The Davidic Covenant and a New Covenant

Samuel was the last of the line of Judges who had been military leaders chosen by God to lead the Israelites in times of danger, generally when they had forgotten their dependence on the Lord. Othniel was the first Judge who brought peace to the Israelites for forty years having delivered them from eight years of oppression by Cushan-Rishathaim, king of Mesopotamia. [Judges 3: 7-11]

When Samuel grew old he appointed his sons Joel and Abijah as leaders of Israel. However, they 'turned aside after dishonest gain and accepted bribes and perverted justice' [1 Samuel 8: 1-3]

The elders of the people came to Samuel and asked him to appoint a king to lead them so that they would be like the other local tribes. [1 Samuel 8: 4,5]. Samuel was not pleased but took the situation to the LORD in prayer. The comforting response from the LORD emphasised that, as they had done many times since leaving Egypt, they were rejecting the LORD rather than Samuel himself. Through Samuel, the LORD spoke to the people and warned them of the consequences of installing a king, but they refused to listen. [1 Samuel 8: 10-19]

The LORD then chose Saul, son of Kish who is described as *a man of standing in the tribe of Benjamin* [1 Samuel 9: 1,2] and brought him to Samuel. Samuel anointed Saul with oi to signify that he had been chosen to lead the Israelites. The people accepted Saul as king [1 Samuel 10: 23] and, following Saul's defeat of the Ammonites, confirmed Saul as king. [1 Samuel 11: 15]

It would not last. Despite further victories in battle, Saul did not fully follow the LORD during his reign as king which led to his rejection by the LORD. [1 Samuel 15: 26] and the LORD regretted that He had made Saul king of Israel. [1 Samuel 15: 35]

It is at this point that David came on the scene. He was the youngest of the eight sons of Jesse, the grandson of Ruth and Boaz. Samuel was sent by the LORD to Bethlehem where the family lived and anointed David [1 Samuel 16: 13].

Saul was tormented by an evil spirit from the LORD [1 Samuel 16: 14] and David was recruited to be with Saul and play music on a lyre to sooth Saul's torment [1 Samuel 18: 23]

Some time later after what could be described a rocky relationship, Saul was being chased by the Philistines and, during fierce fighting, Saul was critically wounded and 'fell on his sword' and died [1 Samuel 31: 4].

David was anointed as king of the tribe of Judah [2 Samuel 2: 1] and Saul's surviving son, Ish-Bosheth, was appointed king over the remaining tribes. A state of war was established between the two factions which lasted for a long time. [2 Samuel 3: 1] During this time David's influence grew and that of Ish-Bosheth declined to such a state that Ish-Bosheth became disheartened. Ish-Bosheth was assassinated and the tribes of Israel came to David to ask him to become their ruler. David made a covenant with them before the LORD at Hebron and became king over all the tribes of Israel.

The LORD established a covenant with David that "Your house and your kingdom will endure forever before me; your throne will be established forever." [2 Samuel 7: 16] This covenant became the basis of the hope for a Messiah and with the earlier Covenants with Noah, Abraham and Moses establish a context for the various writing in our Bible and are fundamental to our understanding of them.

In this week's Old Testament reading we read " 'The days are coming,' declares the LORD, 'when I will make a new covenant with the people of Israel' " [Jeremiah 31: 31] This new Covenant is fulfilled in the blood of Christ. In the account of the last meal that Jesus shared with his disciples He said "This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins." [Matthew 26: 28]

Fifth Sunday of Lent Collect

Gracious Father, you gave up your Son out of love for the world: lead us to ponder the mysteries of his passion, that we may know eternal peace through the shedding of our Saviour's blood, Jesus Christ our Lord.
