SEASON OF MISTS AND MELLOW FRUITFULNESS?

There is no formal Pastoral letter this month, so instead you will have to put up with some vague (secular) ramblings on Late Summer and Autumn, and the natural rhythms of life in our communities.

Discussions are taking place around our parishes, about which flowers, fruits and vegetables will be blooming and/or ripening in time for the Show season this year (Falstone Show is on 23rd August, Bellingham Show will be on the 30th August and the Bellingham and Tarset Leek Shows will both be held in early September). There is talk of jams (though not, necessarily, of Jerusalem), baking, crafting, coconuts, prize lambs and tombolas.

If you prefer music festivals to Shows (or if you have enough energy to attend both the shows and the festivals!) Redefest takes place in the first weekend of August and BAAfest will be in the first weekend in September. Both festivals are well worth going to and details can be found on their respective websites (just type their names into your internet search bars to find the websites).

Reports of wildlife activity in the area have also been coming in throughout July. No fewer than 527 bats were counted emerging from their roost at the Rectory in Bellingham on 14th July and a small herd of deer have been regularly invading the Rectory's garden - presumably for the sole purpose of providing a sounding-board for Claire when she is composing her sermons (nothing to do with the luscious plants which are so abundant in the Rectory garden, of course).

Elsewhere in the area, one unlucky resident lost four chickens to the depredations of the local Stoat(s) and in one Parishioner's garden, the Sparrowhawks have been very active (presumably while the parents have been feeding their young), evidenced by the small but nonetheless gruesome piles of feathers and other nameless remains, belonging to the various species of small birds that said residents have been carefully fattening up on their bird feeders! The local Greater Spotted Woodpeckers have had a successful breeding season and in one garden, the parents deposit (by which I mean 'abandon') their youngsters on the peanut feeder and go off to do whatever it is that adult Woodpeckers do when they've successfully distracted the majority of their brood with food, coming back to collect them an hour or so later. A number of people have also commented on an increased number of bees

BADDS (Bellingham and District Dramatic Society) has begun preparations for a Christmas production and plans are afoot all over our local parishes for all sorts of activities to see us through the winter months!

In the meantime, best wishes to you all from the Editor of this magazine, and I hope to see you at the shows!

Another quiet month for St. Francis - the numbers at our service on 22nd June were increased by the welcome visit of Moira from Otterburn and Diana from West Woodburn. It was lovely to see them and Claire.

Work at the old Petrol Station next to St. Francis is proceeding with the main building in the process of erection and access roads to the proposed lodges being made (see photo). Tons of top soil have been removed. The estimated completion time, I understand, is three years. On completion, there will be a café and workshops for local artisans, lodges and a fishing lake. We hope there could be some benefit to St. Francis - maybe from holiday people staying in the Lodges.

On 13th July, I completed the Race for Life in Exhibition Park, Newcastle for Cancer Research.

It was such a fun day and also moving - on our backs, we had cards saying who we were running for. Spirits were whipped up a super woman from Radio Newcastle and an aerobic warm-up. Everything was brilliantly organised so if you had entered for 3K or 5K there was no danger in getting on the wrong track and being stretchered out. I had such brilliant support with lots of people sponsoring me, even folk I hadn't seen for over ten years, so thanks to everyone. The Power of Social Media is amazing and the lives of most people have been touched by cancer in some way. The total for my race at the time of writing this report, is £651.25 (I'm delighted!!) and since Race for Life began. 30 years ago, it has raised over £970 million.

NEWS FROM CORSENSIDE

Graham Dick's evening event at Corsenside raised £730 for our two churches (St Cuthbert's, Corsenside and All Saints', West Woodburn). Thank you to all who contributed to the acts and for the provision of food. It was a privilege to hear Kathryn Tickell playing and to hear and see many other talented people.

On Sunday 6th July, Claire Maxim held a traditional Communion Service at St Cuthbert's, Corsenside. She gave an excellent sermon based on Luke's Gospel (chapter 10) and linked it to Richard Virden's reading from Galatians about circumcision, and the dangers of giving in to immorality and the dangers of desires, as opposed to spiritual purity. Claire mentioned the transcendental assistance that some misguided people might use – such as seeking the aid of tarot cards. The reading covered Satan falling from the sky and Jesus sending out his disciples to spread the word and to wipe the dust from the feet of anyone who refuses to listen. He urges them to accept hospitality from anyone who welcomes them, and is prepared to listen to the Word: "The worker deserves his wages". He also gives them the power to crush snakes and scorpions, and tells them to rejoice as their names will be written in heaven. He further emphasises that a man reaps what he sows and in Galatians, what counts more than circumcision is the New Creation.

On the evening of Thursday 10th July, All Saints' was packed with people listening to the internationally acclaimed guitarist, Frank Bungarten. His skill was evidenced by the total silence of the audience – you could have heard a pin drop – followed by rapturous applause. Profits raised at the event were to be split between St Cuthbert's and All Saints' and Hugo has confirmed that the amount raised is an impressive £1500 after all expenses have been deducted. Huge thanks must go to Hugo and Annabelle Remnant, and to Gary (who made the guitar!)



NEWS FROM FALSTONE

WOW! All that wonderful weather we have had recently brought lots of tourists to the area - as I can tell from the names in the visitor's book. I love to see where people come from and what they think about St Peter's. The church has provided a very welcome cool space where folks can enjoy a respite from the hot weather outside.

One Sunday, I decided to weed the church path (see photos), and a job that usually only takes a couple of hours took four hours! During that time, St Peter's had 16 visitors whom I welcomed. showed around the church and gave a potted history of the building. I didn't mind the interruption of the weeding (it was a welcome break for my lower back!). Amongst the visitors were people from Hull, Devon and Bishop Stortford. The lady from the latter place was a Tower Captain, which means a bell-ringing leader at her local church which has an impressive array of six bells. She was interested in the history of St Peter's one and only bell, which is dedicated to Rev Robert Picton who was Rector from 1880-1894, in the time when the church burned down.





Rev Picton led fundraising efforts for St Peter's to be re-built, which happened in 1892 only two years after the fire. I gave her a demonstration of what the one bell sounded like, and this prompted The Uncle, Ivan Swaile, to come to church to see what was occurring!

I enjoyed the recent communion service at St Aidan's Thorneyburn, which was taken by Rev Canon Lee Batson, the Dean of our cathedral. He lives in Jesmond, so had had a bit of a journey that morning for the service start of 9am but luckily, it was glorious weather so he had enjoyed the drive. I really think it is so important to network with other parishes in our area. We may live in a sparsely

populated area but we have a strong faith and working together, we can develop this even further. The former Bishop of Newcastle, Bishop Christine once said "we mustn't always focus on growth in numbers but growing in our faith and working creatively together". She also said "a flourishing congregation can be inwardly thinking, quite insular and non-welcoming, however a small congregation can be forward and outward thinking, welcoming and have a holistic vision, being generous, engaged and open with



*al*l" which both St Peter's and St Aidan's are.

Rev Batson delivered his sermon without any notes or prompts which I was incredibly impressed with, I could never be this confident. His sermon was based upon *The Good Samaritan* one of the most well-known of Jesus's parables. He reminded us to show mercy and compassion to others, regardless of their race, religion, or social status. As

Christians, we are called to love and act with kindness towards all people, especially those in need. This story has had a lasting impact, with the term "Good Samaritan" now synonymous with anyone who helps a stranger in need. It's a reminder that true neighbourly love is shown through our actions, not just our beliefs or words.

The above was evident to me on a visit to Birmingham recently. The Husband and I attended St Paul's C of E church in the jewellery quarter which is situated in the last Georgian Square in the city. The service was not only in English but Farsi which is the main language of Iran, the order of service was in both languages and there was a Farsi interpreter present. I was fascinated to hear the same text in both English and Farsi; the congregation were so welcoming despite English not being their first language. St Paul's Church mission and values are "to make sure that everyone in the community is cared for and has everything they need to feel safe and less alone" which is a meaningful statement to remember for us all.

Falstone Borders Shepherd's 140th Show is being held on Saturday the 23rd of August in Hawkhope Pasture. The gates open at 9am (remember it is cash only for admission). The Show is a friendly and welcoming public event exhibiting the livestock, working animals, skills and sports associated with local agriculture and the community. This traditional rural event also includes activities for children, trade stands, competitions, food & drink and entertainment. St Peter's will have their usual tombola stall which is in its 57th year!! If anyone would like to donate any prizes for the stall please contact me and I can collect. St Peter's *Rest and Reflection* tent will be pitched again which will have activities for all ages with a space to sit and rest to keep out of the sun or rain! (I am praying that there won't be the latter weather).
