Spend an hour listening to the wonderful augmented choir. After all, there is nothing worth watching on television unless you are keen on 'Countryfile', which could be recorded.


Why not give it a try? I am sure you will feel able to face the next week.'



#### THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Around the time that you receive your February edition of the Parish Magazine falls the festival of Candlemas on 2<sup>nd</sup>



February. Candlemas marks the official end of the Christmas Season with another reminder of the Epiphany part of Christmas. The Epiphany is most strongly identified with the Three Kings, who visited Jesus whilst he was still with his parents in Bethlehem. The Kings fulfil their role as our 'knowledge builders' by using their gifts to explain who Jesus is and what he is to become.

Candlemas brings the festive season to a close with an encounter between Mary, Joseph, the infant Jesus – and Simeon and Anna. This encounter takes place in the Temple at Jerusalem, where Simeon and Anna worked in God's service. Both of them were waiting for, as the bible puts it, the consolation of Israel. They were both very old and their roles were as holy people devoted to God; and in Anna's case, she was also a prophet.

Again, we use this encounter between Jesus, his parents and these two holy people who had lived in the temple for decades, to understand more of God's plan for Jesus. Both Simeon and Anna had waited for many years in hopeful expectation that they would live to see the Lord's anointed one, the messiah. They both rejoice when they see him, and Simeon is recorded as saying, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my Spirit rejoices in God my Saviour." He and Anna are now able to finish their lives consoled in the fact that God has sent his messiah to his beloved people.

This is one of the church's great moments of revealing, for now we know that God is with us, and that we may hope for the redemption of the world and the hope of heaven. It is a wonderful way to complete the story which began with the biblical prophecies in Advent that something was about to happen. We waited in expectation, and at Christmas, it did happen.

We give thanks for the saviour that we have received and welcomed into our hearts, and now we look forward in preparation for Lent and the momentous occasion of Good Friday and Easter.


#### Churchwarden's Chat – February 2023

#### **OUR 'MAD' LIFE**

Bishop Hall Speers has left his diocese in Mahajanga and returned home in time to shiver with us in the recent very cold weather. A great contrast to a Sunday just before Christmas, the longest, hottest service in his Madagascan experience!

Our tuctuc ride took us to St. Andrew's Church, Ampombibitika. There I was to speak about evangelisation and mission to the lay leaders of the parish before they elected their new SA.FI.FI. (Evangelisation) committee. Elections are much enjoyed and follow a rigid pattern with each vote being waved in the air and the writing on it read out by one person and checked by another.

After lunch was a session with the adult baptism candidates (15) and confirmation candidates (38). Simultaneously there was great excitement on the roadside outside the church as the ox for the Sunday lunch was being killed. Mr Claris (headmaster of the local school) was in charge.



By the time I came out of church he and many of his pupils were busy chopping it into small pieces and some putting tiny pieces of fat and meat alternately on skewers for the evening meal. By that stage over 200 people had already arrived for the service the next day. All had to be fed and bedded down in the church. What an

I made my apologies and returned to the Hotel Plaza.

And so to Sunday. Breakfast was provided at the church for all who had arrived early. One taste of the meat I was served told me I had made a big mistake tasting it so I declined anymore and filled up with rice.

The service eventually began at 8.30 am. The Rural Dean had taken the opportunity of my visit to include the licensing of new Readers/Catechists and the installation of the new SA.FI.FI. committee. The millions of flies that had gathered over the ox carcase were now dispersed everywhere, not least in the

sanctuary. How does one maintain one's dignity while swatting the flies on one's face, and those hovering over the bread and wine and everything else? Nevertheless it was a very splendid service with a great sense of worship extending even to those who couldn't get into the church. It was 2 pm by the time I took off my robes. My longest and hottest service to date – and I hope a record that I will not break!

My big New Year resolution is to retire this year. So this means a lot of change and a desire to see a lot of projects either completed or well established. A huge amount has been achieved thanks to your generous support financially and prayerfully. Thank you.

### Margaret's Page

I have recently had quite a stressful few days so I am writing this page in the hope that it will be of use to any readers who find themselves in a similar position. I had three electricity cuts in one week – Wednesday morning, Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning,

each lasting for about an hour. This would not have worried me normally although they were obviously inconvenient, but no-one else in my street appeared to be affected. Even my next-door neighbour was not affected. I began to think that there was something wrong with my house supply so I stupidly rang E-ON on the only contact number I could find. I received a recorded answer reeled off at top speed telling me about 10 numbers I could call if necessary, all completely useless.

Luckily I have a very good neighbour, Doreen, who remembered that we had recently received a letter from Western Power Distribution about contacting them in case of need in a power cut. I rang 0800 032 8302 and was answered by a real live person, with a clear understandable voice, who listened to my problem and answered it. Apparently, engineers had been working in our area and had caused problems with fuses in my local substation. The times and dates were identical to those I had experienced, but I was still confused. Why was it just my house? I was told that the circuits are done in such a way that my supply can be completely different from those of my neighbours. Finally we arranged that in future if I have a problem I can check my mobile phone where I will find a message, even though I normally only use it for emergencies away from home. Because of my age I am on the power company's emergency list but this does not help when my houseline does not work without electricity.

I sat back and relaxed, knowing that I had nothing to worry about. That night I was woken at ten past one in the morning by the ringing of my house phone. At first I ignored it thinking it must be a wrong number, but when it rang again I answered. It was a message warning me that electricians were working in my area and there might be a power cut before 11 a.m. This time Doreen had a call too, but neither of us had a power cut!


