
Confirmation Service

As you may have heard, St Thomas' has officially been awarded the Bronze Eco Church Award by A Rocha UK! This is a wonderful milestone in our journey to care for God's creation and live out our faith in a way that reflects good stewardship of the environment.



The Eco Church award scheme encourages churches across the UK to make positive changes in five key areas: worship and teaching, buildings, land, community, global engagement, and lifestyle. Over the past months, we have taken steps, big and small, to grow in these areas. Some of the initiatives that helped us reach this award include:

- Incorporating themes of creation care into our worship and prayers.
- Making practical improvements to how we use and manage our building, including energy use.
- Taking small actions to support wildlife and biodiversity around our church grounds.
- Encouraging conversations about sustainable living among our congregation.

Some examples of this in practice are dedicating some of our grounds to natural re-wilding, the use of bug hotels and bird boxes, composting continued pill packet recycling and installing a bike rack with even more plans to explore the use of solar panels, water butts and many other practises that further align with our duty to protect our planet.

This award is not the finish line, it's just the beginning. We are already looking ahead to how we can grow even further, perhaps toward the Silver Award. We would love your input, ideas, and energy as we continue to explore how we can be a church that cares for both people and planet.

If you're passionate about the environment or simply curious to learn more, we'd love you to join us in our Eco Church journey! We'd particularly be interested in expanding the initiatives across more of our churches too.

Wigan Local History & Heritage Society


Members of Wigan Local History and Heritage Society are visiting Holy Trinity Church to hear about the history of this lovely church. The invitation to come along is extended to everyone.

The Olympic Games

In describing the Christian life as a marathon race, the writer of Hebrews (12:1-2) challenges us to finish well.



'throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles'

As in a normal race, we have to get rid of any burdens that weigh us down (eg possessions, worries, what others think of us) and besetting sins (wrong habits or attitudes). We can cast our burdens on the Lord (Ps 55:22) and be assured of His forgiveness (1 John 1:9).

'run with perseverance the race marked out for us'

The Christian life is like a marathon not a sprint race, which calls for endurance. The course is marked out for us, as we all have a unique race to run, with its opportunities and difficulties. God knows our path and will provide all that we need to complete the race.

'fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith'

The runner keeps their focus on the finishing line and avoids all distractions. Our focus is on Jesus, who has run the race before us ('author'), but is the one who can show us how to finish well ('perfecter').

We are also surrounded by a 'great cloud of witnesses' These are God's people, both past and present, who are cheering us on!

During the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, the British athlete Derek Redmond was running in the 400 metres semi-finals. About 250 metres from the finish his hamstring tore, and he fell to the ground in pain. However, his father ran on to the track to support him in completing the race. Let's not forget that whatever we face, God is there beside to enable us to finish the race!

100 years ago, on
11th July 1924 that
British sprinter Eric
Liddell won the men's
400 metres gold medal
at the 1924 Olympics in
Paris. He preferred the
100 metres, but the
heats were held on a
Sunday, and he refused
to run in them.

On 29th June, 3rd July and 31st August we remember St Peter, St Thomas and St Aidan respectively. Here is a little bit more about each in honour of the three of our six churches to which they are named.

St. Peter: A Fisherman Called to Lead


St. Peter, one of Jesus' closest disciples, holds a special place in the life of the Church. Born as Simon in a small fishing village, he was called by Jesus to leave his nets and follow him — a call that would change the course of his life and the history of Christianity.

Jesus renamed him Peter, meaning "rock," saying, "on this rock I will build my church" (Matthew 16:18). This was not because Peter was perfect — far from it. He was impulsive, outspoken, and famously denied Jesus three times during His trial. But after the resurrection, Peter was forgiven, restored, and empowered to become a bold witness to the gospel.

In the Book of Acts, we see Peter preaching at Pentecost, healing in Jesus' name, and helping guide the early Church. Tradition holds that he was eventually martyred in Rome, giving his life for the faith he once feared to confess.

In the Church of England, Peter is honoured not only as an apostle but as a model of grace and transformation. His feast day, shared with St. Paul on 29 June, is a time to reflect on how God uses ordinary people to do extraordinary things.

St. Peter reminds us that the Church is not built on perfection, but on grace — and on Christ, who called even a fisherman to help change the world.



Doubts about the Christian faith? - take action now!

Do you have doubts about the Christian faith? July is the month for you to decide what to do about them. This month the Church remembers Doubting Thomas, and there IS action you can take, either way.

You know the story: Thomas was the only apostle not present when Jesus appeared to the disciples on the evening of His resurrection. When the rejoicing disciples



later told Thomas that Jesus was alive, he flatly refused to believe them. He had seen the crucifixion.

The gospel goes on to relate that a week later Jesus indeed appeared to Thomas, and invited him to put his hand into the holes in His hands and feet. Thomas was utterly overwhelmed. His response was 'My Lord and My God!' He saw, he believed.

Then Jesus said something which is relevant to us today. "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed." (Jn 20:29) Jesus KNOWS it can be hard for you, who have never seen Him, to believe that He is indeed alive, and Lord of all.

Which is, of course, where we are today. Perhaps you really struggle with doubt. Well, there are two courses of action you can take.

- 1. Don't read the Bible. Begin to forget what Christianity teaches. Don't go to church. Don't ask God, or anyone else, for help. Your 'doubts' are perfectly honest questions, but stop looking for answers. Assume that because you have questions, there are no answers.
- 2. Look for some answers. Find out what the New Testament actually says about Jesus by reading it! Do not be confused into thinking that you 'doubt'


something which you may not even really 'know.' Pray – remember that Jesus said that those who believe without seeing are 'blessed'. So, ask God that, if He is there, please would He 'bless' you by opening your eyes to spiritual realities. Go to church. Yes, the Christian faith demands that we take God at His word, with no evidence other than His Word. But though we believe in Jesus without seeing Him, we do NOT believe without considering Him. Faith is not blind credulity and unthinking naiveté. We have faith in the historic person of Jesus Christ.

Peter writes some real encouragement in his first epistle, "Though you have not seen Him, you love Him; and even though you do not see Him now, you believe in Him and are filled with an inexpressible and glorious joy, for you are receiving the goal of your faith, the salvation of your souls" (1 Peter 1:8-9).

St Aidan

Though Aidan was born in Ireland, became a monk in Iona, Scotland, he was called to Northumberland, where he led it's King, Oswald, to Christianity, so became an Apostle to the English. A British Man!

King Oswald of Northumbria often interpreted for Aidan until he was able to speak English! Aidan founded a monastery on Holy Island, where he became the first Bishop. He was a great evangelist who walked everywhere so that



he could talk to the people he met on the roadside, rich and poor alike. He showed great generosity and love to all. His love for Christ shone through and he is often portrayed holding a lantern – the light of Christ which he carried. He died on August 31st 651 in Bamburgh, and so we celebrate Saint Aidan on August 31st. We are proud to have him as our Patron Saint at St Aidan's Billinge.

1984 - the burning of York Minster

Forty years ago, on 9th July 1984, York Minster was struck by lightning, which set fire to the roof and destroyed the south transept. It was the most recent of five fires that have occurred there over the years: the causes have ranged from workmen burning coals (1753) through arson using torn-up hymnbooks (1829) to an unattended candle (1840) and a tarpaulin catching fire (1971). Although night lightning was the official explanation in 1984, some suggested that God might have been reacting to the very recent appointment as Bishop of Durham of the Rt Revd David Jenkins, a famously controversial cleric whose comments had seemed to cast doubt on the virgin birth and the Resurrection. He had been consecrated at York Minster three days earlier.

The Archbishop of York, Dr John Habgood, described that idea as "ridiculous", though some felt that arson by objectors could not be ruled out. As many as 114 firefighters from over North Yorkshire were involved in tackling the blaze. The damage to the south transept, with its wooden vaulted roof, amounted to £2.25 million.

York Minster is a huge landmark and tourist attraction in the city: many consider it to be one of Europe's most impressive Gothic buildings. The glass in its famous 16th century Rose Window, which had recently been renovated, cracked into 40,000 pieces, but the new lead edges held it all together.

New musical album released as demand for Daily Prayer app soars

A new album of music, The Gift of This New Day, has been released in response to demand rom listeners of the Church of England's Daily Prayer app and podcast.



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Now available on CD and major streaming platforms, the album features all-new recordings of the most requested musical pieces from Morning Prayer, performed by St Martin's Voices.

Since its launch in 2021, the Daily Prayer audio service has become a spiritual companion for millions, with over 3.1 million unique users and nearly 12 million downloads. Music has been a central part of the experience from the beginning, offering beauty, comfort, and space for reflection, especially during the isolation of the UK's third lockdown.

The album includes a blend of chant, public domain sacred works, and five newly commissioned pieces by leading composers: Cecilia McDowall, Nils Greenhow, Sarah MacDonald, Owain Park, and Lucy Walker. The music reflects a range of styles designed to support prayer and contemplation.

An accompanying music book, published by the Royal School of Church Music (RSCM), provides sheet music for over 30 canticles, psalms, and responses from Common Worship: Daily Prayer. It is designed for use by individuals, small groups, choirs and congregations alike.

The project is a collaboration between the Church of England's publishing arm, Church House Publishing, and the RSCM, building on their shared commitment to resourcing worship in every context: digital and physical, personal and communal.




St Aidan's Bereavement Support Group

Dates and planting times will be posted our Facebook page in a timely manner.






Our Magazine
