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A LETTER FOR FEBRUARY 2024

Dear Friends,

As Rev Claire wrote on this page in the last edition, which covered December and January, the Churches seemed 'out of sync' with popular feeling at that time of the year. For instance, in December, when Christians were going through Advent, everyone else was blasting out Christmas carols – only to drop them, as soon as Boxing Day arrived!

In February, it is different. There is always a sense of dread about the weather. Like others who have lived their whole lives in this region, I know instinctively that the worst weather often comes as the days get longer: the North Sea is at its coldest, and winds from the north or east can bring freezing conditions. Church-wise, it is also the start of Lent! This year, Ash Wednesday is February 14th; Lent runs for 6-and-a-half weeks up till Easter Sunday on March 31st.

I don't want to give the idea that we are meant to mope in misery for the weeks of Lent. What we are asked to do is to look at ourselves and see where we might be going wrong – and also, where (thankfully) we are getting things right. I know that we live in a non-religious society, but there are a lot of people who do many good things – of the sort that Jesus asked us to do in the gospels. In rural areas such as the North Tyne and Redesdale, we can appreciate the help that good people give to each other - and to all members of the community.

One last thing. I know that it might come too early in February for readers of this magazine, but February 2nd is a special Christian feast of hope: it has always had three titles, depending on which bit of the gospel story you want to stress. Mary & Joseph took the 40-day-old baby Jesus to be *presented* in the Temple, as was the custom when a baby boy was the 'first fruits' of the marriage. At the same time, Mary was 'purified' in the Jewish tradition after the 'unclean-ness' (as they saw it) of the childbirth. Finally, they met the old prophet Simeon, who said that the child would be "the Light of the Gentiles". Thus, Feb 2nd can be called "The Presentation", "The Purification" or "Candlemas Day" (from the old way of lighting) – depending on your stress. It's a nice occasion, and marks the absolute end of the Christmas season in our churches.

Happy Lent, everyone, and keep smiling – whatever the weather!



CLIMATE CORNER

Climate Corner: After all the delicious snacks and sweets of Christmas, you may like to know that the shop, Matthias Winter, in Hexham are collecting plastic tubs! They can take chocolate, sweets and cheese biscuit tubs/lids for recycling via a scheme with Greene King. If you would like to salve your conscience after over indulging at Christmas (!), you have until the 11th Feb to drop your clean containers at the shop and they'll get them to The Black Bull pub in Corbridge, or you can drop them off at the pub yourselves. It's a great scheme as the plastic gets recycled and Macmillan Cancer Support benefits too - to the tune of £11,308 over the past 2 years. Almost 50,000 tubs have been recycled in the last couple of years so it's definitely worth it. The shop also takes wine corks, used stamps, inkjet printer cartridges and uncoloured candle wax. Happy Recycling!

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER 2024

Celebrated on the first Friday of March each year, the World Day of Prayer (WDP) has its roots deep in the Ecumenical Women's Missionary Movement of the late 19th and early 20th centuries. In 1926, North American women called for an official World Day of Prayer and the first formal WDP was celebrated around the world in 1927. The movement aims to bring together women of various races, cultures and traditions in a yearly common Day of Prayer, as well as in closer fellowship, understanding and action throughout the rest of the year.

Such has been the success of the movement and the desire of women around the world to work together to foster an outlook of understanding and tolerance, that the initiative has grown steadily throughout the years and is now celebrated in over 170 countries.

Every year, worship services focus on a different country and a specific theme. The World Day of Prayer National and Regional Committees of that country prepare the order of worship on these themes to be used on the next World

Day of Prayer. On the first Friday of March, then, in services all over the world that selected country becomes the focus of prayer and understanding all over the world. Through preparation and participation in the worship services, participants worldwide learn how the women of other countries, languages and cultures understand the biblical passages in their own unique context. They learn of the concerns and needs of those women and to empathise and feel in solidarity with them.

In 2024, the WDP falls on 1st March with the selected country being Palestine and the theme being "I Beg You... Bear With One Another in Love".

The day will be celebrated in various churches in our area, amongst which are Bellingham and Otterburn.

The Otterburn WDP will be at 6pm on Friday 1st March at St. Peters Catholic Church in Otterburn and the Bellingham service will be at 7pm in the Methodist United Reformed Church (MURC).


learners" rather than "verbal learners". Curious? You can watch it yourself online any time at https://skitguys.com/videos/come-thou-long-expected-jesus.
