

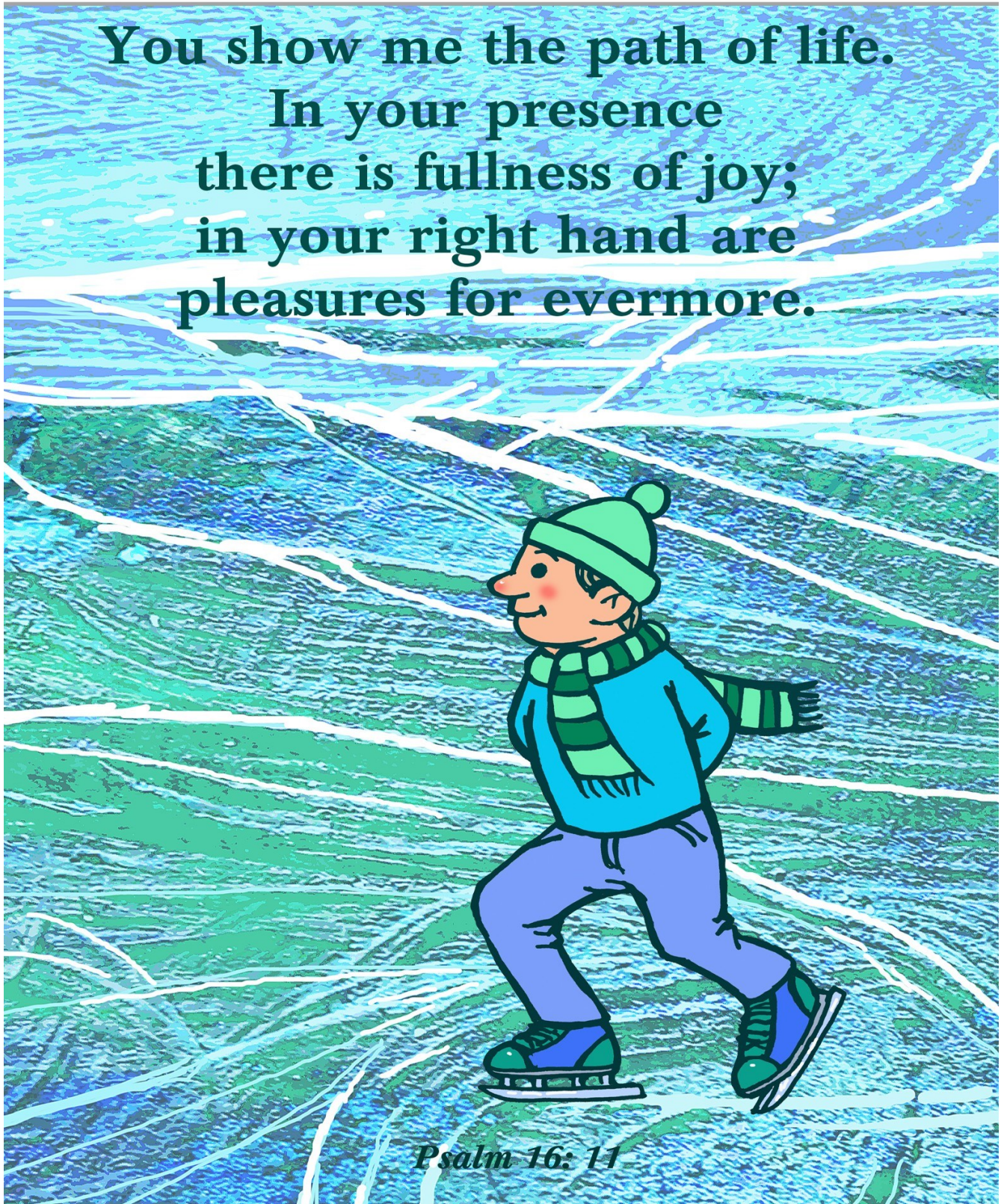

"The Year of Faith"

Hereford Diocese has designated 2024 as The Year of Faith. It is tempting, I appreciate, to ask whether the Diocese thinks last year was the Year without Faith. But let us put cynicism aside. It is also tempting, I have no doubt, to assert that you already have faith thank you very much. But that is to think of faith as a lifeless object that we bury in the ground, ready to produce when we come face to face with our Maker.

However Faith is less a noun and much more a verb, a doing word. You can believe a chair is real; trust that it will support your weight; commend it to others as an impressive piece of furniture, but it's only when you sit in it that you are showing your faith in it. Faith is a living thing that is only alive if it is growing. And it only grows if we use it. We are generously providing three opportunities to use and/or grow your faith in the early days of 2024.

On 13th January the Bishop of Hereford is visiting St George's from 9.30am - 1pm to speak about how we may have confidence in the Word of God. St George's has the great privilege of hosting the launch event for the Diocese's Year of Faith and everyone is warmly invited to attend. On Monday 10th January at 7pm we are launching The Bible Course, an eight-week course produced by The Bible Society, designed to help you understand how the different books of the Bible fit together and explore key themes. No prior knowledge is necessary but everyone is guaranteed to learn something. Allen and Margaret Marsden have very kindly offered to host the course on a fortnightly basis. Anyone is welcome to attend, but please speak to them or one of the clergy so that we know to expect you.

Finally, Lent will soon be upon us (the start coinciding with Valentine's Day this year). I would like to encourage everyone to consider a carbon fast during Lent. You can find out more of what this entails by visiting <https://www.climatestewards.org/resources/carbon-fast/>

This may all sound like quite hard work. However St Paul encourages us to "Fight the good Fight" (1 Timothy 6 v.12). This suggests that our faith won't grow much while we are sitting back in our armchairs but rather we should exercise it like a muscle. I can't think of a better prayer for me or you for 2024 than for our faith to grow.

“A Retreat in Daily Life”

A week to walk more closely with
God through accompanied prayer

25th February – 2nd March 2024

At the start of this year of prayer Bishop Richard said that, as a parish priest, accompanied prayer was the most life changing part of his ministry. It drew people closer to God more than anything else that he did. We are very blessed that a team of prayer guides will be coming to the deanery and offering a service of accompanying individuals in prayer for five days. Do sign up – this opportunity does not often happen.

There will be a taster evening from 7pm - 9pm on Wednesday 10th January in St Georges Church, Pontesbury. This provides an opportunity to learn more about the week, get an idea about how it works and talk to some of the team holding the week.

The week starts with a 90-minute introduction at 4pm on Sunday 25th February at St Georges Church Pontesbury. You commit to praying for 30 minutes each day and then meeting with a prayer companion for up to 30 minutes for five days, Monday 26th February to Friday 1st March. It finishes with a breakfast feedback on Saturday 2nd March at 9am at St Georges Church Pontesbury. There is a charge of £25 to pay for the expenses of the guides, a grant is available if you cannot afford this.

Turkey – Historic inauguration of new church building in Istanbul; Elderly Christian murdered.

“Look at this crowd! These are my brothers and sisters, and at last we have a place where we can all come together!” These words are from a Turkish Christian attending the inaugural service of a church building in Yeşilköy, Istanbul on Sunday 8th October. The opening is believed to mark the first church building built with government backing in Turkey’s 100-year history as a post-Ottoman state.

This is a remarkable step, given the Turkish state’s record of unjustly expropriating churches and other church properties, adding greatly to the difficulties of the Christian communities in Turkey since the formation of the Turkish Republic in 1923. The country’s president, Recep Tayyip Erdogan, joined church leaders to take part in the inauguration ceremony of the building in Istanbul.

Construction of the church began in 2019, and Erdogan laid the first stone. The inauguration was postponed following the February earthquake that struck both Turkey and Syria. The church, which has capacity for 750 worshippers, was filled for the inauguration ceremony.

Erdogan is open about his ambitions to spread Turkish Islamic influence, as if to re-establish the Ottoman empire. He has been criticised during his two decades as the country’s leader for converting ancient churches into mosques. Most notably, his decision to convert Istanbul’s Hagia Sophia, once the world’s largest cathedral, from a museum into a mosque in 2020, caused an international outcry.

Meanwhile, concerns of Turkey’s Christian minority were heightened with the murder of a 91-year-old Christian in the south-eastern province of Mardin on 6th November. Gevriye Ego was ambushed in front of his house in the Christian village of Enhil and shot multiple times. He died in hospital. Christians have lived in south-east Turkey for many centuries but are now a small minority. George Aslan, a Christian MP, made the assertion in the Turkish parliament that Gevriye’s killing was “part of a systematic campaign against our community to drive us away from our lands”. Many Christians were forcefully displaced in the 1990s but some, including Gevriye, have returned to their ancestral villages in recent years.

Bethlehem

The ongoing situation is grave in Israel and Gaza, but also in the West Bank, which is not involved in the conflict. No one is allowed in or out of Bethlehem, and there are already shortages of flour, dairy products and petrol. Many schools are closed.

Christians living in all these regions pray for safety. They ask their Lord and Saviour, the Prince of Peace, to bring an end to the violence. Please add your prayers to theirs.

Laos – Eight Christian families expelled from village; Local authorities order church to stop meeting

Prayers are needed for eight Christian families (about 60 people) who have been expelled from their village in Savannakhet province because they left the traditional spirit cults of their fellow villagers and decided to follow Jesus Christ.

District authorities issued the expulsion order on 4th October and gave the families thirty days to find themselves new homes outside the village. They began by trying to build temporary houses, using materials they found in the forest.

Elsewhere in Savannakhet province, a deputy village chief ordered a church of eighteen Christians to cease meeting. On Sunday 1st October the authorities interrupted a worship service and threatened the believers with arrest and heavy fines if they did not comply. The warning applied also to two Christians who were attending the service from a neighbouring village. An additional threat of a large fine was issued to the church in the event of any village residents falling ill or dying.

These orders contradict Article 30 of the Lao Constitution, which explicitly states that Lao citizens have the right and freedom “to believe or not to believe in religions”. Whilst this principle is largely followed in urban areas, there is more hostility in rural areas towards what is perceived as a Western faith.

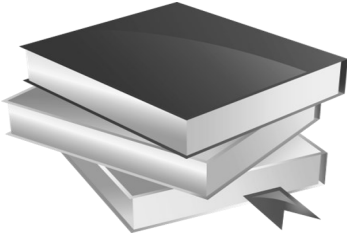

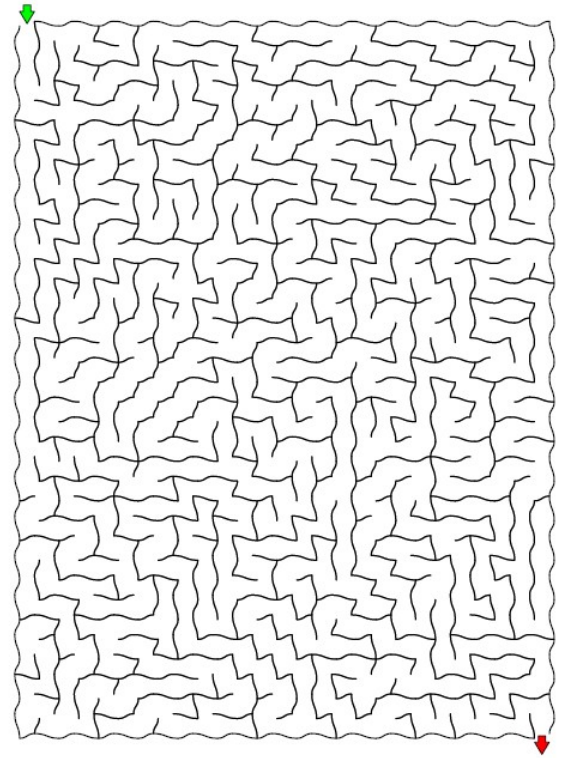

Hokkaido 2023

[If you missed Robert's talk at Habberley you missed a treat. Anyway, you will have to make do with his written report instead Ed.]

The raw white fish glared at me so balefully from the plate that I wondered which of us would manage to eat the other. Eventually I accepted a draw, ate his companions and left him on the plate. This was my only attempt to eat sushi and it took place at a posh Japanese restaurant in Sapporo, the main city of Hokkaido, which is the northernmost island of Japan where I have spent three delightful weeks following an itinerary impeccably organised by *Far Frontiers*. Other ventures into Japanese cuisine were more enjoyable. At a stall by Lake Toya I persuaded Masako my guide to try a soft ice cream. This was, unusually, black, being flavoured with squid ink. She retaliated by presenting me with octopus dumplings made with rice flour rather than suet, and rice balls flavoured with salmon and wrapped in edible seaweed. The night after the sushi I did my bit for the Japanese ecology by eating venison. My guide told me this was encouraged, as the deer population was getting out of control.

I spent the first morning in Tokyo watching a sumo training session. One giant practised pushing another giant out of a ring. The bouts, which I watched on TV that evening, are ferocious; the grips being best left to the imagination. The afternoon's tour of Tokyo featured Meishi Park, a tranquil woodland in the heat and bustle of Tokyo, dedicated to the Emperor Meishi (1868-1912) and his Empress Masako. Hiromi the guide told me they had transformed Japan from a feudal society to an industrial democracy. A later guide pointed out that the transformation included the development of modern arms, and suggested a direct line from it to Japan's disastrous role in World War 2. By coincidence I was reading a biography of Lord Palmerston who in 1863 bombarded Kagoshima and forced an apology and reparations from Japan following an incident. I wondered whether the rearmament might be a reaction to humiliation.

Hokkaido is about the size of Wales, sparsely populated and lovely; pretty in places, awesomely grand in others. One day I spent peacefully cruising Lake Toya; another walking around a lake in Unema Park, looking at verdant islands and spotting the occasional heron. By contrast we walked up to the crater of the volcano Mount Ouso and saw the steam rising. Masako told me that it erupted on

average every 25 years. I incautiously asked her when it had last erupted. "25 years ago" she replied.

The highlight, for me, was the cruise along the side of the Shiretoku Peninsula. The planned cruise was cancelled because of high winds. Sachiko the guide arranged with another company to cruise the more sheltered water on the west side. The bears on the shore were too distant to be worth photographing, but the grandeur of the cliffs, tortured into fantastic shapes by wind and sea, would alone have made the trip worth while. The following day we walked on the Noshuy Peninsula, a flat desolate spit pointing into the Okhotsk Sea. From there I could see Kanashir, an island controlled by Russia though claimed by Japan. Tommy, the driver, whose hobby is mountaineering, wanted the Russians gone so that he could climb two mountains on Kanashir.

I spent the last three nights at a Ryokan Inn, a traditional Japanese inn where I slept on mattresses on the floor, and ate meals prepared in my room by the maid. The first evening featured a tea ceremony, an elaborate but friendly ritual that included much bowing and smiling. Its original purpose, I believe, was to emphasise equality between host and guests, and among the guests at a time when Japanese society was oppressively hierarchical. The tour of Kyoto included colourful, ornate Buddhist temples and more modest, naturalistic Shinto shrines. I understand from Meiko the guide that the contrast in appearance reflects the different values of the two philosophies.

Hokkaido is a wonderful place, a land of contrasts, not only between city and country, but also between rural prettiness and the bleak austerity of volcanoes and coastline. What made it a glorious holiday destination was the guides, whose expertise and helpfulness made me feel I was with friends, and the people on whom I practised my comically inept Japanese. "Yubin kitte wo kaitain desu ga" (I should like to buy a postage stamp) secured enough stamps to post a card to England and have it safely and promptly delivered.

P.S. On 24th November I gave a talk about my holiday at Habberley Village Hall to raise funds for St. Mary's. It was well attended and raised £428. My thanks go to all those who supported the event.

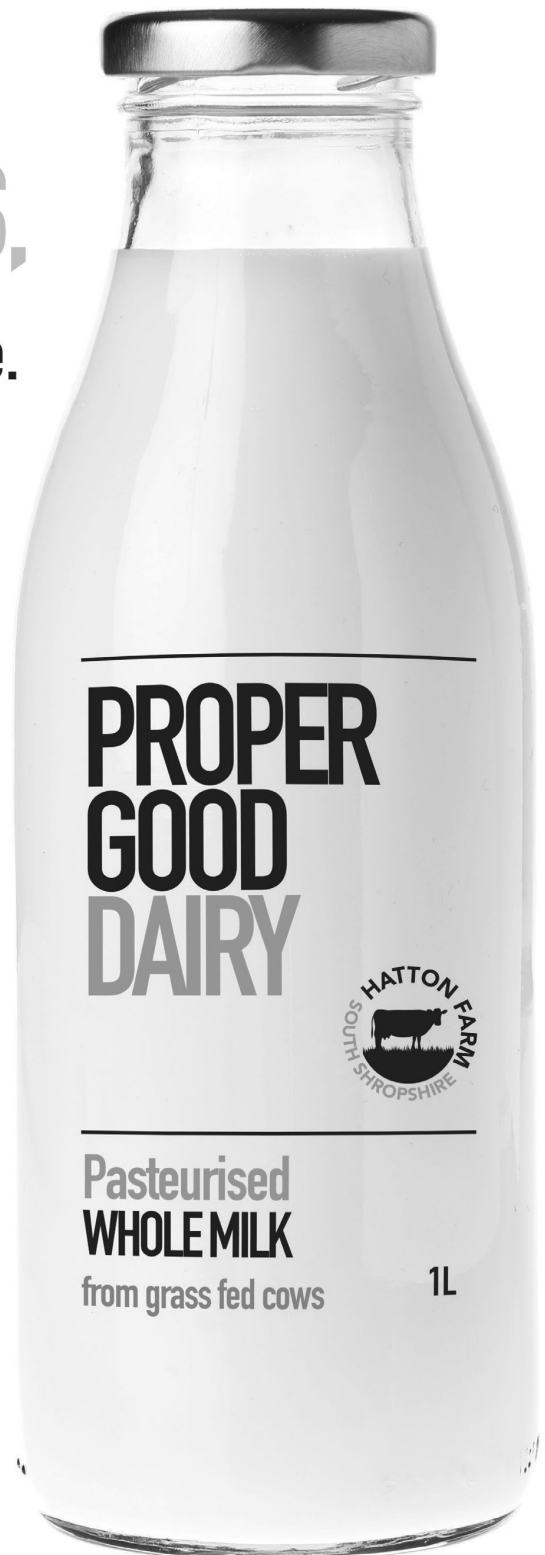

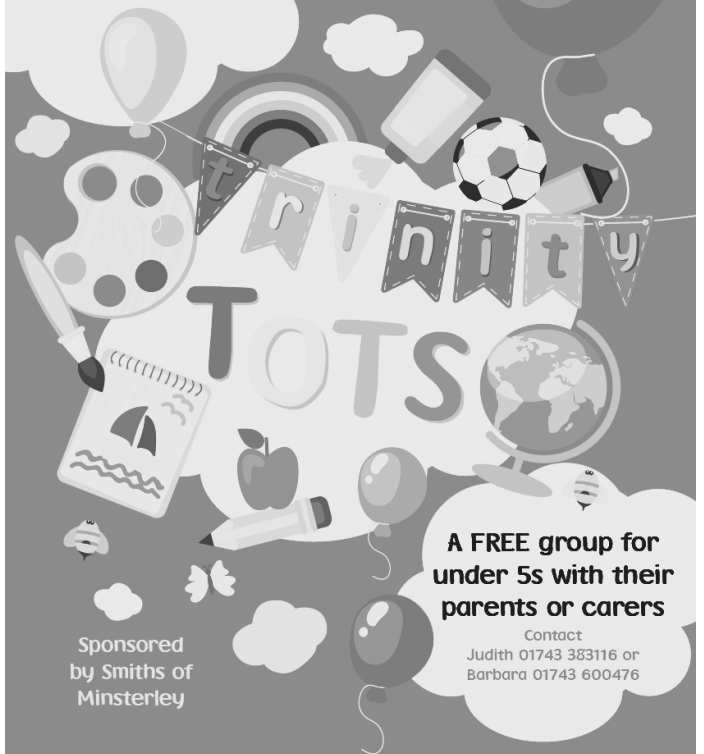

Flood Officers from Shropshire Council will be visiting the parish to meet with members from the Minsterley Flood Action Group, who will show them the areas and properties which were recently affected by flooding.

A consultation meeting is being arranged at Pontesbury in January 2024 to discuss proposed junction changes and parking around the centre of Pontesbury.

Fly-tipping and littering around Oak Drive car park would be reported to the Housing Association for their attention.

It was agreed a £3,000 increase in the precept would be requested for the next financial year to help cover the parish budget.

Highways would be contacted to ask if any road improvements are required on the Leigh Road between the cemetery and Reabrook.

John Campion, Police & Crime Commissioner for West Mercia, has agreed to visit the Parish in January 2024, to view and discuss with Parish representatives speeding issues on the A488 between the School and The Waterwheel.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Tuesday, 9th January 2024, 7.00 pm at Minsterley Parish Hall.

The hedges are thick and full of birdlife and there are several large old oak trees on the boundaries which form a corridor through to Callow Hill woods, hillfort and quarry.



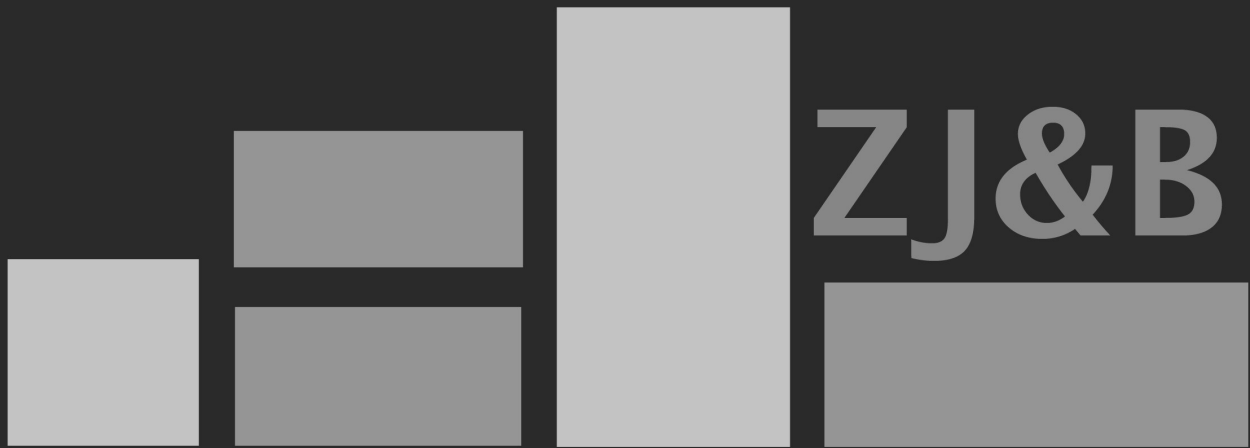

Rogue Traders

Locally we have had an increase in suspect rogue traders offering 'services.' Rogue traders are people who call at your door pretending to be qualified tradespeople and offering to do work on your home. They may suggest urgent repairs need carrying out at your home. They may pressurise you to make quick decisions to have work done, pay in advance for materials or do poor work at highly inflated prices.

Doorstep cold-calling is not illegal, however our advice is to never employ traders who call at your door unannounced.

- Be cautious; if a trader knocks at your door, do not agree to on the spot house repairs without taking advice. Say 'no thank you' and close the door.
- Be wary of special offers. They will use tactics such as 'I am only in your area today and would need to do the work now'.
- Do not believe when told that guttering, roofing, gardening or paving work is in need of

urgent repair – this may cause you to panic and allow the work to take place.

- Don't allow anyone to pressure you into agreeing to have work carried out. If you ask them to leave and they don't, they commit a criminal offence - contact the police on 999.
- Do not make snap decisions. If you feel that any work needs carrying out on your property, take time to talk to family or neighbours before you make a decision.
- Don't ever go to a bank or cash point with a trader; legitimate traders would never do this!
- Remember.....it's OK to say no!

If you feel you have been a victim of rogue traders, you can report suspicious callers to Trading Standards, the Citizens Advice Consumer Helpline number at **0808 223 1133**, or West Mercia Police on 101 or 999 in the event of an emergency.
