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A message from Revd Richard Hayes, a retired priest in this parish

"You're a brick!"

Jack is ten years old. He's a bright lad and thoughtful with it. Last month the family went on a day trip into the Welsh hills. It was a lovely, sunny late summer day. Dad drove – and Nan came too. Jack sat on the back seat with their next door neighbour Ben. Ben's been widowed lately, and they wanted to give him a good day out. He often helps the family in the garden when Dad's job takes him away from home.

They had a great day until, suddenly, Dad said, "There's something wrong with the engine. I'll have to pull into this lay-by". As he did so, the engine sputtered, and died. Try as he might, Dad could not get it running again. Mum said, "What shall we do? Nan must have her supper by 7.00". Nan's diabetic and has to eat at regular times.

That was when Ben spoke up. "Don't worry. I'll walk back to the village we passed through a few minutes ago. It had a garage. I'll ask them to come and help." He pulled on his coat and set off. Jack watched him go. A couple of minutes later the heavens opened and the rain pelted down. Through the rear window Jack saw Ben striding on until he was out of sight.

Half an hour later he came back in a car driven by an engineer from the garage. Up went the bonnet, and ten minutes later they were ready take to the road again. Ben and Dad thanked the engineer and Ben handed over some cash. Dad said, "I'll pay". "No", said Ben. "I'll pay. You've given me a lovely day out". "Ben, you're a brick", said Dad. Jack heard what Dad said and he liked it. He took it to heart — a brick!

God moves in mysterious ways. A couple of weeks later, at the start of the autumn term, Jack's school went to the parish church for an annual service. Jack had been before but hadn't taken much notice. This time it was to be a life-changing experience. The first remarkable thing was that the man who welcomed everyone as they went into the church was Ben, giving out the orders of service. "Hallo, Jack", he said, smiling, "Good to see you".

The vicar was new, a young man. He welcomed everyone

"Great to see you all", he said. "Now I'm going to surprise you! You all live nearby. Today you have come to your parish church. We call it 'the church', church with a small 'c'. It's a building where we can meet to learn about God, to pray to God, to think our thoughts in peace and quiet and pour out our troubles. But it's you and me who are the Church with a capital C, God's beloved

people. Now here's the surprising thing: Even if this building didn't exist, you and I would still be here being God's Church – God's beloved people, trying to live lovely lives in the world wherever we are. We aren't always lovely, but we try to be – at least some of the time!"

Jack was switched on, listening. He also started looking round the building they were sitting in. The vicar went on "Just look round the walls of this church. You can see the stones and bricks that the walls are built with. If one of those bricks were missing; the church would be a bit weaker. If too many were missing; it would collapse.

The world we live in needs lots of lovely people loving their neighbours. It would not be a happy place to live if we were all selfish, not caring about anyone else. Just as this church building needs its bricks to keep it standing, so the Church needs lots of people like you and me trying to love our neighbours.

We are all different, and we all bring our special gifts to be loving and helpful in the world where we are."

Jack was lost in his own thoughts – church building, needing bricks – Church with a big C meaning us, God's beloved people, us doing our thing as well as we can – being 'bricks' in our right place to be. That's how I want to be, thought Jack. He didn't tell anyone what he was thinking. It was too important. He wanted to protect it.

But, as these thoughts and feelings filled him, Jack did just hear the vicar saying "Now I'm going to stop talking, but here's one more thing for you, Mums and Dads, to think about – a final thought for today – 'We love because God first loved us' just as we are (1 John 4:19). We need to be loved. If we believe that we are loved we might not be tempted to say . 'I can do without church – I don't need that stuff'.

Perhaps the state of our country now, with scenes of violence and brutality on our streets, is enough to warn us of what can happen without the love of God inviting us to be 'bricks' in his Church, growing in love as our lives develop. Jesus said, 'Love one another as I have loved you' (John 15:12). On a more hopeful note, we have also seen many wonderful acts of kindness being shown by neighbours to people caught up in the riots. Thanks be to God."

Jack shows us the all-important thing – (1) he saw neighbourly love and goodness at work in Ben, (2) he *felt* that it was good and (3) he *wanted* to be like that. He was beginning to *want* to know God's love.





A Holy Cross Parish Update— Shrewsbury Abbey & St Peter's, Monkmoor Road

In spite of our parish of Holy Cross now being into its third year without an incumbent, we continue to worship together in both churches, led by a wonderful group of clergy, mainly retired yet with permission to officiate. We are so grateful to Revds Steph Fahie, Pat Aldred, Stan Swift, Nick Heron, Philip Edge, Richard Hayes, George Hodkinson and Chris Walker. Their ministry to us is inspiring!

The separation process of the Abbey and St Peter's Church into two separate parishes continues at a frustratingly slow pace! The consultation process by the Commissioners complete. Church is However, because there was an objection to the proposal to separate, already agreed in principle by the Bishop of Lichfield, The Rt Revd Dr Michael Ipgrave, the diocese is now in contact with the objector or objectors to see if matters can be resolved. If not, then there will be a further formal process involving the bishop and the Church Commissioners, when expressions of support, as well as those against, will be considered and a decision reached. It is worth remembering that St Peter's was established in 1939 as a mission church for the then new Monkmoor estate, with independence always in mind when the time was deemed right.

What also remains to be resolved is an agreement on a financial settlement. With some ancient trusts and other more recent

trusts in the mix, you might imagine this part of the separation presents challenges for all concerned. This separation is likened by some, as similar to a divorce settlement. It's tough for those parties who are involved in negotiations. Please pray for us in our Churchwarden roles, as we seek a fair and amicable way forward. We await legal advice on these trusts from a member of Lichfield Diocese legal team. We hope this will enable us to reach a conclusion.

In the meantime, we continue to work effectively as a parish. Our administrators work conscientiously to deal with parish life matters – worship materials, finance, arranging baptisms, weddings and funerals and events held in the Abbey Church and the Parish Hall. We remain thankful to our paid staff and unpaid officers and volunteers at both churches, who give of their time, skills and energy, and contribute to the ministry of the parish. We continue to focus on our main aim: that is to show God's love to His world and His people!



We were a bit concerned though that the vat of tea had TRIADcraft on it instead of TRAIDcraft - who were they selling it to?!!

Every day, over 700 children under 5 die from diarrhoea linked to unsafe water, sanitation and poor hygiene.


Twin your toilet and fund a project in a community that helps families to build their own basic toilet, access clean water and learn about hygiene – a vital combination that saves lives.

A specific current campaign is RISE UP! against domestic violence.



Robin tells us that he's "been re-reading more of the **Redwall** books, now (he has) a large collection."


However, as well as reading, Robin also shares that he's "been writing some opening scenes and ideas for a Dick Whittington panto"!







"Back Garden Nature Reserve" by Chris Packham, is a recent read which David found both interesting and useful having recently started a wildlife pond in a raised bed.






