings and donations to pay off outstanding utility bills. There is some interest regarding renting the church hall and should you know of anyone that would like to book the hall please do be in touch. Regarding the quota payment Ian proposed to set up a standing order of £100 month. This was agreed unanimously. Regarding a contactless machine Ian proposed we order a machine for £19, and this was agreed unanimously. The next Car boot sale is on 28th August.

There is quite a bit of work to do to maintain the church hall and grounds, there have been a few working parties to clean, paint, sort, clear paths, cut the grass, and do some planting. If you can spare some time, please do be in contact.

Fr Cooper talked about his first month in his transformational change post. He has spent this time learning the local community links and being visible at the Church and Grounds and local residents commented that they thought St. Pauls had closed. He explained that at the moment we need to focus on clearing up the grounds and making them look presentable ahead of the launch of children groups and services.

Regarding the Church of England's 'Living in Love & Faith' initiative of exploring gender, sexuality, relationships and marriage, we will have a joint evening with the Priory on the 21st of September to share the resources available and gather interest to run the course on offer. Please do join this if you can and wish to learn more.

Fr. Cooper asked that we modify the E-policy to include that our social media administrators are accepted by the PCC and that they are safeguarding trained. Fr Spicer proposed this, Fr. Vyse seconded it, and it was agreed unanimously. Fr. Spicer proposed also that we sign up to the Digital Charter this was agreed unanimously.

The meeting closed with prayers at 21h.
