#### Sermon

#### **The Nicene Creed**

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. # The Eucharistic Prayer

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

After the words of Consecration the priest says:

Praise to you, Lord Jesus: Christ has died, Christ is Risen, Christ will come again!

At the conclusion of the prayer the Priest takes the chalice and the paten with the hostand, raising both, he says

Through him, and with him, and in him, O God, almighty Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honour is yours, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

#### **Giving of Communion**

After his private prayers of preparation the Priest genuflects, takes the host and, holding it slightly raised above the paten or above the chalice says aloud: Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Blessed are those who are called to his supper. Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

The Priest and people receive Holy Communion. Everyone is invited to come to the altar rails. If you are Baptised and Confirmed or a Communicant Member of your own Church you're most welcome to receive The Sacrament, otherwise please do come up for a Blessing keeping your head bowed.

#### Communion Antiphon Ps 110: 4-5

The Lord, the gracious, the merciful, has made a memorial of his wonders; he gives food to those who fear him.

#### **Prayer after Communion**

Let us pray. All pray in silence. Then the Priest says the Prayer after Communion: Graciously be present to your people, we pray, O Lord, and lead those you have imbued with heavenly mysteries to pass from former ways to newness of life. Through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

**Background on Today's Gospel Reading** It's a fascinating detail that the parable of the Samaritan begins with 'a certain man', while our reading this week about Mary and Martha opens with 'a certain woman'. The Samaritan shows us how a disciple should see and act; Mary shows us how a disciple should listen.

Like the Samaritan, Mary was someone on the margins of society. Both do what is not expected of them. In those days, a woman's place was not at the feet of a teacher, among the men. She was expected to be like her sister, Martha, busy with the duties of hospitality. Here again, Jesus breaks with the social conventions of his time. A Samaritan would never have been chosen as a model of neighbourliness, just as a woman would not have been expected to sit and learn like a male disciple.

Together, these two stories show us how a disciple can fulfil the great commandment that introduces this chapter of Luke's Gospel: to love God (as Mary does) and to love our neighbour (as the Samaritan does). These are the two essentials of life in the kingdom.

In choosing a Samaritan and a woman as his examples, however, Jesus is telling us something more. Social codes and boundaries were strict in Jesus' time, yet to love God with all one's heart and one's neighbour as oneself requires us to challenge those rules. The Kingdom of God is a community without distinctions and boundaries between its members. It is a community that requires times for seeing and doing, and also times for listening and learning at the feet of the Lord.

**Lighting Candles** The tradition of lighting candles is an ancient and meaningful practice within the Church. Its origins can be traced to the Old Testament, where a lamp was kept burning in the Temple - a perpetual flame signifying God's enduring presence and the passing of His light from one generation to the next.

For us as Christians, this light finds its ultimate meaning in Christ himself, who declared, "I am the Light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life" (\$John\, 8:12\$).

You will see this powerful symbolism woven throughout our worship. Candles burn on the altar during the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, they are carried in liturgical processions, and they bring a warm and prayerful glow to nighttime services like Evensong. In many churches, a sanctuary lamp burns continually, reminding us of the special presence of our Lord and calling us to approach Him with reverence and love.

Many people also find it helpful to light a votive candle as a focus for their personal prayers. When we light a candle before an icon of Christ, or in a chapel dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary or a saint, we honour the one whom the image represents. The lit candle becomes a tangible symbol of our prayer - an offering where we present our petitions to God.

As the flame continues to burn, it can represent our desire to remain in God's presence throughout our daily lives and can serve as a quiet reminder that our prayers are joined with those of the whole company of heaven. Above all, a candle lit in prayer is a symbol of our devotion to Christ, who alone is worthy of our praise and thanksgiving, and who continually calls us into a deeper relationship with God.

The simple, gentle light of a candle can help to quiet our minds and hearts, creating a peaceful atmosphere for our own prayer and meditation.

Here at S Lawrence's, we invite you to embrace this quiet and meaningful tradition. You have the opportunity to light a candle in front of our altar for your own prayers, either before or after all our Eucharists.

Alternatively, for non-urgent calls, Father Paul is generally available between 15:30 and 17:45 Monday to Friday, provided he's not otherwise engaged.
