The Readings:

Old Testament: Malachi 4: 1-2a

The Great Day of the Lord

See, the day is coming, burning like an oven, when all the arrogant and all evildoers will be stubble; the day that comes shall burn them up, says the Lord of hosts, so that it will leave them neither root nor branch. But for you who revere my name the sun of righteousness shall rise, with healing in its wings. You shall go out leaping like calves from the stall.

New Testament: 2 Thessalonians 3: 6-13

Warning against Idleness

Now we command you, beloved, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from believers who are living in idleness and not according to the tradition that they received from us. For you yourselves know how you ought to imitate us; we were not idle when we were with you, and we did not eat anyone's bread without paying for it; but with toil and labour we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you. This was not because we do not have that right, but in order to give you an example to imitate. For even when we were with you, we gave you this command: Anyone unwilling to work should not eat. For we hear that some of you are living in idleness, mere busybodies, not doing any work. Now such persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work quietly and to earn their own

living. Brothers and sisters do not be weary in doing what is right.

Gospel Reading: Luke 21: 5-19

The Destruction of the Temple Foretold

When some were speaking about the temple, how it was adorned with beautiful stones and gifts dedicated to God, he said, 'As for these things that you see, the days will come when not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down.'

Signs and Persecutions

They asked him, 'Teacher, when will this be, and what will be the sign that this is about to take place?' And he said, 'Beware that you are not led astray; for many will come in my name and say, "I am he!" and, "The time is near!" Do not go after them.

'When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately.' Then he said to them, 'Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and plagues; and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven.

'But before all this occurs, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. This will give you an opportunity to testify. So, make up your minds not to prepare your defence in advance; for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, by relatives and friends; and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name. But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your souls.

Jeremiah 23: 1-6 Colossians 1: 11-20 Luke 23: 33-43

In our prayers today we ask that God's peaceable wisdom will inspire men and women throughout the world to live together in harmony, respect and delight.

Today we especially pray for all victims of war, whether in the armed forces or among much of the

greater number of civilian casualties. We pray for those traumatised by violence, maimed by indiscriminate attack and grieved by loss of family, friends, possessions, livelihood and self-esteem. We pray for a time when war will be no more.

We pray for God's church, that Christians everywhere may be counted among the peacemakers and peace bringers. We pray that we may lay aside selfish pride and be open to listen to other ways, other thoughts and other hopes and dreams. We pray for the courage to refuse easy answers to hard questions, but at the same time to seek the simplicity that lies at the heart of love.

We pray for all who are sick or in any kind of need. Those in hospital or at home. Those who, as we pray now are awaiting operations, diagnoses or words that may bring fear. We pray for nurses and doctors, medical researchers, ambulance crews and paramedics that they may find support and know they are valued.
