The Message by Rev'd Paul Desborough

Recently I have benefited from spending some time at a couple of conferences as part of my Diocesan role with New Worshipping Communities and having a day with our new curate, Gael, at her Training College in Bristol.



It has been a privilege being able to hear, share and learn from different church communities around the country. Some of these gatherings have been small, focusing on the changes we are experiencing in society and how Christianity is less central than it was. Others have been larger, focusing on how the church can respond to these changes, what the priorities should be, and how resources can be best offered to local churches. As you may well imagine there are numerous insights, ideas, and inspiring ways being offered.



The privilege of giving time to discuss, share and learn from others, in various places and doing different things, is the opportunity to not only share but to learn from others, to encourage and be encouraged. To discover new insights and practices that help to grow churches that are healthy. To experience insights from people who may not think the Christian faith is of value but have found it is when a local New Worshipping Community has emerged and engaged in ways that

connect with them.

My reflection from these times is that in all the networking, conversations over coffee, discussions, and workshops, it is primarily through trusted relationships that good, healthy responses with local churches emerge. Good relationships within the church communities, good relationships with the wider communities they are in, and good relationships with the people and the organisations they partner with. This is not something particularly new, more I would suggest of what Jesus promoted most. 'Love the Lord your God and Love your neighbour as yourself' and 'by their love they will know that they are my disciples'.

Simple in words, more challenging in practice! We cannot separate the two, we were called to both 'be' loving and 'do' loving. When we understand different viewpoints and when we cannot, when we do things in the same ways and when we do not. In all the diversity of being and doing that there is, God's love remains central. This month we are all being encouraged to pray 'Thy Kingdom Come' and for people to encounter the way of Jesus, Loving God, Loving others and loving self. As we pray

for others, I encourage you to be mindful of yourself, to be in 'Conference mode' open to hearing, sharing, learning and discovering new ways from the Holy Spirit. To be a privileged part of being

better resourced as a shared Worshipping Community called the church, doing its responding in the world.

Archdeacon Matthew Writes

On the day I wrote this article, the stock markets were down 11% as the impact of what President Trump termed 'Liberation Day' took hold on the global economy. As of April 2, the United States has imposed global tariffs on countries exporting goods and services to America. Some countries have already responded to Trump's move by imposing retaliatory tariffs on the cost to the United States of



exporting their goods into those countries. Now, you might not follow the ups and downs of global stock markets and the twists and turns of the geo-politics, but part of the concern over these tariffs will be their effect on nearly all of us. The US President's move affects pensions, the cost of car purchases, family savings and more. And the language applied to the advent of these significant and far-reaching tariffs is 'Liberation Day'.

The heavy burden imposed on countries and individuals by these tariffs starkly contrasts with Jesus' message of salvation, liberation, and hope that we celebrate during the Easter season. Jesus took the full weight of human sin on himself on the cross and rose from the dead to offer us new life in Christ. Whereas President Trump's tariffs lead to hopelessness and despair, the liberation Jesus offers us brings hope. However, as we take our confidence in the Good News of Jesus, we must reconcile what we believe in faith with the world as we experience it; that is the challenge of being a disciple. It might strike you as hard to cling to a message of hope amid a fractured world, but that is the work we must do if we are to point people to Jesus.

Will Freemont-Brown's chapter in the Archbishop's Lent book 'Wild Bright Hope' suggests that for Christians, hope is not the same as optimism but inviting Jesus into the challenging and traumatic: the hopeless places of our lives and the world, we can reimagine those spaces with hope. The apostle Paul in his letter to the Romans (12.2) urges early followers of Jesus to 'not conform to the patterns of this world but be transformed by the renewing of your [our] mind'. Therefore, the challenge for us as contemporary followers of Jesus is not to deny or play down the despair of tariffs and warfare but, through prayer, invite the Holy Spirit to help us reimagine our outlook on the here and now, in light of the liberation Jesus won for us on the cross and in the resurrection.


Thy Kingdom Come 2025

In its tenth year, this annual time between Ascension Day and Pentecost Sunday, churches from all around the world and from all different denominations have a focus on praying for more people to come to know Jesus. We are invited to join in.



We have two booklets available at the church Centre for anyone to take and use. A Prayer Journal and Novena which are both based on the Lord's Prayer.

The Prayer Journal features contributions from across different denominations and traditions including Cardinal Vincent Nichols, Bishop Rose Hudson-Wilkin, His Eminence Archbishop Angaelos, Bishop Mike Royal and many more.





The Novena - Ten Lessons, One Hope - is written by Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell.

These may be resources not used before and new to you. Why not have a look and for 11 days take a small amount of your time each day to engage, learn and pray. Joining in with thousands of Christian across the world and with the risen Jesus who is always praying for you and for the people you know and love along with those who you may



not know.

Most importantly were encouraged to **pray for five people** who we know by name. To pray that God's Spirit might work in the lives of 5 people who have not responded with their 'Yes' to God's call, that they will come into the lifegiving relationship with Jesus Christ.

First the Hands, Then the Words (Churches Together in England)

Rev'd Silke Halfmann, Chair of the German Synod in the UK and Vice Chair of the Council of Lutheran Churches, shares her Reflections

"How can we be one when we believe so differently?" I often hear this question - in ecumenical settings, among church members, or in everyday conversations. It's a valid concern. Christian diversity can feel overwhelming. Different traditions, teachings, and liturgies are undeniably real. And yet, I've come to believe that the deepest unity doesn't begin in discussion, it begins in action.



Although I am ordained in the Reformed tradition, I have spent much of my ministry immersed in Lutheran practice. I trained with a Lutheran mentor during my vicariate, lived for four months in a Lutheran women's monastery singing Psalms, and spent a year in Istanbul working in a Lutheran church – even singing the liturgy. These experiences have shown me that unity often begins not in theological debate, but in shared service. In the context of action, differences fade away.

One of the most powerful experiences of unity in diversity came during my time in Istanbul, working with a refugee project. Orthodox Christians, Free Church volunteers, German Lutherans, English Anglicans, Austrian Roman Catholics — we didn't always share a common language or theological vocabulary for each other. But we understood what mattered most: people needed help. Medical care, clothing, food, comfort, education, and prayer. So, we served, side by side. In that shared work, theological boundaries were not important because they were overtaken by a deeper calling: to love our neighbour.

Especially in today's time of increasing fragmentation, I believe ecumenism is strongest when it is practical. Not in solemn declarations first, but in shared bread and burdens. The words come later, born from what we've done together. When we stand side by side at the same soup kitchen counter, visit the hospital ward, or pray together in grief, something happens. Quietly, but unmistakably, unity begins to take root.

Of course, dialogue matters. We must also talk about our differences. But unity does not grow from neat theological formulations alone. It grows from shared life, from the experience of serving and being served by one another. Perhaps this is ecumenism's gift to the world today: not grand institutional mergers, but small, faithful acts of cooperation. A funeral planned across denominational lines. Collaborating for climate action. Sharing a church building with different denominations and reaching out to the people in the neighbourhood together. The decline of some churches may be an opportunity—a chance to discover how much we can accomplish when we work together.

We often speak of ecumenism in terms of "dialogue tables" but I wonder if we also need more workbenches—places where faith becomes tangible. Where the question is not, "What divides us?" but, "What can we do together?"

When we stretch out our hands to work alongside each other, conversation naturally follows. And with this understanding, we may even discover that the other is not as strange as we once thought.

Perhaps we'll find that Christ has already been at work between us — long before we found the words. In doing so, we also demonstrate to the world that true unity is not a matter of agreement on every theological point but of shared service and compassion. The way we work together, despite our differences, can serve as a witness to a world increasingly divided by identity and self-interest. The goal is not to erase difference, but to build connection through service — not of one opinion, but of one heart.

Rev'd Silke Halfmann is pastor of the United Congregation of the Bonhoeffer Church in Sydenham and two Lutheran congregations: St Mary with St George in London, and St Albans with Luton. Since April 2024, she has served as Senior Pastor of the German-Speaking Synod in Great Britain and was elected Vice-Chair of the Council of Lutheran Churches (CLC) in December 2024. She studied theology in Germany and the Netherlands, completed an ecumenical placement in Istanbul, and moved to London in 2022 from the Protestant Church in the Rhineland.

Treasurer's Update

It is currently a busy time in the life of the Church financially, because we are in the middle of our "Giving to go Green" appeal which is running for 6 weeks. We are trying to raise £5,000 in that time so the we get the same amount in matched funding through the Diocese. I am sure you will be able to read more details on this elsewhere in the Newsletter as Melanie will no doubt give you a full update of where we are up to with it. There are also various associated notices on the subject on the middle bay notice board.

If you recall, a couple of months ago we asked you to stop giving to our Gift Day because we had reached our target for our Solar Panels Appeal thanks to the grants we are to receive. We know that some of you didn't give and were waiting so that it can go to the "Give to go Green" Appeal. This appeal is now 'live' and you can now give your donation to qualify for matched funding; it must go through the electronic giving machine in the Welcome Area. If you need any assistance with this, please speak to me or Rev'd Paul Desborough. If you have signed up for Gift Aid, please talk to me so that we can claim the this for what you give.

We continue to just about break even each month in our finances. Now is the time of year when we try to consolidate, to build up some reserves ready for the winter period. All our bills are so much higher now, in particular the gas and electricity. I have hopes that when the solar panels are fitted our electricity costs will reduce somewhat.

Thank you to those of you who heeded my words and reviewed their giving after my request last month. I can tell you, as I write this, that at least one person has increased their giving. I pass this on to you to keep you informed, and not embarrass you to do the same, it is entirely your decision as you pray for guidance.

I may not be able to provide you with a report for the July Newsletter and we do not produce a Newsletter in August, so my next update may well be in September.

As I look out my window I see an array of new roofs, a mixture of terracotta and grey tiles, all very similar just facing in different directions. This little corner of Sinfin Moor down on Boundary Moor Gardens and opposite on Mulberry Place (on Wragley Way) I realise is very different to its surroundings. The houses are very different, even the front gardens are different with such clay earth that little grows yet!

We are also a fabulously multicultural, multi faith community down here that is multi-generational too. Some have come here to retire, some are young and working, many are families of all ages. This makes this place wonderful and diverse but it also has its challenges, like everywhere!

As I look on this place, I see a community that is different - within itself and to all that is around it - but connected. Fine lines of connection. Connected by location. Connected by the desire to belong. Connected through people. Connected through shared lives, work or faith. Those fine lines of connection - the overlaps between people and places - are vital in making **US** a community. Just like at Sinfin Moor Church, we know some people really well - maybe we meet up in the week, maybe we have shared hobbies or friends. But there are also those we don't know at all - we may exchange smiles or greetings but maybe we don't actually know their name yet we're still connected through our faith. In all our diversity let's keep our eyes and our hearts open to sense those connections.

One way we're hoping to encourage those connections on Boundary Moor Gardens is a "Celebration Day" bringing everyone together to celebrate the different cultures, the colours, the food, the lifestyles. Celebrating that we're different but connected.
