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Lent 2024

On Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, we start the service with the following words: "At first this season of Lent was observed by those who were preparing for Baptism at Easter and by those who were to be restored to the Church's fellowship from which they had been separated through sin."

The early Church was as bad as the modern Church at internal arguments that seem to have nothing to do with the people in the pews. But in those early years, Christianity was an underground movement, persecuted by the authorities, and what you believed could lead to your death.

One big debate the early Church had was whether Christians who had denied Christ should be accepted back into the Church. These were people who had been with the charged crime Christianity by the authorities and, out of fear, said that they weren't Christian and so survived. During the periods where Christianity wasn't persecuted so much, those people would ask to return to a worshipping community. Those communities had questions about whether they would be welcomed back immediately or should they have to be re-baptised to wash them of this sin? After much debate, it decided was that returning, repentant Christians should go through the same period of prayer, fasting and study of the scriptures

that new Christians people being baptised at Easter went through.

With these 40 days of examining the conscience, prayer, fasting and study began the spiritual practice that we now call the Season of Lent – giving up whatever habits get in the way of our relationship with God, or taking up something that will draw us closer in love with our Heavenly Father.

St Peter's regularly provides tools to help you through your Lenten journey. We have various study groups for different interests and at different times of day. This year, we have Come and See, which will run in church in the evenings, and the ecumenical study group, which meets during the day. There will also be a study group looking in detail at C.S. Lewis' book The Screwtape Letters and connecting its theology to the Bible and to Lewis's other works. Please see the notices for the dates, times and locations for each study group.

Those who choose to start or end Lent with an 'examination of conscience' are invited to make their confession – this is a long-standing Church of England practice known as the Sacrament of Reconciliation. It involves preparing for confession by thinking about your patterns of behaviour that you think damage your relationships with family,


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friends and God. During the Sacrament, you discuss those behaviours with the Vicar and what you might do to heal any damaged relationships. The Vicar then pronounces God's forgiveness for repentant sinners, which includes herself, that has been promised to us in the Bible. This is completely confidential and you can book an appointment for the Sacrament of Reconciliation at any time of year, but it is particularly recommended during Lent.

Whatever you have decided to do for yourself this Lent, whether it's joining a Lent group, studying one of the books on offer, or something else, I pray that you may have a holy Lent and come to the celebration of Easter refreshed and renewed.


Passions of the Soul, by Rowan Williams, Publ Bloomsbury, £9.59 (Church House Bookshop)


Rowan Williams' book, published in time for Lent.

"Rowan Williams has been engaged for many years in research on the Eastern Christian tradition. In this book shows ways in which the great classics of Eastern Christian spiritual writing can help us to understand and cope with the turbulence of the 21st century. The Eastern monastic tradition teaches us what it means to let our eyes be opened not only to God but to the material world. Before we can enter into the contemplation of the divine, we need self-knowledge, and a capacity to relate to the rest of the world without selfish illusions. And in this process, we come to grasp how those human reactions work that can trap us in negative, delusory and destructive patterns of behaviour. Only in this way can we understand the kind of people we need to become."

Tarry Awhile, by Selina Stone, Publ SPCK, £9.59 (Church House Bookshop)

The Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent Book 2024 "Tarrying is a Black Christian spiritual practice in which believers actively wait to experience the manifestation of God's presence. It answers yes to the question Jesus once asked his disciples: will you tarry here and watch with me? Whether in the vibrancy of music and singing, or in the hushed silence of the congregation, people of all ages anticipate an encounter with God that will transform what they know, feel and experience day to day. This book makes the wisdom of Black spiritualities and faith available for all people. It focuses on seven themes: darkness as a place of encounter with the divine; the unity of all things; movement, belonging and migration; the Spirit as one who moves in unexpected ways; quiet contemplation as essential to spiritual growth; healing in community; and weeping that turns to
