

Father Chris writes

Growing up, my father had a collection of DVDs which he loved to watch with us children. These were the old comedy stars such as Laurel and Hardy, Buster Keaton and his favourite Charlie Chaplin. On a wet winter's day, we could gather as a family and enjoy that wonderful simple, yet so funny humour. My father would read about these comedy stars, their life journeys and rise to fame.

Charlie Chaplin had a hard life. His father was an alcoholic and abandoned by his father. He was left with his brother Sydney and his devoutly Anglican mother. and essentially learned to fend for himself as a busker and vaudeville performer on the streets of London. In 1910, Chaplin came to America with a vaudeville troupe and by 1912 he had signed on with Mack Sennett's Keystone film studio. Chaplin created the Character of the Little Tramp while working at Keystone in 1917, he signed with First National Films for the unheard-of amount of one million dollars. In 1921, he wrote and produced his first fully realized feature film of the Little Tramp, 'The Kid', which made Chaplin the biggest international film star of all time.

Working slowly and methodically, between 1923 and 1952, he only produced eight feature films, but most of them - including 'The Gold Rush' (1925), 'City Lights' (1931) and 'Modern Times' (1936) - are still recognized as comedic masterpieces.

Chaplin planned his elaborate comedy routines in solitude for months in advance, creating for the character of the Little Tramp a persona that transcends the screen and that continues to delight audiences. His peers at that time were more interested in performance and theme and were still pioneering advances in camera work and editing.

My father's favourite Chaplin film was the Little Tramp, as a family we found it wonderful to watch. In the film Chaplin represents human dignity and ingenuity in the face of often cruel and unfair odds. In the character of the Little Tramp, audiences see the characteristics they wish to possess, and witness as well their own faults and vulnerabilities. Chaplin's characterization allows the Little Tramp to become larger than life, even as he embodies life. And what he most embodies is decency, empathy, and kindness. What was so wonderful, for Chaplin, was cinema became the means by which he espoused his faith in both God and humanity.

Chaplin had many Catholic friends, and often thought about faith and religion, frequently about Catholicism. Despite how much this appealed to him he never converted. He remained deeply committed to Christianity and the ideal that 'We live by faith more than we think and achieve by it more than we realize. I believe that faith is the precursor of all our ideas ... to deny faith is to refute oneself and the spirit that generates all our creative forces.' Charlie Chaplin lived for 88 years. He left us 4 statements:

- (1) Nothing is forever in this world, not even our problems.
- (2) I love walking in the rain be cause no one can see my tears.

- (3) The most lost day in life is the day we don't laugh.
- (4) Six best doctors in the world...:
- 1. The sun
- 2. Rest
- 3. Exercise
- 4. Diet
- 5. Self-respect
- 6. Friends

Stick to them at all stages of your life and enjoy a healthy life...

If you see the moon, you will see the beauty of God...

If you see the sun, you will see the power of God...

If you see a mirror, you will see God's best creation. So, believe it.

An East Anglian Saint

On 8th May 1980 Mother Julian of Norwich was commemorated as a saint for the first time by the Church of England and as we reach the 600th anniversary of her death it seems fitting to celebrate her wonderful insight.

Born in 1342, she lived through some terrible events: The Black Death killed both her husband and daughter, and there were famines, war with France, the persecution of the Lollards and the Peasants' Revolt. She saw appalling suffering and became very ill herself. During her illness she was granted holy visions — sixteen *shewings* - and then spent twenty years as an anchorite, or hermit, trying to interpret and understand what God had shown her. In her writing she insists that we should see God primarily as all loving: we are enfolded by His love.

'He is our clothing. In his love he wraps and holds us. He enfolds us for love and he will never let is go. I saw that he is to us everything that is good.'

From the window of her cell, she spoke to visitors, the bereft, and the bewildered, and counselled them; helping them to face the difficulties of life. 'God said not "Thou shalt not be tempested, thou shalt not be afflicted" but "Thou shalt not be overcome."'

Julian's world was as marked by aggression, insecurity and change as our world is today. Her most famous words - born of intense personal suffering - 'All shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well,' are as much needed today and as true now as when she wrote them. If we can, like Julian, dwell in the knowledge of Gods love then we can go on our way rejoicing.

'He showed me a little thing, the size of a hazelnut, in the palm of my hand, and it was as round as a ball. I looked at it with my mind's eye and I thought, "What can this be?" and the answer came, "It is all that is made." I marvelled that it could last, for I thought it might have crumbled to nothing, it was so small. And the answer came into my mind, "It lasts and ever shall because God loves it" and all things have being through the love of God.

In this thing I saw three truths. The first is that God made it. The second is that God loves it. The third is that God looks after it.'

By writing or dictating what she came to understand, Saint Julian left two books of *The Revelations of Divine Love* behind when she died in her cell during the early 1420's. These are the first books known to have been written by a woman in English. Her words have comforted and inspired millions of people in the centuries that followed. In Rouen Road in Norwich, there is a reconstruction of her cell on the original site, using some of the original foundations. It is furnished as a chapel and a place of pilgrimage. Like our own churches, it provides a space where we can be still - can listen and reflect.

It is hard for me to imagine being shut in such a small room for twenty years. BUT: we all live in that small space inside our own minds. Do we, like Julian, share that space with our God? Or do we make that cell like Sartre's Huis Clos - an anxious and miserable place.

'This is the cause why we are not at rest in heart and soul: that here we seek those things that are so little there is no rest in them and we do not know our God who is all mighty, all wise and all good. No soul can have rest until it finds that created things are empty.... The best prayer is to rest in the goodness of God knowing that that goodness can reach right down to the lowest depths of need.'

The Completeness and Wholeness of Christ

The number seven is at the centre of God's Creation which took seven days -six days of work plus a day of rest, hence the Sabbath, the day put aside for spiritual refreshment through worshipping God, and resting our bodies and minds. The ancient Jews were reminded of this through the seven branches of the menorah used inside the temple. The oil lamps allude to the branches of human knowledge, represented by the six lamps inclined inwards towards, and symbolically guided by, the light of God represented by the central lamp. It also symbolizes the creation in seven days, with the centre lamp representing the Sabbath. The seven branched menorah is not to be confused with the nine branched menorah used outside the temple.

There are seven musical harmonics; seven phases of the moon, seven days in the week, surfers look for the seventh wave because it is the biggest; there are seven colours in a rainbow; seven diatomic elements that are fundamental to life on earth; seven deadly sins of lust, gluttony, greed, laziness, wrath, envy, and pride; seven ancient natural wonders of the world, and seven continents. There can be little doubt that seven is God's number for Creation!

In the Hebrew Bible, the word seven means wholeness and completeness, thus we see that 7x7, which equals 49, is the greatest wholeness and completeness possible. For Jesus, his physical ministry on earth was completed in a period of 49 days which included his crucifixion, resurrection and ascension to heaven. The completion was sealed with God's gift of the Holy Spirit to his followers on the next day, the 50th day, which, not by chance, was the Jewish feast of Shavuot celebrated on the 50th day after Passover. Shavout is also known as the 'Feast of Weeks' or the 'Feast of 50 days' hence the adoption by the Christian church of the Greek name for 50th, *pentēkostē*, from which derives the name, Pentecost.

In the UK, in the days when Christians were baptised and confirmed into the Church at Pentecost it also became known as Whit Sunday or Whitsun, the name being derived from the fact the candidates being baptised and confirmed would wear white clothes, a symbol of purity that dates from ancient Egypt and Rome. The Pope, for example, has worn white since 1566, as a symbol of purity and sacrifice. Likewise, the day Jesus ascended to heaven is sometimes known as Whit Thursday – and sometimes Holy Thursday.

Whichever way you look at the Ascension and Pentecost, their timing is clearly a very powerful message of God's purpose for his Creation revealed to us through the completeness and wholeness of Christ.

Round up of other news:

Following on from the successful pilot group last term, we would like to offer Kintsugi youth wellbeing groups to schools and to run it in the community too. Chaplaincy continues weekly at Stour Valley Community School and Castle Manor Academy. I have recently met with a girl at one of the schools who has suffered with a condition since she was two years old. This can sometimes be painful and will get worse that she gets older. **Please pray** with me for her and also for several students, whose parents have split up in recent times, as they deal with the emotional and practical effects.

SPACE our 'questions of the week' remain ever popular, this week I was asked about a question about love, with most students saying that they would prioritise someone spending quality time with them as a demonstration of their love (even over being given gifts!). **Please pray** that these students will come to know that there is a living God, who loves them completely and perfectly and desires to spend quality time with them forever.

Illuminate Youth Group has been doing some sessions from Open Doors this term. This is an organisation who support persecuted Christians around the world. Our sessions are aimed at being inspired by the faith of those who risk losing their families, livelihoods and even their lives to follow Jesus.

One-to-one mentoring continues every Thursday. I am available to support other young people outside of school. Please do get in touch if you think this might be useful for a young person you know of.

New British Youth for Christ strategy. At our staff conference this year we heard more details on the focus of the work for British Youth for Christ our 'parent' organisation. They have sought God's will over the last couple of years and are feeling the call to more actively support local churches to carry out youth work. It is recognised that many churches have few or no young people in them at the moment and the national team, along with our local centres, are keen to help churches think about how they can do some youth work. However scary or impossible that might seem, it all starts with prayer!


