

This is Shân's sermon on the feast of St Peter and St Paul:

Peter and Paul were two of the greatest leaders of the early church. Peter, along with James the brother of Jesus, was the acknowledged leader of the church in Jerusalem, and as we've just heard, the early church believed that he was commissioned by Jesus himself to be the rock that the church was to be built on.

Paul founded churches across the non-Jewish world, the world of the Roman empire beyond Palestine, from where it eventually spread to every corner of the globe.

Without these two, there would not have been a church as we know it. And yet neither of them had a straightforward or an unblemished career, and both of them have a lot to teach us about forgiveness.

Let's start with Peter. We know more about Peter than about any other disciple, and a lot of what we know about him shows him getting things wrong, even though he always means to do right. He means to do right, but his faith isn't strong enough.

He is the disciple who tries to walk to Jesus across the water, but his courage and his faith both fail him and he starts to sink. When Jesus tells the disciples about his coming death in Jerusalem, Peter doesn't have enough faith in him to accept that he knows what has to be done. Instead, he argues, and Jesus gives him a harsh rebuke: 'Get behind me, Satan.'

It gets worse. Peter is one of those who fall asleep when Jesus has asked them to stay awake and pray, and when Jesus allows himself to be arrested in the garden of Gethsemane, Peter attacks the high priest's servant with a sword.

He is the leader of the disciples, and Jesus continually criticises them all for their lack of faith and slow understanding. And, his worst failure of all, after Jesus has been arrested he follows him into the High Priest's house, intending to die for him if necessary, but when he's put on the spot he denies even knowing him.

And yet, this is the man to whom Jesus says, 'You are the Rock on which I will build my church.' So despite his repeated failures, Jesus not only forgives him, but gives him this huge future trust.

So Peter shows us that there is no limit to Jesus's forgiveness, and that even though our faith in **him** is weak and unreliable, Jesus's faith in **us** is unlimited and certain.

But forgiveness isn't an easy, comfortable thing. It involves our facing up to our failures in love that hurt other people, our acts of selfishness, our giving in to temptation when we know we ought to fight it. Having faced up to them, we have to be sorry for them.

After he denied knowing Jesus, we're told that Peter went outside and wept bitterly. Some of us can do this bit really well, we're really good at torturing ourselves with remorse, even if we don't show it on the outside. But are we as good at the next steps? Because the next step is letting go of the guilt and the misery, it is accepting the new start that Jesus offers us.

If you're an Archers fan, you'll know that young mum Alice has been in agonies of remorse in case her alcoholism when her daughter Martha was a baby is the cause of Martha's behaviour problems now. And of course it might be, or it might not – no-one can ever know.

But the point is that Martha needs Alice to be her best self now – not a guilt-ridden, tormented mum but an active, loving and positive one – no matter how much Alice feels like wallowing in guilt. Peter denied knowing Jesus three times. But later he affirmed his love for Jesus three times. And love overcomes sin and guilt every time. It was his love that made him the rock on which Jesus built his church.

So Peter can teach us a lot about accepting God's forgiveness for ourselves. It's not just God's gift to us, but a duty, sometimes a very hard duty, that he imposes on us. But what about extending forgiveness to those who hurt us?

Let's look at what Paul's story can teach us here. He was a famous persecutor of Christians. He actually looked after the coats of the religious mob who killed Stephen by stoning him. He almost literally had the blood of Christians on his hands.

So it's easy to imagine how the Christian community reacted when he turned up claiming to have had a complete change of heart and to be a committed follower of Jesus now. Even though they knew God performed miracles – even though they

Luke tells us that the disciples in Jerusalem were afraid of Paul, because they didn't believe in his conversion. It took years of Paul proving himself by working tirelessly for Jesus in distant provinces far away from Jerusalem, as well as the testimony of respected disciples like Ananias and Barnabas, before he was really accepted and trusted by those in Jerusalem.

Perhaps some of them never trusted him – would **you** have forgiven someone who had directly caused the imprisonment and execution of your friends? And yet, that was what God told them to do. And because of that, the Christian church survived the destruction of Jerusalem and spread all over the Roman empire.

So from Paul's story we learn something else about forgiveness. God's forgiveness is immediate and unconditional, all you have to do is to turn to him. But what follows from that is the hard graft of showing through your actions as well as your words that you are a changed person.

It might take years, as it did for Paul. But forgiveness not only offers a new start to the person being forgiven; it also begins the process of healing for the person who forgives.

It's hard to forgive others, it's hard to forgive ourselves. Perhaps at the moment you can't forgive yourself, or you can't forgive someone else. It isn't something that can be forced, but don't be deceived – it **is** a sin to believe that someone, whether you or someone else, can never be forgiven or that they shouldn't be forgiven.

God's forgiveness is offered to everyone who's sorry and wants to do better in future – and that includes you and me, but also that person who's hurt or offended us so deeply. In Luke's words, we pray, 'Forgive us our sins, for we ourselves forgive everyone who sins against us.' **Amen.**
