

FROM THE RECTOR

To Mow or not to Mow; that is the Question!

When you look out at long grass studded with bluebells, what do you see? As I look out at the Rectory Garden, the early spring flowers have gone over, the bluebells are out in full force, and Comfrey and Dandelions abound. The more intentionally-placed perennials are spreading rapidly; there are Peonies, California Poppies, and Aquilegia. Snow-in-Summer (Cerastium) has suddenly provided a white carpet outside the dining room window!

The grass is getting longer. Should I mow it? The phrase "nomow May" resonates in my consciousness. In April, I read that it was too early to mow because frosts were still possible, and the health of the lawn (?) might be compromised. Am I simply happy to listen to excuses I can use to justify not getting the grass cut?

Last spring, John and I consulted with a local landscaper. They wanted hundreds of pounds to get the Rectory Garden into shape, and then hundreds more each month to maintain it! Quite apart from the cost being way beyond our budget, I am not really one for a "show-piece" garden. When the grass got too long and I began to feel overwhelmed, I took some advice and cut down swathes for grass to create paths and patterns within it. That seemed intentional!

There are some treasured Roses at strategic points around the gardens. John and his late sister Rosie planted them. John's working with our more elemental and naturalistic gardener to move the key bushes to our new garden. The Laurel bush by the boiler room, entwined with Honeysuckle, has been a great source of greenery for our flower team to help create their amazing displays. There are fig trees that have never produced figs, bamboo grasses that have grown sky high, and the faithful Hellebores that present a quiet show under the lime tree! To return to my opening question, "When should I get the grass cut?"

I put CoPilot to work to generate some internet search text on the subject. It came up with pros and cons for cutting the grass in May. Here is what it came up with as a conclusion: "Ultimately, whether you should mow your grass in May depends on your specific lawn care objectives and the environmental conditions in your area. Both mowing and not mowing have their benefits, so consider what aligns best with your goals. Remember, healthy lawn practices contribute not only to the appearance of your lawn but also to the local ecosystem."

Even though I had specifically used the term "grass", it seems that the idea of a "lawn" was more the focus. The Rectory Garden most definitely does not have a lawn! When will I get the grass cut? It hasn't quite reached the overwhelm stage yet, but when it does, I'll call the Council and hopefully they are still charging the same reasonable rates as last year!

In the meantime, the flowers will provide for beautifying the space inside the Rectory.

Meet me, O Christ in this stillness of morning. Move me, O Spirit, to quiet my heart. Mend me, O Father, from yesterday's harms.


From the discords of yesterday,
