Father Chris writes

Back in the days when each of our parishes had their own Rector, most of the Christian villagers would regularly attend church each Sunday. Today, as a Benefice we are blessed to have eight wonderful Church buildings, so regular Sunday worship is possible. This does mean some Sunday mornings having to travel a little, but in doing so we get to see, experience and use our wonderful buildings.

Sadly, regular attendance at services has nationally dropped significantly. The world has become much more materialistic, and our time seems more precious than ever. In life, there will always be obstacles in our way. Some people work or have some form of sports on Sunday mornings. Others might feel that they just want to relax at home after a stressful week. And many do not think Church is necessary.

Whatever obstacles people face, we will be blessed for choosing to follow God's commandment to worship at Church. As one of His Ten Commandments, God commanded that we keep the Sabbath day holy (Exodus 20:8–11). One of the ways we keep this commandment is to meet together on Sundays to worship God

and give Him thanks. We are also strengthened when we are around other believers.

The Sacrament of the Eucharist helps us remember Jesus and be part of his body. Jesus commanded, 'Take, eat: this is my body, which is broken for you: this do in remembrance of me' (1 Corinthians 11:24). Keeping this commandment weekly at Church helps us remember what Jesus has done for us and commit to follow Him.

The Church of Jesus Christ relies on us. In the Bible, the Apostle Paul compared the Church to a body, with Jesus as the head. He said for a body to work, every member is important and must do its part (Ephesians 4:16). Participating in the life of the Church and offering our time and talents will improve and strengthen both us and the people around us.

We should as humans keep our bodies as fit as possible, and many take time in their lives to do just that. Taking time to exercise at home, fitness clubs or at gyms. Equally, we need to refresh ourselves spiritually also. Church services teach and uplift us. What we learn at church gives us guidance on how to follow Jesus, improve and feed us spiritually, and live

better lives. We can be uplifted by fellow believers and by the opportunity to serve, worship and be open to receive the Holy Spirit. By attending Church regularly, we can gain a sense of belonging. It is a community where we can socialize and support and pray for each other and those in need. We can make friends and build a support network that we can rely on.

God can speak to us; we can find answers in his holy house. Maybe you are struggling with a specific question or need some direction in your life. Maybe you just need to feel God's love and know that He is there. In do-

ing so, we have the opportunities to receive insight from God. He wants to communicate with us, and Church is a good place to hear His voice in our heart and mind. 'Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess for he who promised is faithful. And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another - and all the more as you see the Day approaching.' (Hebrews 10.23-25)?

A Churchwarden's Diary

Earlier this month I went to see a film called 'One Life'. It told the story of Nicholas Winton (Nicky) who you may have heard of. In the Second World War he took some leave from his job to go to Prague where he saw the plight of Jewish families who were fleeing the Nazis. He was determined to do something to help. He worked with others to help the children to escape to England, where they were taken in by foster parents. He helped 669 children escape to safety before Prague was taken by Hitler.

Nicky wasn't a spy or an action hero nor was he particularly courageous but he used the skills he did have to ensure those children had safe and unhindered passage away from danger. Nicky was a stockbroker and good at paperwork. He understood what visas and forms needed to be filled in and he made sure all the t's were crossed and the i's were dotted.

On the first weekend of January, a group of us gathered at St Peter and St Paul's Church in Kedington to clean the church and put away the Christmas decorations. We had a list of tasks we hoped to complete. The list was quite long and this churchwarden envisaged still being in church at lunchtime. One of the tasks was to tidy the crypt so I spent quite a lot of time underground.

When I emerged, I was thrilled to see that all the jobs on the list had been completed. Those who knew the routine had cleaned the church. Tall people had taken down the chandeliers and removed the candles back into storage. The flower team had tidied the flower arrangements. Someone took great care to

wind the Christmas Tree lights ready for next year. Those with knowledge of the items in storage had cleared some to the bin and returned some to the crypt. Those good with a broom had swept the crypt. Strong people had lifted the heavy boxes up or down the crypt stairs and moved the tree to the churchyard. Everyone had played a part and did what they could, according to their strengths.

Questions of Faith for Lent?

The meaning of Christian faith is explained by St Paul in his letter to the Hebrews, when he wrote: 'Faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see'. He explains the certainty of what we do not see as being the belief in the existence of God who is invisible to human eyes, although, of course, we can all, whoever we are, wherever we are, and whatever the time is - and all this without a phone - personally communicate with God through prayer. And it is through prayer that we can build our faith, that is our belief in the invisible God. But on the other hand, it is our faith that encourages us to pray. It's a perfect, which came first, chicken or egg? situation. The two go hand-in-hand and are inseparable. We cannot have faith without praying, and we cannot pray without faith.

There can be no doubt that our personal belief in God, our faith, is intimately linked with our personal prayers to him. And as Jesus once said to his disciples, 'Whatever you ask in prayer, you will receive, if you have faith.'

But faith is not just about those big moments, in fact it is not about any single moment, it is about our ongoing relationship with God and our obedience to him every moment of our lives. As individuals and as church families we are called by Jesus to use the gifts that we have been blessed with, and this means being sure of what we want to achieve, continuing to pray for it and by stepping out in faith, and to use God's gifts to us both wisely, and to seek new and exciting ways to use what we have, in order to reach out to everyone - the young and old, families and the lonely, the fit, the disabled and the sick, the dying and the bereaved - and in doing so we can show them God's love and what it means to have their own faith in him through prayer.

Faith is hard to learn because we can only learn as much as we allow ourselves to have. A good starting place is to ask ourselves two questions: How would I respond to what Jesus asked his disciples, 'Where is your faith?', and secondly, how much faith am I prepared to allow into my life?

The Season of Lent

During Lent, which begins on Ash Wednesday 14th February, we are called to take ourselves out of the comfortable zones we live in and experience discomfort to enable us to grow closer to God. A good Biblical example of this is the Book of Job, written 500 - 600 years before Christ. Job enjoyed a very comfortable life for his time. He lived according to the ways of God and was subsequently blessed because of his righteousness. He enjoyed good health, had a large happy family, and was one of the wealthiest men on earth with lots of land, huge herds of different animals, plentiful crops, and many willing servants. However, suddenly, all this is taken away from him, and he experiences the most uncomfortable life imaginable.

Job, however, gets advice from his close friends who, like him, were God-fearing people. It's not a comfortable story to read, which makes it ideal for Lent because it can take you out of your comfort zone. His agony and lack of comforting words from his, at times, non-sympathetic friends, leads Job to seek help from God.

Today, we are more fortunate than Job because we have an arbitrator to seek help from, to comfort us and guide us through life. In fact, we don't have one, but two, Jesus and the Holy Spirit, who are one with God. But, even so, as followers of Jesus, we need to understand that our lives are not necessarily going to be comfortable all the time. Like Job we have to learn to take the rough with the smooth because it is through the bad times that we can recognise the joy of the good times.

In his second letter to the Christians in Corinth, Paul tells us that we have to expect, as he did, to face hardships so that we can appreciate the joyful times - 'sorrowful, yet always rejoicing, poor yet making many rich, having nothing and yet possessing everything.'

The possessions that Paul refers to are not the worldly possessions we associate with Job, but the heavenly possessions that we can read about in Matthew's gospel: 'Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moths and vermin destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moths and vermin do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also'.

This Lent, try not to do only those things designed to comfort you personally, such as changing your diet or taking more exercise, but seek to store up treasure in heaven by doing some of those things that make you feel uncomfortable but that will bring joy to others. And if you need help in choosing what your Lenten task might be, try reading those parts of the Bible, such as Job, that you avoid because you think they will make you feel uncomfortable, you might be surprised how comforting that can be in the long run.


