The Long Winter's End

As I write this in mid-January, from my window I can see the roofs and paths are covered with a dusting of snow. Perhaps by now you are looking forward to the return of warmer weather, not least so we can keep our heating bills under control. The Old English word for spring was lencten, which comes from the same root as 'long' and 'lengthen.' It is also the word which gives us the name for Lent, the season in the church which leads up to Easter. We are already seeing the days growing longer, even if they are not yet much warmer. The coming of lighter evenings does not of course mean we have seen the back of wild weather – the Old English name for February quite possibly means 'mud-month'!

Yet as the month draws on, we will increasingly see signs of the arrival of spring: daffodils in the supermarket, crocuses in our gardens, and buds in the hedgerows. Anglo-Saxon writings describe the snow and ice of winter as 'frost's fetters'; when spring comes God releases the world from its captivity into new life. C.S. Lewis used this image in his book 'The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe.' When the White Witch is defeated by the lion Aslan, the snow which has covered Narnia for generations begins to melt.

We may not see so often the bitter winters of Anglo-Saxon times, and if we do most of us have the means to protect ourselves from the cold. But,

of course C.S. Lewis, and the Anglo-Saxons before him, were writing about more than the weather. They point us to the state of the human heart, turned away from God, imprisoned by sin and needing his rescue. As we begin Lent in the middle of February we are invited to spend time reflecting on our own lives, acknowledging our need of forgiveness and transformation. It is this, rather than the giving up of luxuries like chocolate or alcohol which is the real point of Lent.

On Ash Wednesday we are encouraged to look deep into our own hearts, acknowledging our frailty and inability to live the life we are called to. We receive the mark of the cross in ash on our foreheads, and hear these words: 'Remember you are dust and to dust you will return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ.' Each year this is for me an extremely sombre and yet very joyful moment.

For God is good, and he will forgive our sins when we turn to him. What's more, he promises to walk alongside us and to help us to be faithful. During Lent we don't stop with our failures, we look on towards the cross where Jesus gave himself for our freedom. I encourage you to share in this year's Group Ash Wednesday service which will be held at St George's Pontesbury on February 14th at 7pm. There, together, we will begin the journey which will end with the sadness of Good Friday and the celebrations of Easter Sunday.

Dear Friends

My oldest son's in-laws supposedly left their Methodist Church in South Wales and have subsequently been dechurched because they were always being asked for money. I know nothing of that church's circumstances, but inevitably my sympathies are with their Minister. It's true: the Church always needs money. We have to pay our ministers (not very much I promise you); mend leaky roofs and attend to the repointing of buttresses (I didn't know that was a thing until I was ordained); pay increasingly extortionate energy bills, insurance and all those consumables (bread, wine, candles, paper, coffee and biscuits).

Sometimes we ask for money directly. I suspect the days when the Rector has the temerity to pass the plate around twice because there are insufficient contributions the first time round, are now gone. However I once spent a sabbatical attending a Pentecostal Church in Bedworth and recall that the exhortation prefacing the passing round of the plate was as long as the sermon (and they preach for a long time in Pentecostal churches). We produce leaflets, publish targets, and mention casually in sermons how much the church is affected by the cost-of-living crisis. Indirectly, the message can be even louder. An exhausting programme of social events often proclaims not so much that we are a church that likes to have fun, but rather we are a church that needs money. The inevitable raffle is the clincher.


And so it is that people who never set foot in church will proclaim confidently that "the church is always after our money".


What if we were to be more effective in telling a different story? In response to a God who gave us everything including His own Son (Romans 8 v.32) we are a church that overwhelmingly gives to our community rather than takes from it. This generosity is exemplified by the building being available for funerals and weddings irrespective of whether a family attends church or makes a financial contribution to it. That building is likely to

have been lovingly cleaned and decorated with flowers arranged by a team of volunteers, freely giving of their time.

By the same token, the church runs toddler groups and foodbanks; offers bereavement support and drop-in groups. Its ministers visit the sick, support our schools, counsel the distressed and pray for their people, all freely given. These are things that people take for granted or are unaware of. How do we therefore persuade people to say, "the church is always after our money so that it can continue to exhibit such reckless generosity to our community"?

Christians in Mauritania arrested for apostasy are released by authorities

Christians in Mauritania are thankful for answered prayer after believers arrested for apostasy from Islam and proselytism were released on 18th December 2023. At least fifteen believers were arrested after a video of a baptism ceremony held in November was posted on social media and led to protests calling for their killings.

Mauritania is almost 100% Muslim and is one of the few countries in the world where a postasy is punishable by death in line with sharia, although no known



executions for leaving Islam have occurred in recent years.

Praise God for the Christians' release. Ask God for protection for the small but growing number of Christian converts in Mauritania and pray for the repeal of laws that make both blasphemy and apostasy from Islam mandatory capital offences.

Pakistani Christian widow acquitted of "blasphemy"

Musarrat Bibi, a Christian widow, along with Mohammad Sarmad, a Muslim man, have been acquitted of "blasphemy" charges relating to their work at the Government Girls' Higher Secondary School in the Pakpattan District of Punjab, Pakistan. They were asked to clear a storeroom and discarded and burnt some wastepaper. As both employees are illiterate they did not know what was written on the papers.

On 19th April 2023 they were arrested and charged with "blasphemy" for desecrating the Quran, which their accusers said they had been burning pages from. On 8th December the judge at the district Court of Additional Sessions dismissed the charges. Give thanks for this significant ruling proving the innocence of Musarrat and her colleague. Pray that they will be protected from any backlash from extremists and will be able to resume their employment unhindered.

Attacks on Christian communities in Borno and Yobe states, Nigeria, leave more than 20 dead

Fourteen men were killed in co-ordinated attacks by Islamist militants on Christian communities in Chibok Local Government Area in Borno State, north-eastern Nigeria on New Year's Day 2024. The attacks in Gatamwarwa and Ntisha followed a raid in Pemi on 19th December in which three men were killed. One woman was abducted in the Ntisha attack. Several shops were burned down in the raids.

In neighbouring Yobe State Islamist terrorists Boko Haram are suspected of murdering Pastor Luka Levong in Geidam on 5th January. Pastor Luka was shot dead at around 2am along with Maina Abdullahi, the church's treasurer. Four others were also killed. Several houses and a church were burned down when the terrorists invaded the community. Pray for the Lord's comfort for the bereaved families and for the church deprived of its shepherd. Ask that they will know God's strength and protection despite the ongoing violence.

Another Iranian convert summoned to begin her sentence

Another Iranian Christian convert received notice to begin her sentence in Evin Prison, Tehran, on 3rd January. Mina Khajavi, 60, was summoned to begin a six-year sentence for "acting against national security by promoting 'Zionist' Christianity". This is typical of the kind of accusation made against Iranian believers just for being active in "house churches". She was arrested in 2020 and sentenced in 2022 alongside Malihe Nazari, also sentenced to six years, and Pastor Joseph Shahbazian, who received a ten-year term.

Both Joseph and Malihe were released early from their sentences in 2023. However, Mina was deemed unfit to begin her sentence when her ankle was broken after she was run over by a car,. She was required to present herself to the prison within five days of the notice. Ask the Lord to sustain Mina in this ordeal. Pray that He will intervene to bring about her early release and that her medical needs will be fully addressed.



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



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The Trading Post re-opens on Saturday 3rd February. We are situated in the Old Station Buildings on Station Road; open every Saturday from 9.30am to 12 noon, from now until the end of October.

We have a good stock of seed potatoes as well as pea, bean and beetroot seeds, onion and shallot sets, plus plenty of all the other materials that you will need to get sowing and growing. The bulk delivery of multi-purpose potting compost has arrived and the usual offer of a reduced price for a multiple purchase is in place; we also have peat-free multi-purpose compost but this isn't on special offer due to the ongoing difficulty in obtaining sufficient supplies. The government ban on the sale of peat takes place at the end of 2024 so this year could be your opportunity to compare composts with and without peat.

As usual there will be people on hand to help carry the heavy stuff to your car.

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
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




A public meeting has been held by Middle Marches Community Land Trust to gauge public opinion on whether there would be interest in launching a fundraising appeal to purchase Minsterley Meadows as a community asset. The 13.5 acres have been put on the open market for £225k and is a protected SSSI site, which borders Callow Lane. It is special because of the rare Green-winged Orchids – the largest Green-winged Orchid site in Shropshire. Over 100 people attended the meeting and a small number agreed to form a Working Group, to see if the project can The Parish council agreed to be progressed. discuss supporting the funding for Hall meeting fees and publicity, but have no capital funds to put towards a fundraising appeal.

Problems caused by recent heavy rainfall would be reported to the relevant authorities.


The missing Highway lighting columns should be replaced during the next few weeks.

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A Parliament of Rooks



Although February usually feels far from spring, it is the month when rooks usually start to build their nests, although sometimes they start in January. Many churchyards contain rookeries, situated within tall deciduous trees and a great deal of fun can be had in watching the antics of the rooks. Rooks make their nests from small branches and twigs and can be seen flying in with suitable material but also pinching particularly nice ones from the neighbours! A winter storm can seriously disrupt this nest building activity and send them back to the beginning with a great deal of chatter and fuss.

Rookeries may contain a few nests or sometimes up to a thousand and, once established, a rookery may last for centuries in the same location. Rooks are sociable and as well as nesting together they often feed in groups, eating a wide variety of foods including invertebrates pulled from the soil by their large, strong beaks. They will also eat fruit, seeds, acorns and grain and can visit


garden bird feeders, taking hold of them with their feet rather like a parrot. Mixed flocks of rooks and jackdaws can be seen flying around, calling prior to going to roost. The collective nouns for a group of rooks are a parliament, congregation or clamour!

Rooks and crows can appear quite similar until you look and listen closely. A rook has a domed forehead and greyish face, its leg feathers give it 'baggy trousers'. Crows are sleeker, tend to nest singly and are often seen in twos or threes but rarely in larger flocks. Both birds have a cawing call, but crows have a harsher note and tend to repeat the call three times, whilst rooks use a wider variety of sounds and pitches including some clicks and wheezing sounds. Rooks and crows belong the to Corvid family which also includes ravens, jays, magpies and choughs. Take a look at the Caring for God's Acre website for a Spotter's Guide to Corvids.

Please let us know if you have a rookery within your local churchyard or cemetery and take a moment to think how many generations of rooks may have nested there.

From the Archdeacon of Hereford

Ash Wednesday this year will fall on the 14th February which of course is also St Valentine's day! Ash Wednesday is traditionally the beginning of Lent and this has been marked over the years as a period of self-discipline, fasting and spiritual journeying. It is a period of penitence and selfexamination and seeing ourselves from God's perspective. Even if we don't have a strong faith, we have learnt through the work of Educational Neuroscientists that intentional self-reflection helps us to learn and enhances how we apply, transfer, retain and recall new ideas and information.

The Bible recognises that as we go through life we will be tempted and tested and that our response to those times will help to shape the depth of our spiritual lives.

I am often astounded by the way many Christians have been shaped by sermons and theology that promise good things but never talk about the cost of following Jesus. The writer and theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer called this a theology of cheap grace:

> "Cheap grace is the grace we bestow on ourselves. Cheap grace is the preaching of forgiveness without requiring repentance, baptism without church discipline, Communion without confession, absolution without personal confession. Cheap grace is grace without discipleship, grace without the cross, grace without Jesus Christ living and incarnate."

Lent gives us an opportunity to realign our lives with God's values, it gives us a prolonged and focussed time to reflect and pray and to read the Bible and deepen our faith. The 40-day period is time enough to build in new habits and actions into our lives, which will have a lasting effect.

With ongoing war in Ukraine, the conflict between Israel & Hamas and so much uncertainty in our world I am finding that there is a great deal of anxiety in society about the future and a sense of aimlessness and general anger and tiredness.

Lent gives us as Christians an opportunity to give these feelings back to God and to ask him to heal and restore us. It is also, as Paul reminds us, a time to recognise that our human experiences are common and that whilst heightened by the personal challenges or world events, are not unique to us; but the difference is that our faith will endure.

> "No temptation has overtaken you that is not common to all. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tempted beyond your ability, but with the temptation he will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it." (1 Corinthians 10:13).

As Christians, whilst we can use this time for reflection, we also know how the story ends and we have an enduring hope within us because Jesus has conquered death and brought forgiveness to us. We are forever Easter people who live in the light of the resurrection, and we can mark Lent because of his sacrifice for us. The rhythm of the spiritual and liturgical year is a helpful tool to remind us that there is a cost and a purpose to our faith, which is not about self-benefit and self-fulfilment but about generosity, servant heartedness and a simple humbler faith. As Christians, we have a message of hope for a better future, and Lent gives us the perfect opportunity to prepare our hearts and minds to share the good news.


