Flower festivals in English parish churches are a long-standing tradition, bringing communities together around joy, gratitude, and faith

Our recent Holy Cross Flower Festival embodied that same spirit, drawing in almost 1,000 people from beyond our regular congregation, combining fun with community and worship.

Wandering around Holy Cross admiring the flowers arrangements it is impossible for visitors not to be moved by the atmosphere of our ancient Church.

Founded around 1190 during the reign of Richard the Lionheart, the church's original distinctive Greek-cross layout stands as an enduring reminder of its medieval origins.

Over the centuries the fortunes of Holy Cross have waxed and waned. Surviving Henry VIII's reformation, a murderous vicar and many years of neglect that resulted in the walls becoming green and dangerous and the floors full of holes!

But through all these traumas Sarratt villagers have continued to worship in this special place of peace and calm, receiving comfort and inspiration from within its ancient walls.

The doors of Holy Cross are open daily, and everyone is welcome to come in for prayer, reflection, or simply to enjoy the beauty within the medieval walls. Whether on a quiet weekday or during a festival, you're always welcome at Holy Cross, where flowers and faith bloom together.

Margaret Newman 2033 to 2025

Margaret lived all of her life in Bucks Hill in a house her father built in 1929 at a time when there was no mains water or drainage to the area. A large underground tank was built in the back garden storing rainwater from the house gutters with a pump and hose to the kitchen sink. Margaret recounted how she and her younger sister, Christine, were despatched to clean out the storage tank in the dry summer months.



During WW2, Margaret was age 6-13, Christine about 3 years younger. During the London Blitz, SW Herts was part of the route for returning aircraft to their base airfields in central Europe. Whilst airfields like Bovingdon would be targeted with remaining munitions to reduce weight and preserve fuel reserves for the return journey - dropped across open countryside. Margaret recently recalled a time when she and Christine were playing in the garden and a bomb exploded in the farmland to the rear of their home. The resulting blast lifted both in the air and sent them across the garden fortunately with no serious injury.

Her family were active regular attendees at Holy Cross church. Her father Edwin was church organist for many years and Margaret took over from him when he stepped back with health issues. Both Margaret and Christine were active in the church choir and many other village activities. Christine's life was reported in Spotlight Sept 22 edition.

Margaret's career was as a teacher; we have little detail, but know that she was able to teach pupils with special needs, possibly a rarity then.

Margaret Newman and her sister, Christine, ran for many years the Chipperfield branch of the Royal National Life-Boat Institution. In recognition of their many years of house-to-house collecting and service the RNLI presented both with awards. The presentation took place on 7 June 2001 at a Presentation of Awards Ceremony at Robinson College, Cambridge. The event was attended by over 200 people and was a most enjoyable occasion.

The following recollections are from some of their many local friends.

Memory of Margaret from John Guy

Margaret Newman and her sister Christine helped with the collation, bagging and distribution of many editions of Spotlight and Margaret had her own Spotlight delivery round in parts of Bucks Hill and Penmans Green. Both sisters worshipped at Holy Cross, Sarratt Parish Church, in their younger years and sang in the choir. Holy Cross always had a special place in their hearts.

Margaret and her friend Joan Grego were part of a prayer group that used to meet regularly in the home of June & Michael Clark. It was an annual event for Margaret to help at the Holy Cross Flower Festival.,

initially helping Percy Saunders on his plant and bric-a-brac stall under the ancient yew tree, then helping Noreen Tatham when she took over the Yew Tree Stall from Percy, and then helping John Guy when he took over from Noreen.

Memory of Margaret from Carol Chorley

When the Mothers Union closed, the Friendship Club started and Margaret joined as a volunteer and made the tea for many years until she was unable to do so. During these years, the Care Lunch also started and again she volunteered to help, coming along a short while before it started and helping to carry the meals to the diners then helping to clear up before quietly leaving to go home. Eventually health and age began to take its toll but unwilling to join the diners she quietly retired. She was a very private lady who came along and quietly helped with both of these organisations.

Memory of Margaret from Linda Clough (widow of David Clough organist at Holy Cross from 1976-2023)

Margaret used to help at Care Lunch setting up and as a server, and she and Christine used to make sandwiches for the Flower Festival lunches and probably cakes. Margaret played the organ until David was appointed in 1976.

Sarratt Community Garden

It's been a long while since we last gave an update, but having finished a first draft of my thesis, I have been able to take a breath, and take stock of the garden.

The hot dry spring created near perfect conditions for pollination – lots of pollinating insects were out and about, it wasn't very windy in a way that blows off fruit tree blossoms, and there wasn't a severe late frost. As a result, we have had fruit-set like never before, including APRICOTS, plums, greengages, apples, pears and quinces – very exciting.

But then came a prolonged dry spell – until 18 July, there hadn't been any significant rain since February, and it was getting desperate. Our methods are very water-conscious – we mulch heavily, never leave bare soil, and collect rainwater (18,000 litres at the Community Garden), but even then, the garden was suffering. The relief when the heavens opened, not just for a paltry hour or two, but for days, was palpable!

This year's volunteers are incredible – always cheerful and hardworking, whether attacking bindweed, thinning apples, watering, manning the stall, making up flower bouquets or doing the accounts. I have been forced to delegate this year, due to my full time MSc, and they have more-than risen to the challenge of keeping this wonderful project alive and thriving.

Our usual meeting in Sarratt Village Hall was replaced in July by a very enjoyable outing to Waterperry Gardens in

Oxfordshire. Waterperry was previously a horticultural school and we all enjoyed the fabulous colours of the flowers within the eight acres of

ornamental gardens. The current custodian is the educational charity, The School of Philosophy and Economic Science. Some of us went on the Philosopher's Trail along the river path where there are oak plaques hand carved with thought-provoking words such as self-control, goodwill, forgiveness, endurance, goodness and compassion.

After lunch, we gathered for a tour of Waterperry House, a historic country house with 17th and 19th century additions. The highlight, however, was the frescoes completed in 2006 which cover a large interior area of the house extending to three floors. The project involved re-discovering the art of fresco, painting directly into wet



plaster, and took 12 years to complete. It is one of the largest frescoes of its type in the UK. We were highly entertained by our guide as he recounted the



stories depicted on the walls. Our grateful thanks to Diane Wade for organising the trip.

Our July walk was in Chalfont St Giles, finishing with lunch at Rowans Garden Centre.



Parish Council Report

The following report covers the key points arising from the SPC Meeting held on **Tuesday 8 July**.

PLANNING

- Sarratt Neighbourhood Plan The Examiner has requested a few minor changes, which the NP sub-committee will work with TRDC on. It will then go the TRDC Planning & Resources Committee to approve moving to a referendum. All being well the referendum should take place early in the autumn. SPC will encourage all parishioners to vote at the referendum and ideally in favour of adopting the plan.
- Right Of Way Footpath 34 Consultation An email with details on the consultation encouraging parishioners to participate will be sent out on the SPC email distribution list and flyers placed in the Village Shop. Responses need to be made to Herts County Council (HCC) before 21 July. The proposal is to turn footpath 34 along the tarmac track to John Adam's Nurseries into a combined pedestrian and cycle path as this is a pre-requisite requirement from the Burlington Property Group planning permission appeal, that requires it to be agreed before the next stages of the development can progress.
- Clovercourt Development: 25/1028/FUL Houses to the rear of 76 to 78 Church Lane: A Full Planning Application has now been submitted for this. Church Lane residents from homes close to the site attended the meeting to express their concerns over the development. Cllr Farman explained that as Outline Planning Permission had been granted on Appeal, the development would likely go ahead, but comments could be made on the details now presented in the Full Planning Application. Parishioners wishing to view the application should type the reference number 25/1028/FUL into the search field on the TRDC Planning Portal:

https://www3.threerivers.gov.uk/online-applications

Looking at what is being proposed by the developers in this application, concerns are now emerging that conditions placed on the initial outline permission being granted have been altered:

- The initial 20 homes defined as affordable and shared ownership has been reduced to 10 market priced and 10 affordable.
- No community amenity is included required if the new homes are not all affordable.
- The mix of 2, 3 and 4 bed homes has also altered with more of the larger properties.
- Sufficient parking allocation in the light of the alteration of the type of homes.

Cllr Farman asked the residents for copies of any information relating to the above or any other aspect that may challenge the proposed plans for the site to be shared with SPC to support their response to the application.

TRDC new Local Plan - The TRDC Full Council approved a further Reg 18 Consultation at their meeting on 8 July. The consultation will last 6 weeks from 16 July to 31 August. Parishioners can view this here: https://www.threerivers.gov.uk/news/local-plan-regulation-18consultation There are 9 sites in the Parish which parishioners may wish to comment on. SPC is concerned over the size of some of the developments on these new sites, and that they may be being assessed in isolation without consideration of their proximity to other sites in this consultation or sites already approved for development in the Parish. In addition, TRDC are only required to consult on the new sites arising from their recent call for new sites, which went out in order to increase the number of new homes they need to build in the district over the next 16 years to meet the new target of 13,500 homes by 2036 set by central government. They may also decide to put previously rejected sites back into the plan to meet or get close to the target number of houses. SPC's concern is because these previously rejected sites have already been consulted on (of which there were some in Sarratt), they do not form part of this latest consultation. So SPC has no visibility of the full list that could go through to Reg 19 in the Autumn, by which time it is very hard to change the proposed sites. SPC is working with the other Parish Councils and the Residents Associations to raise their concerns with TRDC.

• Government's new Planning and Infrastructure Bill

This new bill currently going through parliamentary consideration includes changes that aim to speed up planning decisions, such as:

• Small planning developments of between 9 to 50 dwellings may be overseen by Planning Officers with no comments being taken. This

- could mean Councillors cannot review Officers' decisions by reviewing them at Planning Committee meetings.
- Changes to the statutory consultee process may well streamline the process but may have negative unintended consequences.

Chris Berry at CPRE (Campaign to Protect Rural England) is to ascertain key details for Cllr Farman.

Planning Applications reviewed:

• 25/1123/PDE: Tarn, Dunny Lane, Belsize, WD4 9DQ - Prior Approval: Single storey rear extension (depth 8.00 metres, maximum height 4.00 metres, maximum eaves height 2.75 metres)

SPC: Noted. Although this represents a sizeable expansion, we welcome investment in this property. It is a shame that the previous, smaller scale and aesthetically preferable application for this site was refused. We encourage the applicant to use the opportunity of these changes to improve the energy efficiency of the dwelling beyond what is required by building regulations.

- 25/1146/PDT: Tarn, Dunny Lane, Belsize, WD4 9DQ Prior approval: Enlargement of the dwellinghouse by the construction of one additional storey (2.65m height) and raising of roof ridge to result in an overall height of 8.33m (Class AA) SPC: same comments..
- 25/1109/NMA: Sarratt School Non-materials amendment to planning permission 24/0990/FUL to allow alterations to external materials from timber cladding to brick. SPC: Noted

Recent TRDC Planning Decisions:

• 25/0949/CLPD: Toledo, The Green, Sarratt, WD3 6BS - Certificate of Lawfulness Proposed Development: Erection of an outbuilding

SPC: We support investment into this property but are concerned that the combination of this and the other two current separate applications will result in overdevelopment of this site. TRDC: Approved (note: no decisions on the other applications for this site yet)

• 25/0815/PDA: Great Sarratt Hall Farm, The Green, Sarratt - Prior Notification: Change of use of existing agricultural building to two residential dwellings with operational works and extension to building and associated curtilage and parking

SPC: While we would welcome the addition of three bedroom properties in Sarratt, we do not believe this is a sustainable location, as highlighted

by Herts Highways response and recommendations. We object to this application on the grounds that the barn has not been in agricultural use for many years and due to its adjacent location, this application will result in an impact to the Conservation Area. TRDC: Refused

- 25/0800/CLPD: 6 Belsize Cottages, Dunny Lane, Belsize, WD3
 4NP Certificate of Lawfulness Proposed Development: Loft conversion including rear dormer with juliet balcony and front rooflights SPC: Noted TRDC: Approved
- 25/0797/FUL: 6 Belsize Cottages, Dunny Lane, Belsize, WD3 4NP
 Demolition of existing conservatory and construction of single-storey rear extension SPC: No objection TRDC: Approved
- 25/0735/FUL & 25/0736/LBC: The White Cottage, The Green, Sarratt, WD3 6BL - Replacement windows including bays SPC: No objection TRDC: Approved
- 25/0726/FUL: Doggetts, Penmans Hill, Chipperfield, WD4 9DJ Partial demolition of existing dwelling and construction of part single, part two storey rear extensions. SPC: Although this proposal is a large increase in floor space, compared to the original building, we have no objection on the basis that this proposal is a minimal increase in footprint, has no impact on neighbours and would result in a better, more in keeping development compared to using permitted development options TRDC: Approved
- 25/0576/FUL: Lamington House, Penmans Hill, Chipperfield, WD4 9DJ Single storey extension to existing detached garage SPC: No objection on the basis this would result in a minimal increase in footprint of an existing building. TRDC: Approved
- 25/0438/FUL: The Grove Hotel, WD3 4TG Erection of golf academy building with associated infrastructure and landscaping works. SPC: No objection TRDC: Approved
- 24/1950/FUL: Cottage Farm, Redhall Lane, Chandlers Cross, WD3 4LT Demolition of existing buildings and construction of four dwellings including terraces with associated landscaping and parking provision. SPC: We welcome the intention to redevelop the underutilised and deteriorating existing buildings and the aim to bring biodiversity net gain to this site. As the site is in Green Belt, exceptional circumstances are needed to override policies to allow building of new dwellings. Unfortunately, we do not believe that 4 bedroom houses match the local needs and as such do not qualify as

exceptional circumstances. We would like to also note that it is understood that most of the current vehicle traffic enters the neighbouring site, so the result of this application may lead to an increase in vehicle traffic on the application site.

TRDC: Approved [restrictions added to the permission that remove rights for permitted development and further class changes, as well as prevention of external lighting without further planning permission]

• 25/0784/NAC: Land at Berrybushes Farm, Langleybury Lane, Kings Langley - Temporary planning permission for use of land for film making for 18 months to include construction of temporary set pieces storage, stationing of support services and parking. Dacorum Borough Council 25/01039/MFA TRDC: No objection

Planning Appeals:

No further updates to report on the following:

- <u>APP/P1940/W/25/3358883</u> 15 Church Lane <u>Subdivision of site and construction of detached bungalow with associated access and car parking</u>. Ref. No: 25/0002/REF

ENVIRONMENT AND SUSTAINABILITY

- Plans are being made now for further work to be undertaken in the Autumn on the Woodland Management Plan. There should be additional government funding for this.
- Morton's Pond is once again being cleared (in an ecologically sensitive way) by the Chiltern Society at no cost. Huge thanks to them.
- Ongoing thanks to the Wildlife Volunteers who continue to enrich the
 ecosystems, particularly in Commonwood where their work has
 enabled perennial and annual flowering plants to flourish and benefit
 local biodiversity.
- Likewise, thanks to the litter pickers, who make a huge difference to the appearance of the Parish.
- Please note, the watering of any young trees in the parish is open to all

 please do throw a bucket of water onto any tree you are passing –
 they will appreciate it!

- Gate repair on path across Dawes Lane to Dawes Woods Julian
 Thornton from the Herts RoW Team has asked his works team to get
 the gate re-hung on a new post as soon as possible as it has been
 outstanding since February.
- Re-routing footpath 34 onto the bend on Sarratt Road The Clerk advised this was now with the HCC RoW Team.
- Oak tree on the track leading to John Adam's nurseries The Clerk advised the fence had adjusted so it no longer abuts the tree.
- Land asset register and maintenance schedule currently being updated by the Clerk, Andrew Whitewood and Jo Deacon.

HIGHWAYS

Cllr Zerny gave an update on his progress on Highways issues with our new County Councillor Louise Price. Cllr Zerny advised:

- Cllr Price had been very pro-active in answering Cllr Zerny's requests for information and action.
- Gulley clearing in Buck's Hill, that a resident spoke about at the last SPC meeting, should be completed by September.
- The flooding episodes at Bucks Hill have been addressed by the Officers.
- North Hill and Bucks Hill resurfacing is not in the 2025/26 planned maintenance schedule. Cllr Zerny had hoped some of the less critical roadworks proposed could be deferred to the following year to create space to address North Hill and Buck's Hill, but this is unlikely. He will work with Cllr Price to ensure they are included early in the 2026/27 programme of work.
- Parishioners should continue to report all road faults and flooding on the HCC Highways portal.

POLICY AND RESOURCES

• **June payments & receipts** – these were approved, together with the bank reconciliations

- Q1 Budget Cllr Lowry presented the Q1 summary showing spend year to date against the budget was ca. 30%. This is to be expected due to the payment of the 2025/26 Grants in April and the summer months requiring more groundwork (mainly grass cutting) compared to the Autumn and Winter months.
- CCLA Public Sector Fund Cllr Lowry will ask the internal auditor if she has further recommendations at this stage, before opening the account and transferring £54,000 (equivalent to the 50% of Precept that SPC needs to hold in Reserves) agreed at the last SPC meeting in June. The CCLA account will generate a higher level of interest on monies held in Reserves than the existing SPC bank accounts.

OTHER MATTERS

KGV Pavilion and Playground Update

- The work on the pavilion refurbishment has now gone out to tender with 6 contractors requested to submit their quotations within a month. The shortlisting and assessment will be undertaken by Spicer Surveys who will make a recommendation to the Project Team. It is hoped to appoint a contractor in September.
- Cllr Alder has forwarded the recent ROSPA report on the playground to the equipment installer, who will attend to make the repairs, including addressing the height of the roundabout from the ground. Thanks were given to former Cllr Mortimer and Andrew Whitewood for undertaking the more minor repairs.

Local Government Reorganisation (LGR)

Cllr Farman shared the latest information received from various sources on the LGR process:

- This process, mandated by Government is to reorganise the current 11 councils in Hertfordshire (10 District Councils and the County Council) into unitary authorities that cover all the services provided by the councils. These unitary authorities will be part of a wider economic development area that has an elected mayor, a budget and strategic level remit for some services. It has not yet been determined which other areas Hertfordshire will be joined by for the economic development area.
- Hertfordshire have ruled out a single unitary authority option for their proposals due to be submitted to the Government in November, in part due to the fact that the population is too big (ca. 1.2 million

today). 500,000 or less is the recommended guideline. They are proposing options for the consultations for splitting Herts into 2, 3 or 4 Unitary Authorities.

- The parishes and existing town councils' structure will not be changed by these proposals.
- Consultations will move from private to public soon, where they will be seeking feedback on their proposals.

The next meeting on the LGR within the Three Rivers district with the Parish Councils is on 28 July.

Various Other....

- **Defib at Holy Cross Church** This is now on SPC's asset register, registered with the National Defib Circuit, added to SPC's insurance and added to Catapult defib maintenance schedule.
- Sarratt School the Village Hall have kindly donated their table tennis table, quick cricket and legs for a badminton net to the School. Thanks to Andrew Whitewood and Nick Mortimer for transferring the equipment from the hall.
