a free hot meal and dessert - you don't have to book a place. And there is help at hand if you need some support with the Cost of Living crisis that many are experiencing.




The Feast Day of Catherine and William Booth- Wednesday 2nd July 2025.

On this day in 1865, they began preaching the gospel to the working poor in London. England, thereby launching a work that would lead to the establishment of the Salvation Army.

Catherine Booth was wife of General William Booth and co-founder of the Salvation Army. She was born at 13 Sturston Lane (now Road), Ashbourne in 1829. There is a bust to her in Ashbourne Park.

Catherine Booth (nee Mumford) was born in humble circumstances in Ashbourne on 17 January 1829, although she was baptised in Derby. Her father, John Mumford, was a wheelwright and an itinerant preacher, and the family had moved to Ashbourne in 1827 at the end of the Town's heyday as a coaching centre. The major influence on Catherine's life was her Mother, Sarah. When she moved to Ashbourne, Sarah had started to attend St Oswald's Church but was unhappy with the Church and, as the Methodists gathered strength locally, Sarah became an ardent convert imprinting Methodism onto her daughter.



to become the Secretary of the Juvenile Temperance Society. In 1843, Catherine suffered a serious illness and, during her recovery she studied the Bible. In 1844, the family moved to Brixton, South London, but Sarah and Catherine thought the local Methodists there lacked zeal. Catherine went on to join the Wesleyan Reformers, where she was to meet her future husband, William Booth of Nottingham. They married on 17 June 1855 and became itinerant preachers travelling throughout Britain, but suffered health and financial difficulties; despite this they had 8 children.

William and Catherine returned to London in 1865. William became involved in the East London Christian Mission whilst Catherine preached in the wealthier parts of London to raise funds. Despite concerns about how they would be received, the development of their work far exceeded expectations. By offering a path to God and a wide range of welfare initiatives, the Salvation Army became the fastest growing religious movement of late Victorian Britain.

By the time of Catherine's death in 1890, there were 3,996 Centres of Work, over 85 social welfare projects and the Army was operating in over 32 countries world wide. Catherine's contribution was recognised by the Methodist Times who called her "the greatest Methodist



woman of her generation"; 50,000 people filed past her coffin at Olympia and, at her burial in Stoke Newington, the numbers had to be limited to 10,000.

Today, The Salvation Army is a church and charity that is active in virtually every corner of the world and serves in more than 130 countries offering God's hope and love to all those in need without discrimination.

When I left Theological College, I realised how little I knew, and how much more God had to show me. Forty years later He is still surprising me. Those lovely books we had recently about the Lord's Prayer is but one example. "Give us today our daily bread," refers, of course, not only to physical feeding but also to the spiritual feeding we all need if we are not to be malnourished in that respect. Here at Heath Court, four of us use a quarterly journal called New Daylight which says on its' cover that it is "sustaining our daily journey with the Bible". Printed first is a quote from the Bible, just a few verses, and then background material, ending in a quote or short prayer. Half a dozen of our church family use this too.

Some people us Daily Bread Ministries booklets which usually only give a line from the Bible, then comment. One excellent thing about this particular publication is that, at the back, as with the Gideon Bible, there is a list of what might be troubling you, worries, illness, lack of faith, whatever, and which page to turn to for help and other places to look in your Bible.

At least one person here and 8/9 in our church family us The UCB Word for the Day. Again, just a short quote is the starter for the writer to show you how your daily life can be laid alongside things God has already taught us. Some will warn that a line or short passage taken out of context can be misleading but these are chosen for our good not ill.

There are more publications to help us grow in faith than at any time since printing was invented. The publications quoted would take up only 5 minutes of your day. Bearing in mind Jesus gave his life for us, just a few minutes of our daily routine is not an unreasonable response. Some people read these first thing, one lady whilst eating her breakfast, one gentleman just before he cleans his teeth last thing at night. People outside the church assume we not only talk to God daily in prayers and that we read our Bibles "religiously" and it's nice to get help in fitting both of those into our increasingly busy everyday.

One of the good things about these booklets is that, if you fall behind, as they come out every few months, you can ask God's forgiveness and start gain.

It might be that you already use something other than the above and it would be good to hear about what you find helpful in your current choice. What suits you may well be just the job for someone else's growth.

See myself, Paul Desborough or David Macdonald for sight of one of these publications and really get the daily bread and nourishment God has on offer for you.

Treasurer's Update

Whilst you will read about the details elsewhere in this issue, as the Church Treasurer, I cannot let the moment pass without saying what an absolutely wonderful thing we did as a Church (and I mean you the people, not the building) in raising the £5,000 in our Give to go Green appeal. In the 6 weeks of the appeal, we managed to raise that amount of money. I am delighted that so many of you embraced this, although when I was told the criteria that we had to meet, I honestly did wonder if we could do it. Well, we did do it, not just about, but we did it with flying colours and there should be a fanfare as well. If you did give to this appeal or took part in it, thank you, you certainly did very well, if you didn't, well.....!!!

The next question is, how is the Church doing on the financial front in general since we are now halfway through the year. The answer is reasonably well. We are continuing to meet all our financial obligations in that we are paying all our bills and our assessment to the three denominations on time. I know that it has been and is still a difficult time financially for many of us, particularly after the raft of increases we all felt in April; this is the month when all the utilities rise along with the Council Tax, telephones etc. I thought I would take this opportunity to thank you all for, not just what you give financially to the Church, but also for everything you do. Without you, we are literally nothing.

Summer is a good time for us financially in some ways because our electricity and especially our gas charges reduce, it's a good time for the accounts to recover from the challenging winter period. You may not have thought so, but the summer months see a dramatic fall in our income from the hire charges paid by the groups, for part of July and whole of August they don't meet. This is just the time when we don't have to heat the building. It's just the way it works.

Take a moment to just pause.......





A big part of my role down on Infinity Garden Village is serving the local primary school - Ash Croft Primary Academy. As you know, I do seasonal assemblies, help out with lessons and we have a permanent reflective space in the school with prayer activities. I go into school every Thursday at lunchtime to spend time with the children who take time out to reflect and talk and do the activities.

I also go into school once a year to run a Transition lesson for the Year 6 children preparing to go up to secondary school. This I simply love to do. It is always chaotic, noisy but lots of fun. This year was no exception. Thirty eight Year 6 on a very hot day in a mobile classroom took a morning out to stop and

pause and really think about the changes happening in their lives as they leave the known space in their primary school and step into a very different space in a variety of secondary schools across the city.

I always begin and end with meditative activities - starting with the clam jars filled with glitter to watch settle and finishing with an activity about identity using small stones - as they are encouraged to reflect on the smooth and rough parts of their characters and yet they are all wonderfully and beautifully made. Each is different, unique and perfect in a multitude of ways.





We thought about friends and drew them on large flowers. Considered the joys and challenges of moving up to Secondary School drawing them on the wings of butterflies. Dreamt about the future, making paper chains of the things they aspire to. And - the activity they always love - they made themselves on plasticine and considered the valuable part they play in the community that is school.

The following day they were heading off for three days in their new schools - my prayer is that we gave them space to pause, even for just a moment and reflect, celebrating them for the wonderful, amazing creations they each are.

A very big thank you to all of you who supported in any way our Give to Go Green campaign, I have now had confirmation that the £5000.00 that we raised is being matched by the Church of England, and that money should account during July. be in our The work on the Solar Panels should start in August and then we look forward to having reduced electricity bills, this will also give a very big step forward towards obtaining our Gold Environmental Award, however, we are not quite there yet as we still have a few more steps to complete.

A little later in the year we hope with Church Councils approval, to be able to plant some trees and possibly a hawthorn hedge, this will encourage wildlife providing food and shelter, we would also like to set up proper recycling facilities, we currently only recycle card and paper in the office.

All these steps will go together to reduce our carbon footprint and help us to do our bit towards making our environment a little greener.
