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An ending, a single word and a beginning...

Picture the scene: it us the day before the Sabbath in Jerusalem. A man who had ridden into Jerusalem a few days early to public acclaim had been sentenced to die on a cross along with two other convicted criminals. At noon, darkness had fallen over the city and in mid-afternoon, the earth shook and the Curtain of the Temple was torn in two. At that same time the man on the cross had called out 'It is finished;' [John 19: 30]. The Old Testament Prophets had pointed to this single event when Jesus 'bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that we might die to sins and live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed'. [1 Peter 2: 24] Joseph of Arimathea, a follower of Jesus and member of the Sanhedrin. asked Pilate for the body of Jesus and, with Nicodemus, hastily took it and placed it in a tomb because the start of the Sabbath Day was imminent. The High Priests insisted that the stone over the tomb entrance was sealed, and a guard placed on it to prevent the disciples removing the body and claiming that, in line with His own words, Jesus had been resurrected. On the day after the Sabbath, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Salome went back to the tomb with more spices to anoint the body of Jesus. When they reached the tomb, they found the stone rolled away and the guards missing. On entering the tomb, they were alarmed to see a young man in white sitting there. [Mark 16: 1-4] He told them that Jesus had risen from the dead. Mary returned to the disciples to tell them and Simon Peter and John came to investigate. Mary remained in the garden weeping. A man approached whom she did not recognise and asked her why she was crying. Mary replied that the body of her Lord had been removed. The single word 'Mary' from the man was enough for Mary to recognise Jesus. Mary replied 'Rabboni!' which translates as Teacher.

Mary returned to the Disciples with the news that she had seen Jesus. Later that same evening, the Disciples were together in a locked room for fear of the Jewish leaders. Jesus appeared amongst them and they were overjoyed. [John 20: 19]. It was to be just a few short weeks later that they were to receive the promised gift of the Holy Spirit and, after Peter' speech at Pentecost, began to grow in number to today's estimate of 2.4 billion or around 31 percent of the world's population.

Second Sunday of Easter Collect



The Apostle Thomas

Our first contact with the Thomas comes in the list of the first twelve Disciples chosen and commissioned by Jesus. [Matthew 10: 3].

Thomas was with Jesus and the other Disciples when they heard of the illness of Lazarus. When Jesus had last been in Judea, threats of violence had been made by the Jews. Despite this, Jesus intended to return to Bethany in Judea, the home of Lazarus and his sisters Martha and Mary and just two miles form Jerusalem. Thomas was the one who spoke up saying 'Let us also go, that we may die with him'. [John 11: 16]. By the time they arrived, Lazarus had died and had been in the tomb for four days. Many of the local Jews believed when Jesus brough Lazarus alive out of the tomb.

Later on, the Disciples had joined with Jesus in the Upper Room to celebrate Passover. After the meal Jesus once again predicted His betrayal and Peter's denial. Jesus continued with familiar words of comfort for his Disciples. He described the place to which He was going and where he would prepare places for them and concluded with 'You know the way to the place where I am going.'. [John 14:1-4]. Thomas was the one who expressed the thoughts of the rest by asking 'we don't know where you are going, so how can we know the way?' The answer given by Jesus is 'I am the way and the truth and the life'.

When the Disciples first met the Risen Jesus, we are told that Thomas was not with them. When Thomas received the news, he was sceptical and needed to see for himself. The following week, Jesus re-appeared when Thomas was with them and was give the chance to touch the physical wounds. Thomas made the immediate response 'my Lord and my God' [John 20: 28]. Our final mention of Thomas is with the gathered Disciples immediately after the Ascension. [Acts 1: 13]. Tradition has it that Thomas went on to spread the Gospel in India. Thomas was blessed because he had seen Jesus and believed; Are we within the rest who are blessed because we have not seen and yet have believed. [John 20: 29]
