## The Bishop of Derby's Harvest Appeal 2023



As you know, as a church we support the RAHOCA project in Uganda. There is a great deal of community work undertaken by the project much of which has been in supporting people with HIV/AIDS as well as helping groups to develop income generation projects such as working with livestock. They face the challenges with support in finance and prayer, including from our church.

The latest report is mainly good news about security threats being slightly reduced, no landslides so far, people living more positively with HIV/AIDS and reduced threats from Covid 19 and Ebola. Erifazi the project director reports their thanks and blessings for the support received.
