

Why not have a go please? Amounts can be varied, Gift Aid (adding an extra 20% to your gift) can be claimed as an optional extra

Parish Giving Scheme (PGS) supports the Church of England maintain a **presence** in all our towns, cities and villages.

The PGS is a direct-debit scheme allowing donors to give on a weekly, quarterly or annual basis, with Gift aid and inflationary options. It is designed to support churches by a simple and secure service. New donors can set up, online, phoning 0333 002 1271, and via the Diocesan web-site

Giving Review- something for us all

The Church of England has designated the end of September as "Generosity Week". Time to think about our response to God's generosity by giving back to God something of all the blessings He has given to us.

By Generosity Week it would be wonderful for us all to have reviewed our lives and managed to find new ways to give. We are grateful for all that you do give and do, but there is an ever increasing need. The basis for our giving is always that this is an important part of our discipleship, of being gratefully obedient to God and how we can live out His ways on earth.

Some of the things which you may like to consider are:

<u>Giving of our time</u>- new things we can volunteer to do

Sharing of our gifts and skills- finding opportunities to fulfil the special role that God has given to us within the church, or passing on our experience to others who can take up these roles.

<u>Prayer-</u> joining in the prayer services in church to pray with others. Taking up one of the prayer needs for the church and praying daily. (See July's notices, or the notice in church).

Legacy see laterll.

Regular giving - making sure that we give the first 10% of our income as the tithe due to God. This can be to the church and/or charities.

Giving directly to the church by the Parish Giving Scheme is especially helpful. It is an easy process and Gift Aid when applicable is claimed on our behalf. (For ways to sign up please see the letter at the back of church). Giving by direct debit or contactless giving is also a big help in saving the time which banking cash takes. Sometimes we may need to give something up to be able to put money aside for God- be assured He will always reward you, many times over.

<u>One off gifts</u> - a way to say thank you to God when we have an unexpected income, or because God prompts us to give to a need. So, let's offer all our gifts cheerfully and happily to bless God, others and in turn our selves.

An invitation to Harvest Lunch – A low/no plastic lunch

Harvest is a time of celebrating – the gifts of our food and the creation which we enjoy throughout the year.



This year there will be a shared lunch after the 11am Harvest service on October 1st which we hope as many people as possible will come to.

Please sign up on the rota if you would like to come- and also, if you can, anything that you can bring for the lunch. We have a challenge to make this lunch as plastic free as possible, as a way of helping the environment around us.

There will be more explanation about this in the service on September 3rd. It is particularly single-use plastic items which we want to try to avoid as they take years to break down and cause damage to the water systems and wildlife.

So, we will not be using plastic cutlery or straws, or single-use tableware. Table decorations will be made from natural materials.

Let's aim for food which has been locally grown, or packaged in paper or tins, such as baked potatoes and a variety of fillings which we can make. Puddings could be fruit crumbles or tray bakes- please have a think about what you could make as we seek to be low, or no plastic. We would like to avoid waste- so food can be brought on the day before the service- and then if anything is over could be taken home in a container with a lid.

There will be quiz and things for the children to do. Let's have a really enjoyable lunch together- as well as do all we can to help the ecosystem around us in God's beautiful world.


