


Inside this month's magazine...

fathers-in-law. Many of us will
make a special effort to see them
on the day.

No two fathers are alike, of course, but various polls across the internet reveal some interesting similarities of what people have most valued in their dad.

These traits include: being dependable, approachable, protective, patient, affectionate,

honest, willing to listen, compassionate, and having spent time with them when they were young.

That's quite a list! People whose fathers had even some of those strengths have a lot to be thankful for.

Thankfully, our Father in Heaven certainly has all those traits. Jesus said the Father is totally dependable and protective of us, longs for us to turn to Him, and is full of compassion and love. And we are to call Him 'Abba' – Daddy!

Just a thought...

Minster Communities Full Steam Ahead!

Who is this? Even the wind and the waves obey him!" Jesus had just stilled a most ferocious, life threatening storm on Lake Galilee, with the power and strength that he had from God, and his disciples who were with him in the boat were struck with awe and fear. (Mark chapter 4, vs 35-41). We do well to listen to whatever God has to say to us whether through scripture, creation, circumstances, or a body of believers enlightened by the Holy Spirit.

This story has been read repeatedly, each time your representatives have met to discuss the introduction of "minster communities" with other neighbouring churches, and it offers rich food for thought beyond the space I have here. Our churches in Anstey and Thurcaston with Cropston have had to choose between connecting EITHER with Beaumont Leys, Stocking Farm and various other city churches, OR with Newtown Linford, Groby, Ratby, Markfield and other county parishes (see below). Our reps reported to the Annual Parochial Church Meetings in All Saints and St. Mary's, recommending that we go with the county parishes, and both meetings voted unanimously in favour.

We might have loved the status quo, but it was not an option. Because churches' total financial giving has not kept pace, and this is reflected in what is passed to the diocese,



the diocese was losing two million pounds a year, and this was unsustainable. The diocese has had to reduce its staff, and will be supporting fewer stipendiary clergy. A minster community of just over a dozen churches is likely to get three or four stipendiary clergy paid for by the diocese in the future. Additionally there are self-supporting clergy and various kinds of lay minister like myself. To be clear, churches will continue to minister to their parishes, and churches the size of All Saints and St. Mary's will continue having their own services.

Links with both faith and community schools are important, and school catchments overlap between parishes. Minster communities will encourage churches to collaborate as they try to give spiritual and religious support to schools.

With the news that the latest generation seems to take faith seriously, it seems more important than ever.

Your representatives in the process so far are Revd. Matthew Gough, Marian Driver, Jane Westby, Peter Yardley, Doug Gilmore, Andrea Knight and myself. There are more All Saints reps because responsibilities were split; Jane and Peter did the city and Doug and Andrea did the county. It is good that All Saints and St. Mary's will retain their present link, and the other county parishes likely to link with us are: Newtown Linford, Groby and Ratby; Markfield, Thornton, Bagworth, Stanton and Copt Oak; Barlestone, Kirby Mallory, Newbold Verdon and Peckleton. Birstall would also be welcome if they chose to join in. It is also good that all these are village churches with whom we might expect some affinity, although one or two are at a low ebb and parishes like ours might consider helping them in the future.

The next stage of the process is set to begin with a "Kick-Off" Zoom meeting on 18th June at 7.30pm:

(https://leccofe.zoom.us/j/92403795897?pw d=ebgnSG58eaOnb5lxiXNmAv8pirthpB.1) *. This is not restricted to reps or PCC

members, but anyone can attend online and

be informed and invited to further participation. Working groups will then form and get to work in probably early July, bringing together the nitty-gritty of creating a minster community in liaison with the diocese. Based on recent experience, and subject to evolving procedures, there could be four groups working and gathering information on:

- Geography, Context, Resources and New Communities;
- People, Ministry, Engagement and Diversity;
 - Buildings and Finance;
- Discipleship and Mission, Growing Faith and Schools.


There are interactions, and for example our buildings, ministry and mission all interact.

The process is hoped to culminate with the new minster community being commissioned by the bishop in the summer of 2026. Do please hold it in your prayers, as well as considering what you have to offer.

Diane Denton

he Local History Society was sorry to learn of the recent passing of Diane Denton, who did much to research and disseminate the history of Thurcaston & Cropston.


Diane was the first – and only – Heritage Warden for the parish and in that role she published articles about our local history in the free periodicals that most villagers receive through the door. The articles ranged in time from the Domesday Book through to the 2001 Census and covered subjects as diverse as the two medieval bridges; All Saints' Church, its rectors, bells and memorials; the Guild Holiday Home and the Cropstone Land Society.

In 2018, Diane compiled the articles into a book, "Thurcaston with Cropston: Nuggets of Time", which the Leicestershire Historian described as "an entertaining and informative overview of the two villages for past and current residents and 'outsiders' alike."

She had previously (as Diane Cole) published a book about our former rector Thomas Willet (1510-1598).

For the centenary of the First World War, she carried out research into the lives of the men whose names appear on war memorials in Thurcaston.

Diane had a particular interest in stained glass and, as a member of the local group of NADFAS (now called the Arts Society), she



was instrumental in bringing them here to conduct a detailed survey of all the fabric and fittings of the church, which will be an invaluable record for generations to come.

t's been a busy few weeks for the Tower and Handbell Ringers with several notable events to recognise and celebrate.

In April our Tower Bell Captain Peter Hunt reached 25 years in the role, having been appointed at Easter 2000. He also had a milestone birthday coming up in May so we took the opportunity to surprise him with the presentation at the Annual Bells Dinner, which took place at Lingdale Golf Course. A commemorative bell and an anthology of writing about bellringing called 'Inspired by

Bells' were presented to him by our after dinner guest speaker (and handbell ringer) Baroness Hazel Byford.

To continue the celebrations on Wednesday 7 May the tower bell ringers assembled to ring a Quarter Peel (1280 Plain Bob Major) – and the following evening a group of nine ringers took part in the national bell ringing for the 80th Celebration of VE Day.

The Handbell Ringers have also started their Spring & Summer programme of performances with a visits to Cedar House and LOROS in May.

Trench Candles for Ukraine

ver the last few months, we have contributed to this appeal, which has been running for three years for the collection of old and unused candles so that Trench Candles could be made to send to the soldiers on Ukraine's front line against the invading Russian forces. They are used both for low level

lighting and to keep their hands warm in the bitter winter there. These have been collected and taken to St Mary's Church in Arnold near Nottingham. We shall soon be delivering a further 25kg of wax to the Ukrainian Centre in Nottingham, making a total of well over 300kg – over

Teams of volunteers at the Centre create the candles by rolling corrugated cardboard into old baked bean tins, placing a splint into the middle, and melting the candle wax to fill the tin. This means that every few weeks, hundreds of candles are being sent by lorry

4,000 Trench Candles have been sent so far.



to Ukraine. Very many thanks to all those who have been collecting their unburnt candle bits for this cause.

We all pray that this most unusual way to spread the Light of Christ to those in need of His love and care will not have to continue for too much longer. The collections are now suspended over the summer months and hopefully, the situation in Ukraine will be resolved soon. The amazing collection of candles over the past couple of years is so very much appreciated by the Ukrainians. Thank you.

Junior Corner...

Why aren't dinosaurs in the Bible?

he Bible wasn't written to list all the animals on earth or tell us about science. It was written a long time before people started to use science to learn about the world.

When the Bible was written, people didn't even have a word for dinosaurs yet! But it's not just dinosaurs that aren't mentioned in the Bible, it doesn't talk about armadillos, kangaroos, sabretoothed cats or penguins either!

That doesn't mean that the Bible is out of date or wrong, or that these animals aren't important. Rather than

teaching us science, many Christians believe that the Bible was written to tell people about God, how much He loves them, and all the amazing things He has done.

The Bible says that God made everything, and loves everything He made, so that includes dinosaurs. It also encourages people to explore and find out all about the wonderful things it says God has made. Science is a part of this exploration.

Did God make the dinosaurs?

The Bible (the holy book that Christians read) says that God made everything. All the stars, the Earth and all the amazing plants and animals that have ever lived here.



So yes, most Christians believe that God made the dinosaurs!

The Bible also teaches that God loves it when people explore His creation, and science is a great way of doing that. So, for many Christians, science is one of the fun things we can use to learn all about how God made everything, including all of the dinosaurs!

Were humans and dinosaurs ever living on earth at the same time?

Yes! But probably not the kind of dinosaur you're thinking of! Most of the dinosaurs died out a very, very

long time ago, way before humans first lived. But some of the smaller, feathery dinosaurs survived and over a long time they have evolved into the animals we call birds.

So, from chickens and robins to penguins and ostriches, there are dinosaurs living all over our world today!

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Choosing Plants to Create a Cut Flower Garden

- with Karen Gimson

he May meeting of the Thurcaston and Cropston Gardening Club was an illustrated talk by Karen Gimson. Karen is a garden designer and journalist with 25 years' experience. Her talk was about choosing colourful and exciting plants to create beautiful cut flowers for the home, family and friends.

Karen made the point that many plants can be grown in containers so you do not need much space to grow them, and a few flowers with lots of foliage can make striking 'jam jar' arrangements or small hand-tied posies.

Karen grows a huge variety of plants to use as cut flowers – growing annuals from seed, perennials, and shrubs. Throughout the talk, she showed photos of many of the arrangements she creates using different combinations of plants depending on the effect required.

She grows in flower beds and also in many containers of all sizes. She has some favourite plants that she uses in many displays – such as Blue Boy cornflower with 'electric' blue tones and corncockle. Another favourite is Ammi majus – which she often grows from seed in October.

Karen brought with her to the talk a lot of plant material and she made a number of flower arrangements, which she donated to

the Club raffle. In almost all the arrangements she made, she used some foliage from shrubs which she feels adds form and structure.

This was an informative and entertaining talk, attended by a lively audience of Club members.

History Society learns about Mary Attenborough

ir David Attenborough is known throughout the world, and so is his brother Richard. Some local people might also be aware that their father, Frederick, was a Principal of University College, Leicester, before it became a full university in 1957. But who knows anything about their mother? Our speaker in May was Richard Graves, who is on a mission to tell the story of Mary Attenborough and demonstrate that she deserves recognition in her own right.

Mary (née Clegg) was born in 1896 and grew up in New Sawley, Derbyshire. By chance, her family home in the Arts & Crafts style has been beautifully preserved. Her father was a progressive headmaster and Mary attended his school, where she was a bright pupil. In 1914, she went to the Sorbonne to study modern languages but on the outbreak of the First World

War she was forced to return home and she completed her degree in Nottingham. Her father employed two refugees from the fighting in Belgium as French teachers in his school and this seems to have had a big influence on Mary, as we shall see. Frederick Attenborough was also a teacher at the school. The couple were married in 1922 and three children followed: Richard, David and John.

Frederick was appointed to Leicester in 1932 and the family lived on campus in College House, which is today surrounded



by the blocks and towers of later university development. Mary soon embarked on various social projects in the city, founding a luncheon club and a local branch of the Soroptimists, who campaign to improve the lives of women. She was active in another organization that provided support for girls from the North of England who came to find work in Leicester. She became a marriage guidance counsellor and a magistrate and continued those roles for the rest of her life.

In 1936, Mary led Leicester's movement to receive Basque children fleeing the Spanish

Civil War. They leased Evington Hall to house 50 of the children and David remembers his mother scrubbing the floors to make it fit for their arrival. With the rise of the Nazi Party in Germany, Frederick became involved in helping Jewish academics move to the UK. Through these connections, he and Mary learned of the three Bejach girls, who were under threat as daughters of a Jewish doctor. The two voungest, Helga and Irene, escaped Germany on one of the final Kindertransport evacuations and the Attenboroughs took them in. The expectation was that the girls would soon travel on to join their uncles in New York but that proved impossible and in fact they stayed on as part of the Attenborough household until 1946. The girls' father had died in Auschwitz but they built new lives in America, always remaining in touch with their adoptive family.

In 1951, Frederick retired and he and Mary moved to London to be closer to their sons. There, Mary continued her good works until her life was sadly cut short in a car accident in 1961.

Richard Graves' biography of Mary Attenborough was published in 2022, with a foreword by Sir David, and it can be bought online. Richard also urged the University to provide some recognition for Mary, as a result of which her name has now been given to one of the buildings on the new Freeman's Common site.

Over the summer months, we arrange outings instead of indoor meetings. This year, we start with a walking tour of Anstey on the evening of Tuesday 17th June (£3 per person). The outings are not normally open to visitors but please contact us through the website if you would like to join.






