Hale U3A

Over recent years I have heard the term University of the Third Age (U3A) bandied around but have never bothered to investigate what it is really all about. All this changed a couple of months ago when I was contacted by David Zucker who became Chair of the Hale U3A in June and is keen to spread the word to the Hale and surrounding communities, attracting younger as well as older new members.

Founded in 1982, U3A is a UK-wide movement of more than 1000 locally run interest groups which provide the opportunity for people who are no longer in full-time employment to come together to learn for fun. Nationally, there are over 450,000 members.

Members explore new ideas, skills and activities together. There are no exams to pass. It costs £15 to join Hale U3A, comprising a £12 annual membership fee and a £3 joining fee. In subsequent years, only the annual membership fee is required. In addition, there is sometimes a small contribution towards the costs of interest group meetings, for example if rooms have to be hired.

Monthly Speakers Meetings of the Hale U3A, which was set up in 2011, are held in the Marquee Room of Bowdon Rugby Club on Clay Lane, Timperley. When I attended the October monthly meeting, David explained that with over 800 members, this particular group had outgrown their former home at St Peter's Assembly Rooms. The fascinating talk I attended, along with about 75 other people, was given by well-known local historian, Keith Warrender, on the subject of "The lost district of Manchester": the area that was cleared in the heart of Manchester in the 1970s to make way for the Arndale Centre. The charge for attending the monthly talks is £1 to help to cover the hire of the premises.

Hale U3A has over 70 interest groups, which all members are welcome to join. These range from Antiques and Collectibles to Astronomy, Art Appreciation to Painting, Canasta to Enjoying Music, Photography to Psychology, Astronomy to Science, Badminton to Table Tennis, and many others. Interest groups draw on the knowledge, experience and skills of the members of the group, which means that learning is often self-directed within the group and members are free to decide for themselves what the group wants to learn and how it will do so. In many cases, there is no expert or teacher within the group.

However, some groups are formed because there is a member who has a great deal of knowledge, expertise or skill about a subject and is happy to share that within a group. As it is the ethos of U3A for members to share and exchange knowledge freely, there is no fee paid to group leaders, regardless of their professional qualifications and background. Groups normally meet on weekdays in people's homes, cafes or halls, depending on numbers.

What did I take away from my afternoon with Hale U3A? I was particularly struck by the enthusiasm of the members I had the opportunity to chat with after Keith's talk. I met a Bowdon couple who explained that, despite being absolute beginners, they had been able to join one of the three ukelele groups rather than have to wait for a new group to start, thanks to their teacher who gave them some basic lessons to bring them up to the standard of the rest of the group.

I was reminded that Hale U3A is there for the benefit of its members and is prepared to grow, when David explained that members are encouraged to suggest a new group which would interest them. Efforts are made to bring people together with a similar interest, and to set up a group if at all possible. On the Hale U3A website, for example I see that one of the members is currently interested in getting a Heritage Pub group set up.

The lady I sat next to during Keith's talk enthused about the day trips organised by the groups, such as the recent outing to Capesthorne Hall near Macclesfield. She also made the point that having moved to this area some years ago from the south of England, she had found that joining Hale U3A had been a wonderful way for her to make friends.

The social side of the charity is very important: David reminded me that recently it was reported that up to 20% of GP appointments are taken by people who are experiencing loneliness or are struggling with other non-medical issues such as problems concerning debt, relationships or housing.

I have no doubt that anyone interested in joining Hale U3A would be made most welcome. As David Zucker says, "We are committed to life-long learning, but without taking ourselves too seriously." Hale Tidy-Ups

Sunday 4th February sees the first of the St Peter's litter picks of 2024. One of the Sunday afternoon sessions is scheduled every six to eight weeks to help keep Hale looking its best. A couple of hours of tidying is followed by tea, cake, and conversation back at St Peter's House.

Led by our old friend, the late Keith Neal, a number used their £5 'talent' to purchase litter-picking equipment. And off we went.

As well as the tidying up, the litter picks show a church community getting things done. Getting their hands dirty, even. Enquiries about who we are and where we are from provide a good introduction to St Peter's.

So, from 2pm, report to St Peter's House (corner of Ashley Road and Murieston Road). You will be issued with plastic sacks, hoops, hi-vis jackets, and litter pickers for clearing rubbish from the streets of Hale. Bring your own rubber gloves.

Return to St Peter's House where tea and cake are served from around 3.30pm.
