

DEVELOPMENTS IN OUR PARISH CHURCHES...

...changes but also no change! Recently, we were clearing out some old papers in one of the local churches and we found a Bellingham Deanery Church magazine from 1973. There was one magazine for all of the churches of this area, and there were 13 clergymen in full time posts to look after the 19 parishes! Today, in 2024, there are two full time clergy posts to look after all 19 churches - so the two of us each have many churches and people to care for.

In the busy lives we all lead, church going has been squeezed out of many people's lives, and therefore numbers of regular church goers has dropped, but most folk will find themselves inside one of our beautiful churches from time to time, for a baptism, a wedding, or a funeral, even if they don't come regularly. The dedicated folk in each area fund and care for their local church as there is no external funding for parish churches.

Though there are just two full-time vicars, covering the area from Wall up to Carter Bar, we still have the same parish system, where everyone - wherever they live in this area - is part of one of the Church of England parishes. For example, the parish of Chollerton covers the villages of Barrasford, and Gunnerton, as well as the hamlets of Colwell, Chollerton, and Barrasford Park, and all the farms and houses between.

Reverend Claire Maxim, in the North of the Deanery, looks after 9 churches and I look after 10 in the South. As you might imagine there is **a lot** of administration and many meetings, even though some churches and parishes are grouped together. In order to try to simplify the administration and therefore give us a little more time to do visiting etc., plus engaging in other community things that clergy would love to have time to do, we are trying to change the groupings of parishes. We hope that the three groups of parishes in the south of the Deanery, comprising the group with Chollerton, Gunnerton, Thockrington and Birtley, the group with Wall, Bingfield and Heavenfield, and the group with Humshaugh, Simonburn and Wark will be dissolved as groups, and will all be put together into one larger group. It will not affect how the churches are run but it will lessen the amount of administration that goes on behind the scenes.

In the North of the Deanery, the parishes have been grouped together already and so, when all the paperwork has been considered and been passed it will mean we have two large groups of churches making up our area, rather than multiple smaller groups, who are already working together. It is not likely that the number of clergy will increase above 2, as locally we cannot manage to pay for any more, but the wonderful thing is that everyone is working together to make sure the churches are alive and open and welcoming.

NEWS FROM BELLINGHAM



THE END IS NIGH... Yes, the end of the work in the church is within sight. All the new heaters are fitted and checked to confirm they working. They are very unobtrusive; some are hidden by the pews and others cleverly colour-coordinated to match walls or woodwork. The slight problem is that we need a new meter to allow us to use the full system. However, even with half of the system working it is proving very effective. Getting a new meter is frustratingly difficult as you must navigate through the online chat box of the electricity supplier to find the person who can organise the work. However, things are now moving in the right direction and by the time we write next month's news we should be able to say that the heating system is fully functioning.

The work in the transept: moving the vestry partition one metre north to make the vestry slightly larger, removing all the pews and tiling the floor, is almost completed. The space created by removing the pews will make it easier to serve coffee after services and allow us to have exhibitions in conjunction with the Bellingham Heritage Centre. Chairs will be provided so that small meetings can take place in the area. Access to the area has also been made easier by removing the front two pews on the south side of the Nave.

As you would expect all this work has created a fair amount of dust so a major cleaning operation will be required before we can open the church for public access. On the plus side the organ was fully covered before any work started so it should be in working order when the covers are removed. The contractor is going to bring an industrial vacuum and an industrial floor cleaner to clean up before finishing the work. This should make the final cleaning a lot easier, but we will still need a team of volunteers to polish and dust to get the church into pristine order.

TAKE A PEW

We have a few spare pews for sale. The pews are Victorian pitch pine and come in various sizes as they were all hand-made to fit the church.

The sizes of the pews are detailed below and can be viewed by appointment, please contact one of the churchwardens. You should note that we are not able to provide transport.

Four pews approx. 5ft 2in long, 2 pews approx. 8ft 4in long, 1 pew approx. 7ft 8in long, 2 pews approx. 6ft 4in long.

THE MONTANE SPINE RACE AT BYRNESS...as you are all probably aware, the Spine Race was a great success even in the most dreadful conditions for the runners. Sub-zero temperatures over the 268 miles made the going difficult, but at least most completed before Storm Isha hit. Jack Scott, the overall winner, knocked a staggering ten hours off the last record, completing the 268 miles on only 54 minutes' sleep in the 72 hours 55 minutes he took to complete the race. Yes, he is human...honest!

St.Francis was used as a rest hub, and at one point we had 11 competitors sleeping in the Church. We provided tea and coffee and a kettle, of which they were most appreciative. The Spine Race has certainly raised the profile of Byrness and St. Francis, as Bishop Helen-Ann followed the Race and emailed to say how brilliant that St. Francis was used for this purpose. We had so many lovely comments and we are delighted.

Oliver Hague, who runs Forest View Hostel, let the Montane organisers take over and it was used as a check-in and feeding station for the runners, before they came to St.Francis for a sleep. Oliver also completed the Northern Challenge end of the race.

The Village Hall housed the Safety Team, which was a great boost to the Hall finances, which struggle with low usage. They were so impressed and we hope they will be coming back for the Summer Race, which will be warmer but with extra MIDGES, and also the 2025 Winter Challenge.

Best wishes Barb **COUNTING BIRDS IN BYRNESS...**On 26th January St Francis took part in its second RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch, and not only were we able to compare our bird count to 2023, but we also found in the *History of the Berwickshire Naturalists' Club vol. XXX*, a list of birds that had been spotted in the area between 1936 and 1939. Perhaps it's not fair to compare too closely – the 1936 and 1938 articles were based on observations throughout the year (as is clear from the inclusion of swallows and house martins!) and tend to include the rarer birds – but still it is very interesting!

NEWS FROM CORSENSIDE

The deanery confirmation service at Byrness was a privilege to attend. Bishop Mark of Berwick gave a brilliant sermon and joked about the chilly atmosphere and how it could affect the baptismal font! The clergy were well represented and included Canon Sarah, Claire Maxim, and Frances Dower. All the clergy in our diocese need concentrated prayer at this time so please pray for strength and healing. It was a lovely and inclusive event and it was good to chat to the newly confirmed, and others, other refreshments provided at the impressively refurbished village hall (eco-friendly on all counts) — the renovations for which have been ongoing for several years.

Moving on, our parish clerk for Corsenside (Chris Woodcock of White Oak Studios) organised and ran a wonderful pinhole Cyanotype workshop in Otterburn Memorial Hall on Saturday 27^{th} January. Chris gave us excellent instructions and provided three sizes of picture frames for the completed works. Since only three out of five possibles attended, we had the added benefit of virtually one-to-one instructions. Initially the paper is given a chemical and water-based wash over the whole surface and can also be brushed with natural products such as beetroot, red wine, paprika, lily, turmeric, red cabbage, cherry or raspberry. Then the image created can be made up from the seaweed grass as dried flowers lichens mass etc. The work has to be exposed to sunlight for about eight weeks, being held firmly in place by the glass during this period. The results of the work take longer to develop in winter because of the darker days, but we look forward to seeing the completed effect when the work is unclipped!

On February 11th, it was good to see the Rev. Dr. Richard Virden conducting communion in our village hall of Corsenside. He has been isolating since Covid, but has stepped into the breach as the clergy and our diocese have been needing extra assistants due to illnesses. Heartfelt prayers are with them all and especially for the extra duties at the build up to Easter, preceded by lent and a more sombre mood. Richard gave an excellent sermon, linking the old testament reading about Elijah giving his gift of the young Elisha, and the chariot of fire coming down from heaven as an affirmation. It is obviously a spiritual experience linked to the later transfiguration on the mountain top, when Christ became glowing white and urged his companions not to mention this until the resurrection. There are at least three mentions of divine intervention in the gospels, all of which confirm that Jesus is the Christ child: "This is my son, in whom I am well pleased" as the heavens opened at his baptism; the disciples on the Emmaus road; and Paul's experience of blindness – "Paul, Paul, why do you persecute me?". Our prayers were

mirrored in the service itself and in the beautiful words of the lord's prayer in its traditional form. The service ended with light refreshments.

The northern leg of the Holy Cross pilgrimage will see the Pilgrims coming to west Woodburn for lunch on Tuesday of holy week. They travel all the way from Lanark cost priory and arrive at holy island on good Friday, stopping en route at various venues (next stop after Corsenside is at Holme Mill farm (Monkridge) for tea, followed by an overnight break in Elsdon). Offers of help from Andrea and Avril were very kindly given (and have been gratefully accepted), but any additional offers of help with refreshments would be very welcome.

In the meantime, welcome evidence of spring is all around, with buds beginning to open and daffodil heads appearing. It's a joy to see the aconites and snowdrops.

Christ of the green shoot, heal the violated moor, dismantle the rocket-launcher re-form the artillery, let the primrose take root, the lapwing guard its nest.


Christ of the mangled earth, we know this respite will end. You, the Paschal lamb, inhabit all suffering things, accompany each birth.
