<u>Meditation</u>

Last week we a had a narrative centring on the prophet Elijah, and he will remain centre stage through June and July. So back to Elijah's beginning.

The kingdom which had been a unity under his father David split into two under Solomon's sons. Slumbering opposition between North and South flared up leaving the line of David ruling over the southern kingdom, Judah, with its capital and Temple in Jerusalem, and a northern Kingdom, Israel, with its capital at Samaria with places of sacrifice at both Bethel and Dan, each, would you believe it with a golden calf. It's as if we were back in the wilderness and not entered the land that the Eternal One gave for living with the Torah and to make a kingdom of God.

Kings come and kings go. Omri became a mighty king of Israel, but who walked in the wave of the calves, personified in the God Baal. As part of a trading deal with the Phoenician coastal cities, he married his son Ahab to their princess Jezebel. Ahab, a chip off the old block, walked in the way of the Golden calves, he served and bowed down before Baal. Now Israel reached a nadir, even sacrificing his own child. Are these cruel child sacrifices only belonging to the distant past? In our day, children are driven out over mine fields to spare soldiers, and are targets of drones and missiles. And how many parents are prepared to sacrifice their children on the altars of happiness and prestige? The golden calves, the Baals are still served and bowed down to.

It is in our narrative now high time for the prophetic word of God to be heard again in Israel, and look, suddenly Elijah is there, quite out of the blue. Elijah the Tishbite – his name means "The Lord is God". That means Baal is not God, a land that makes Baal god is subject to barrenness, 'As the Lord loves, the God of Israel, in whose service I stand, there shall be no dew or rain in these years except through my word, ' If things go well between heaven and earth, between God and humanity, then the good earth brings forth good fruit, and people do good works. The earth that wants to be the earth under heaven is fruitful, just like those who want to live under the kingly rule of God. Not just fruitful in any way, but at the word of the Lord. If the word of the Lord is no longer heard, then Baal rules, the god of avarice and possessions, the god who makes people walk over dead bodies. Then nothing good will grow any more. After Elijah has spoken his prophecy of doom, the ground is taken from him under his feet. Ahab and Jezebel seek to kill him. A voice tells him he most flee and hide.

"Baal, Baal, send rain." But Baal is deaf to the cry of his people. No rain falls, no dew falls, the land of milk and honey withers, the brook of Cherith has dried up.

The word of the Eternal One came to Elijah: "Go to Zarephath in Sidon and settle there. There I shall command a widow woman from a pagan background to give you food." *In Sidon.* Will a widow woman from the pagan land of queen Jezebel have pity on a prophet of Israel's God? Elijah went. When he arrived at the city gate he saw a woman in black gathering wood. ' "Bring me a little water in a vessel, so that I may drink." As she was going to bring it, he called to her and said, "Bring me a morsel of bread in your hand." '

She turned round, "*As the Lord your God lives, I have nothing baked, only a handful of meal in a jar, and a little oil in a jug; I am now gathering a couple of sticks, so that I may go home and prepare it for myself and my son, that we may eat it, and die.*"'

Elijah replied: "Do not be afraid; go and do as you have said; but first make me a little cake of it and bring it to me, and afterwards make something for yourself and your son. For thus says the Lord the God of Israel: The jar of meal will not be emptied and the jug of oil will not fail until the day that the Lord sends rain on the earth."

The woman went home and did as Elijah had told her. That is the second miracle in the story: that this widow woman from the pagans did what the prophet told her. Unlike queen Jezebel, that rich powerful woman who seeks to kill Elijah, the poor widow of Zarephath, trusting in the Lord of Israel has pity on the man of God. She opens her house to him in hospitality. The flour pot did not run out, nor the oil in the jar.

The widow of Zarephath has only one child, a precious possession for a mother all on her own in those as in all days: the boy is the provision for her old age. Then, having barely escaped death by famine, the boy falls ill,

seriously ill. Life flowed out of him until '*there was no breath left in him.*' The boy lay motionless in her lap. The mother was inconsolable. "How are things with you, Man of God? Did you come here to my house to remember my unrighteousness and to make my son die?" No, the Man of God has come to show up the unrighteousness of Jezebel. We are soon told that her sons die. Jezebel is granted no future. But it's different with the life to which the widow of Zarephath gave birth.

Elijah lifted the little corpse from her lap, and carried it carefully upstairs, to the room where he lodged, put it down on his bed. "O God, Lord of all life, Lord over death, give us a sign of your loving-kindness and make the breath of life return to this small boy. Cause no evil for the widow who gives hospitality to me as a guest by making her son die."

In prayer Elijah stretched himself full length over the child, three times. He embraced the dead child with all his life. "Lord God, let the soul of the boy return within him." The Eternal one heard Elijah's prayer; he made the soul of the boy return within him. And Elijah took the child, brought him down from then upper room, and gave him to his mother. "Look, your son lives." The woman said to Elijah "You are truly a man of God. The word of the Lord is trustworthy in your mouth."

Centuries later the evangelist Luke will make a story about Jesus fit this story about Elijah. Jesus too meets a widow woman, also at the city gate, and she too has a son, her only one, whom she has lost. It is also written of Jesus who restored him to his mother, and the story ends too with a joyful recognition that a great prophet has arisen. Again a glimpse of heaven has been caught on earth.

Blessed are those whose spirit has been shaped by poverty; for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who are sick at heart to see power abused; for they shall be invited to the feast. Blessed are those who are not arrogant; for they shall inherit the earth, Blessed are those who are desperate for justice; for they shall eat and drink their fill. Blessed are the compassionate; for they shall have compassion shown to them when they need it. Blessed are those who refuse to be corrupted; for they shall not be afraid to come face to face with God. Blessed are those who bring about peace; for they shall truly be called God's own. Blessed are those who carry wounds suffered in the struggle for justice; for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

O God you have made us creatures of this earth, hungry and thirsty and needy, that you might satisfy our longings with your abundant love. Satisfy the hunger of our bodies for food and shelter, health and human touch. Satisfy the needs of our spirits for dignity and freedom in giving and receiving. Satisfy the hunger of our minds to understand our world, the reasons for its pain, the ways we are connected to each other. Satisfy the hunger of our hearts that all who share this loving earth with us shall share our satisfaction. And satisfy the hunger of our hands to help us make it so, through Jesus Christ. Amen

But she said, 'As the Lord your God lives, I have nothing baked, only a handful of meal in a jar, and a little oil in a jug; I am now gathering a couple of sticks, so that I may go home and prepare it for myself and my son, that we may eat it, and die.' Elijah said to her, 'Do not be afraid; go and do as you have said; but first make me a little cake of it and bring it to me, and afterwards make something for yourself and your son. For thus says the Lord the God of Israel: The jar of meal will not be emptied and the jug of oil will not fail until the day that the Lord sends rain on the earth.' She went and did as Elijah said, so that she as well as he and her household ate for many days. The jar of meal was not emptied, neither did the jug of oil fail, according to the word of the Lord that he spoke by Elijah. After this the son of the woman, the mistress of the house, became ill; his illness was so severe that there was no breath left in him. She then said to Elijah, 'What have you against me, O man of God? You have come to me to bring my sin to remembrance, and to cause the death of my son!' But he said to her, 'Give me your son.' He took him from her bosom, carried him up into the upper chamber where he was lodging, and laid him on his own bed. He cried out to the Lord, 'O Lord my God, have you brought calamity even upon the widow with whom I am staying, by killing her son?' Then he stretched himself upon the child three times, and cried out to the Lord, 'O Lord my God, let this child's life come into him again.'cThe Lord listened to the voice of Elijah; the life of the child came into him again, and he revived. Elijah took the child, brought him down from the upper chamber into the house, and gave him to his mother; then Elijah said, 'See, your son

is alive.' So the woman said to Elijah, 'Now I know that you are a man of God, an that the word of the Lord in your mouth is truth.'

Gospel of Luke 9 v51-62

When the days drew near for him to be taken up, Jesus set his face to go to Jerusalem. And he sent messengers ahead of him. On their way they entered a village of the Samaritans to make ready for him; but they did not receive him, because his face was set towards Jerusalem. When his disciples James and John saw it, they said, 'Lord, do you want us to command fire to come down from heaven and consume them?' But he turned and rebuked them. Then they went on to another village. As they were going along the road, someone said to him, 'I will follow you wherever you go.' And Jesus said to him, 'Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head.' To another he said, 'Follow me.' But he said, 'Lord, first let me go and bury my father.' But Jesus said to him, 'Let the dead bury their own dead; but as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God.' Another said, 'I will follow you, Lord; but let me first say farewell to those at my home.' Jesus said to him, 'No one who puts a hand to the plough and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God.'
