EASTER

The Easter Liturgy contains four elements: Vigil, Service of Light, Baptismal Rite, and Eucharist. Two of these will be celebrated in the Cheviot Benefice on Easter Eve, namely the Vigil and the Service of Light.

The Vigil. Perhaps the oldest feature, has at its heart the reading of Scripture which tells of God's saving love.

The Service of Light proclaims the triumph of Christ who, as the Risen Lord, conquers death and banishes all darkness. In this service the Easter Candle, symbolizing Christ, the world's true light, is carried into our midst.

The Liturgy of Initiation. Through our baptism we partake in Christ's death and resurrection. Easter and baptism have been closely linked from at least the end of the second century. If there is no one to present for baptism, there is still the opportunity to remember our own baptism and to re-affirm our Baptismal Vows as a public declaration of our union with Christ in his death and resurrection.

The Liturgy of the Eucharist. This is the climax to the Easter Liturgy when we are sacramentally reunited with our risen Lord. We recall the last meal of Christ in the Upper Room, we remember the resurrection meals he shared with his disciples on the lakeside and at Emmaus and, like them, we recognize him in the breaking of the bread.
