VISION

Blackburn Diocese Vision Review: Consultation

Towards the end of 2024 each parish in the Blackburn diocese was asked to reflect on the diocese Vision 2026 through a consultation process. We were sent a document which presented a series of questions for us to reflect on; asking us to consider the things that have worked well since the Vision 2026 was launched 10 years ago, as well as the challenges. We were also asked to think prayerfully about where God may be steering our diocese in the future.

A thoughtful and detailed response was written by a small group of PCC members, which we submitted to the diocese vision team in December 2024. Using this feedback, the Blackburn diocese is now thinking about the direction and priorities beyond 2026, formulating a fresh vision. Our response was well received, with some of our feedback finding its way into the initial report that was presented to all the Deanery Synods in the New Year. It is good to feel that we have a part to play in helping shape the future direction of our diocese.



2024 VISION CHAMPION

WHO IS OUR VISION CHAMPION AND WHAT IS THE ROLE ABOUT?



Helen Wadeson took over from Margaret Foster as our parish Vision Champion in 2024. She has been working closely with Peter and the church wardens over the past 12 months to develop the role of Vision Champion, in line with the Blackburn diocese "Vision 2026" – to make disciples, be witnesses, grow leaders, and to inspire children and young people. Helen was introduced to the wider congregation on Sunday 15th September, giving her the opportunity to speak about what the role involves, and to share some of her aspirations.

Courses for nurturing Spiritual Growth

Following on from a successful Lent course held in the Old Boys' Grammar School in the spring, HTBLS hosted the 'Lectio Course' in the autumn term, a course which taught us new ways to explore the Bible. The course was hugely successful, with a number of people wanting to meet for additional one off 'Lectio Divina' sessions after the course had finished.





A new development in 2024 was the refurbishment of a dedicated Prayer room, next door to the Vicar's office. This prayer room is a quiet space that has been thoughtfully designed to encourage individual prayer or group prayer. Following the launch of the prayer room, HTBLS ran a 24hr prayer day in November. These are fantastic opportunities for people to sign up to 1 hr in the prayer room, completing a 24-hour period if all the slots are taken.

The 24hr prayer challenge was an extremely positive experience, and something that we want to continue offering. We would like to see the prayer room used more by individuals and groups as people become familiar with it. It is a good space for. small meetings also. A little prayer group continues to meet in the room every Tuesday evening at 7.45pm to intercede for our churches and our parish - anyone is welcome to join us.

2024 WORSHIP







Our worship continues to bring inspiration, encouragement, and encounter with Christ as we gather to worship the Lord throughout the year. Of note for 2024 is that we have had record attendance at the Wednesday morning services, clearing 50 on a couple of occasions. This simple, reflective service is much appreciated, with the cherished fellowship time afterwards also an integral part of the midweek experience.

In January 2024 we hosted a joint service with St Mary's RC Church and Christ Church URC for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. It is our intention that coming together with these other local congregations will become an annual tradition.











Cockle Pickers Commemoration 5th February 2024 marked the twenty year anniversary of the cockle pickers tragedy, an event which shook our local area. We ran a commemoration service down at the shore in partnership with St Luke's Slyne, remembering those who perished, and praying for greater justice in our world.









Other notable occasions include the Confirmation service with Bishop Jill Duff in March, Harvest Festival in September, and Safeguarding Sunday in November. In a year where abuse scandals have rocked the Church of England - leading to the resignation of the Archbishop of Canterbury - we are making Safeguarding Sunday a priority in our calendar. The feedback from these services has been positive.

Peter-John Davies licensed as ALM In September Peter-John was licensed as an 'Authorised Lay Minister' at Blackburn Cathedral, following 12 months of training and study. We are delighted to recognise Peter-John's ministry among us, now in a more official capacity.



Christmas

Our Christmas services were once again well supported and appreciated. After restarting the Midnight Communion service two years ago, numbers crept up to 60 this year, which is pretty good for that time of night! It seems that the invitation to wear Christmas pyjamas is proving a hit.



Music and Choir

The choir has rehearsed and sang for Easter and Christmas once again. It was a joy this year to have Matthew Scarr lift our Crib Service with his drumming - what a fantastic sound it was!

Over the last 12-18 months it has become normal to hear Elaine Jones' lovely violin playing within most of our services. The power of music to touch the soul goes beyond anything that our words might express, and we are grateful to have Elaine and Sandie working together regularly to lift our musical worship.

2024 ST MARKS- NETHER KELLET



St Mark's is a unique potential asset to this parish. It sits in our church parish and its members sit on our PCC. Sadly, the building is looking rundown. Its modesty does not do credit to the faithful witness of many years, and particularly that of the last decade when a few stalwarts have been determined to keep it going.



We continue to address emergent work, and the items categorised as urgent in the Quinquennial Inspection Report (QI). The next QIRs are due in January 2028. Outstanding urgent item identified is the structural and damp issues for St. Marks. The Central heating system has been repaired.

St Marks Feasibility study

A sub-committee of the PCC was set up in June 2024 to look at the future of St Marks. It had a number of objectives:

- To survey the perspectives of the current congregation of St Mark's, and members of Holy Trinity, Bolton-le-Sands.
- To survey the perspectives of the members of the village of Nether Kellet
- To accept input from other interested parties.



- St Mark's can fulfil the objectives of the Blackburn Diocese "Vision Plan 2026."
- St Mark's can fulfil the Parish of Holy Trinity and St Mark's local vision "Three Pillars".

A successful social evening was organised in November, with some input from local village residents. Important conversations have begun, but many questions remain to be resolved. Chairs were obtained in June to create more flexibility, but these are currently being stored elsewhere because opinions are divided over whether or not to the retain the pews. This debate illustrates well the ongoing discussions.

The 9.15 Service

The 9.15am services continue to be held on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of each month and is well attended by children, parents and grandparents. The services are interactive, which can make life interesting, as we never know what the children will contribute.

We sing lively and thoughtful songs in which the children do their best to teach us adults signing, (with very mixed success!). The use of video clips of Bible stories engages the children's attention, and the short talks teach a practical application to real life, always emphasising God's amazing love for each one of us.

Afterwards we thoroughly enjoy each other's company with some drinks and biscuits. It is a joy seeing so many families attend, enjoying and being blessed during the services.

- In 2024, the Social Team had several key objectives:
 - To involve more people in taking on leadership roles with activities.
 - To develop the roles teenagers play in their social activities.
 - To expand the number of events encouraging members of the parish to organise their own events.
 - To establish solid relationships with the other churches in putting on and promoting joint social activities.

Events in 2024:

- The Men's Intensive Care Meeting A social evening for men in the Blue Anchor Pub. This is a non-religious event.
- The Men's Breakfast social event with up to 22 men attending. Efforts were being made to attract younger men.
- The 100 Club continued to grow and provided useful income to the church.
- The Community Coffee Morning remained an important outreach event and fundraiser for the parish, relying on regular volunteers.
- Advent 2024 featured a new format compared to the traditional Advent Fair, including a single-day Advent Fair, Wreath and Flower sales, Wednesday Soup Lunch, choir concerts, and a Silent Auction. The event was positively received and generated approximately £4,000 in income.
- Concerts by external choirs were held at Holy Trinity. Carnforth Community Choir performed, as well as Lacuna Upper Voice Choir and Divers Voyces. Leven's Choir performed in December. Ticket money was split 50/50 with the choirs.
- Holy Trinity hosted aChristian Unity Soup Lunch. Also Lenten Lunches/Christian Seder Meal, which were open to all churches. Income was shared with The Olive Branch Charity.
- The Social Team organised the annual Fathers Day Breakfast.

2024 PARISH VISITING TEAM



2024 saw the formation of a new Visiting Team, in response to all the interest shown through the 'Refresher Week' in April / May 2024. The team has a dozen members, and is coordinated by Kathy Edwards.

Some of the team benefitted from the Listening Course which was run at Holy Trinity in March by NISCU (Norther Inter Schools Christian Union).

2024 MOTHERS UNION



Holy Trinity Mothers Union group continues to be the largest in the Lancaster, Morecambe and Tunstall Deanery and one of the largest in the Diocese with our numbers remaining at 50.

In 2024 we had a full Programme which included Corporate Worship on the first Wednesday of the month, monthly meetings with Guest Speakers, events and activities. Through these events such as our Annual Strawberry Tea and Community Centre Coffee Mornings we raised £2,536 which went to supporting MU Charities. Some of the money went to Overseas and the Relief Fund but we also supported more local projects -

AFIA (the MU caravan which gives families facing hardship the opportunity of a week's holiday), gifts for prisoners' families in Lancaster Prison, pyjamas and food items for the Womens' Refuge as part of the national MU campaign against Gender based Violence. Our members also very generously and independently donated hundreds of items for the Olive Tree Foodbank in Lancaster (not an official MU charity) A highlight of the year was hosting the annual Mary Sumner Day Service (our MU founder) for the Archdeaconry last August when along with 2 new members of our own, Bishop Jill was also enrolled as an MU member.

We continue to thrive as a Church group and will always welcome new members.

2024 FINANCIAL REPORT- INCOME



This is just a brief summary of our finances. The full financial report for 2024 can be found on the church website. (www.bolton-le-sands.org.uk)

Our Parish is a Registered Charity, and receives no income other than that which is donated by its congregation and friends, or through the work of the vicar and many volunteers.

The 'income' chart above shows that more than half of all income comes from regular 'Planned Giving' donations and Gift Aid. This, together with other forms of income was, unfortunately, not enough to cover all costs during 2024, and a large sum (£6475) therefore had to come from cash reserves. (These reserves had been accumulated from legacies and gifts held for specific purposes, mainly upkeep of Holy Trinity Church). At the end of 2024 our 'free' reserves covered only four months of our day-to-day running costs, so we constantly have to seek ways of increasing our income.

Holy Trinity Church itself is an ancient Grade ii* listed building and, whilst beautiful, it does come with a high demand for repairs and maintenance. These costs (green segment, £10673, which also includes spending at St Mark's in Nether Kellet) would have to be added to 'running costs' had we not received substantial legacies, so we are indeed fortunate to benefit from such generosity.

Like many Parishes in these difficult times, our Reserves are dwindling, and costs will continue to rise into 2025 and beyond. 2024 FINANCIAL REPORT-EXPENDITURE



Looking at expenditure, the chart shows that £82,000, around two-thirds of the total relates to the Parish Share. This is a payment to central Diocesan funds which are then used to cover a variety of costs which we would otherwise have to pay ourselves. Over 70% of these relate to stipends and other costs involved in employing clergy, including our own vicar Peter. The payment would have been higher had we not received a grant of £11994 from central Diocesan Funds to cover part of the cost.

The £24,911 segment of the expenditure chart labelled 'Running costs...' covers a wide variety of day-to-day outgoings - insurance, gas & electric, WiFi, website, 'consumables' (coffee, altar wine, candles etc) plus many more.

Within our Parish Share we also make a contribution to those Parishes who are far less fortunate than ours. In 2024 the total was £20319 and when this is added to our other, more local charitable giving (£5505 in 2024) we can be confident that we are fulfilling our Christian duty of generosity to others. 2024 FABRIC REPORT

It's been another busy year for the fabric group. The maintenance work has continued throughout the year at both churches. All statutory inspections have been completed, ensuring that our churches are a safe environment.

We continue to address emergent work, and the items categorised as urgent in the Quinquennial Inspection Reports (QIR) for both churches. The next QIRs are due in December 2027 for Holy Trinity and January 2028 for St Marks. Outstanding urgent items identified in the QIR are the tower roof lead cladding for Holy Trinity.





The following items of emergent work have been completed at Holy Trinity.

• Installation of a second projector and screen in the North Aisle ensures that all of the congregation have a clear view of the presentations.

 Removal of two pews from the North Aisle to create more space for the music group and removal of one pew from the St Michael Chapel.

• Replacement of the doors and reinstatement of power and light to the old Mortuary building. Which will extend the use of the building and the Glebe field.

· Separation of the electricity metering for the Vicar's office and prayer room.

 \cdot Installation of racking in the choir vestry to improve storage.

• The external notice board has been refurbished.

• Temporary repairs have been made to the lead cladding on the tower roof; however, this is a sticking plaster over the issue. In the longer term we may consider replacing the lead with stainless steel in a similar way to the roof valley gutter repair.

 \cdot The graveyard wall adjacent to the lane has been repaired.

2024 SAFEGUARDING STATEMENT

Promoting A Safer Church

The parish of Holy Trinity in Bolton le Sands is committed to the safeguarding of children, young people and adults. We follow the House of Bishops guidance and policies and we have our own Parish Safeguarding Officer, (PSO) Kath Brough. Please contact her if you are concerned a child or adult has been harmed or may be at risk of harm.

The following policy was agreed at the Parochial Church Council (PCC) meeting held on 2 Feb 2021 and re-confirmed after amendment on 19th March 2024

The safeguarding of children, young people and vulnerable adults is an integral part of the life of the church, set out clearly in legislation, and is everybody's responsibility. As a parish, we aim to provide the safest possible environment to enable our children to grow and flourish, and all adults to feel safe and welcome. In accordance with the Church of England Safeguarding Policy our church is committed to:

- Promoting a safer environment and culture.
- Safely recruiting and supporting all those with any responsibility related to children, young people and vulnerable adults within the church.
- Responding promptly to every safeguarding concern or allegation.
- Caring pastorally for victims/survivors of abuse and other affected persons.
- Caring pastorally for those who are the subject of concerns or allegations of abuse and other affected persons.

Responding to those that may pose a present risk to others. The Parish will:

- Create a safe and caring place for all.
- Have named Parish Safeguarding Officers (PSOs) to work with the incumbent and the PCC to implement policy and procedures.
- Safely recruit, train and support all those with any responsibility for children, young people and adults to have the confidence and skills to recognise and respond to abuse.
- Ensure that there is appropriate insurance cover for all activities involving children and adults undertaken in the name of the parish.
- Display in church premises and on the Parish website the details of who to contact if there are safeguarding concerns or support needs.
- Listen to and take seriously all those who disclose abuse.
- Take steps to protect children and adults when a safeguarding concern of any kind arises, following House of Bishops guidance, including notifying the Diocesan Safeguarding Adviser (DSA) and statutory agencies immediately.
- Offer support to victims/survivors of abuse regardless of the type of abuse, when or where it occurred.
- Care for and monitor any member of the church community who may pose a risk to children and adults whilst maintaining appropriate confidentiality and the safety of all parties.
- Ensure that health and safety policy, procedures and risk assessments are in place and that these are reviewed annually.
- Review the implementation of the Safeguarding Policy, Procedures and Practices at least annually.
- Each person who works within this church community will agree to abide by this policy and the guidelines established by this church.
