Interregnum Update

" Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus."

1 Thessalonians 5;18.

As we go about our daily lives, doing the things that need to be done and generally getting on with stuff, it's easy to forget to be thankful for the small but significant achievements that feed into the wider picture. Sometimes that's because we're so focussed on the 'big things' and getting to the next task on the list; sometimes it's simply because we become 'familiar with the familiar' and stop noticing and appreciating the things that we do and achieve day in day out.

1 Thessalonians 5;18 reminds us that giving thanks is not just a suggestion, but a directive from God; it encourages us to look for reasons to be thankful in all circumstances, because that is God's will for us. In Church and in our daily lives, we all need to remember to take a moment, to step back from our efforts and busyness, to celebrate our achievements and to be thankful.



Gift Aid

Gift Aid is a UK government scheme that allows charities to reclaim the tax already paid on donations from UK taxpayers.

Did you know your donation could be worth 25% more at no extra cost?

If you're a UK taxpayer, completing a Gift Aid form allows the Church to reclaim the basic rate of tax on your donation. For every £1 you give, the Church receives £1.25.

Gift Aid significantly boosts the funds available to many charities and organisations, including our Church; in the 2024/25 tax year, Christ Church Ainsworth claimed an additional £6,786.20 through Gift Aid more than the total annual cost of gas, electricity, and water used by the Church and equating to 15% of the total annual expenditure!

Thank you to everyone who currently supports our Church by Gift Aiding. If you are a UK taxpayer and don't already Gift Aid donations, please complete a Gift Aid form and return it to Church or post it through the door of the Vicarage.

EcoChurch

Caring for our environment isn't limited to our churchbased activities; we can all make small changes to our lifestyles which, collectively, would undoubtedly make a difference.

In the coming months we'll be giving you a 'Make a difference' idea each month, letting you know what we're doing to implement these ideas in Church, plus suggesting small changes that you might like to try to incorporate into your own home or daily routine.

Make A Difference - August:

Helping Out In Hot Weather – Keeping bird baths topped up with fresh water in warmer weather can be a life saver for our feathered friends, but they also need help when natural supplies, like worms, become scarce during prolonged hot weather. Members of our Churchyard Team keep feeders topped up all year round to ensure there is always food available to those who need it.

As well as leaving a shallow tray of water out for small creatures, birds and insects to access, don't forget to keep feeders topped up. Could you consider putting out supplementary food, such as black sunflower seeds, pinhead oatmeal, soaked sultanas, raisins and currants, mealworms, waxworms, or a good seed mixture to help birds and other small creatures out during hot weather?

Sharing Eco-Tips – When it comes to 'Eco', many of us will have our own ways of 'making a difference'. If you have an 'Eco-Tip' that others might be able to try, why not jot it down and add it to our Eco-Tips board in Church.

CCA Litter Pickers



Thursday 3rd of July was our final joint litter picking session with Christ Church Ainsworth School. On a glorious afternoon, a small group of children & grown-ups all armed with litter pickers, bags and gloves, spent 45 minutes litter picking on the park and streets near to school and church, before heading back to Church for a much-needed drink and end of term chocolate cake.

We'll be resuming this joint initiative on Thursday 5th September, but we really need some extra litter pickers to join our team. If you're around between 3.15 – 4pm; why not join us and help to keep our village tidy; all equipment provided.



VJ Day 80th anniversary Commemoration; 15th August 2025

VJ Day marks the anniversary of Japan announcing its surrender to the Allied forces after six long years of fighting. The surrender was met with relief and celebration that the Second World War was finally over.

While millions took part in parades and street parties, there was also great sadness - the human cost of the conflict was enormous and many eagerly awaited the safe return of loved ones.

The fighting may have ended in Europe in May 1945, but Allied troops in the east were still engaged in fierce warfare. The 14th Army, was the principal British fighting force in the east; it was an extraordinary army composed of troops from South Asia, Africa and British, Burmese and Gurkha units.

By 1945 the British Indian Army was the largest volunteer force in history, made up of 2.5 million men and women. The War claimed the lives of 87,000 of these volunteers.

Throughout the early months of 1945, the 14th Army fought intensely and pushed determined Japanese forces back through hundreds of

miles of malaria-infested jungle, supported by continual supply drops from the air; Burma was liberated by this incredible fighting force.

Meanwhile, in the Pacific, Australian forces faced fierce resistance on Borneo, and US forces fought to take the strategically important islands of Iwo Jima and Okinawa; battles which were marked by appalling levels of casualties.

After Okinawa fell on 22nd June, an invasion of the Japanese home islands was planned, with enormous levels of casualties expected. Before the invasion could take place, the most destructive war in history came to a rapid end; on 6th August, the United States dropped the first atomic bomb over Hiroshima. Two days later, the Soviet Union declared war on Japan followed by a huge attack on 9th August; a day that also saw the dropping of the second atomic bomb – this time over Nagasaki. The number of deaths from the bombs has been estimated as being as high as 200,000.

Recognizing that victory was impossible, the Japanese government finally accepted the Allied surrender terms on 14th August 1945; the following day was declared Victory over Japan (VJ) Day.

But this was not the end for the many thousands of troops, volunteers and prisoners of war who remained in the East; tens of thousands of Allied Prisoners of War had to be located across vast areas – many of them had been held under appalling conditions and often put to work as forced labour.

Thousands of allied troops remained on active service in occupied Japan, and the South East Asia Command worked to reoccupy Malaya, the Dutch East Indies and French Indo-China, where new, nationalist conflicts were beginning.

Over 90,000 British troops were casualties in the war against Japan - 30,000 died and 37,500 were held as prisoners of war.

For hundreds of thousands of service personnel from Britain and the Commonwealth, it would take many months to be reunited with loved ones, some of whom they hadn't seen for more than five years.

A Word From Our Organist

The following information was provided by Jenny Johnson, our Church Organist, to those who came along to the Organ Recital held in Church on Ainsworth Village Day:

"Built in 1908 by W.E. Richardson, the organ at Christ Church Ainsworth has 18 stops and 2 keyboards. Organ sound is generated by movement of air within the pipes, thus the organ requires a constant supply of air under pressure, commonly called 'wind'. The wind is contained in a 'chest' and is provided by electricity, however in the past the bellows had to be worked manually by organ blowers, requiring considerable effort to maintain a constant flow of air. Our church organ can still be operated in this way if the electricity fails; one such occasion occurred at a Christmas Carol Service – the Church was full and the Organist was my mum, Margaret Turner. The electricity failed on the organ and they had to recruit a series of sturdy 'blowers' from the congregation, who came under my mum's orders of 'more wind!'"

Things To Look Out For In August – Willow Warblers



The willow warbler is one of the most common summer visitors to this country, with 2.4 million breeding pairs setting up nests for the season. This slim, delicate bird of woodland, scrub, parks and gardens, can often be

heard singing a melodious, warbling song from the tree canopy.

The willow warbler is green above and pale yellow below, with an offwhite belly and eyebrow stripe. Willow warblers and chiffchaffs are both very similar, olive-coloured warblers, so are best identified by their song: chiffchaffs sing a distinctive 'chiff chaff chiff chaff', whilst willow warblers sing in a sweet, descending scale. Willow warblers have pale legs, while chiffchaff legs are dark grey.

Willow Warblers are insectivorous but will eat berries and fruit in autumn; they are one of the few species of bird that moult all their feathers twice a year - once at their breeding grounds and once at their wintering ground.

Common Blue Damselfly

The Common blue damselfly is the UK's most common damselfly – on a bright sunny day it can be found hovering around almost any waterbody, or away from breeding sites in grassland and woodland; it is also regularly seen in gardens with any form of water feature.

Common blue damselflies are carnivorous insects that eat other smaller insects. They primarily feed on flying insects like midges, and flies, but also consume other small insects they find among vegetation, sometimes even other damselflies.





The Sermon On The Mount



Stories Of Jesus

The Bible is a collection of stories that help us to learn about God and God's dealings with people, right from the beginning of the world. The first part of the Bible is called the Old Testament; this part of the Bible was written before Jesus was born.

The second part of the Bible is called the New Testament; this part of the Bible tells us all about the life and death of Jesus, about the things that He did, and about the people that knew Him.

The Sermon On The Mount

Jesus had a group of people who travelled with him from village to village, listening to him and learning from him and helping him - these people were known as Jesus's disciples. From this group of people, Jesus chose twelve people who he believed would be able to carry on spreading the

good news of God and leading the early Christians onwards. This group of people were called apostles.

Jesus needed to teach them how to do his great work, but it was always so busy in the towns and villages that it was hard to find time, and so Jesus decided they needed to get away from the busyness and find a quiet place where the apostles could rest and learn from him.

Jesus led the apostles away from the village and towards a great



mountain; they climbed the mountain together, and then Jesus sat down and began to speak. The apostles all stood near to listen, and other people who had followed them up the mountain also gathered round to

listen to the great sermon that Jesus preached that day.

Jesus began by saying; "Blessed are the poor in spirit: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." The apostles wondered what Jesus meant; he explained to them that people who are humble and who understand that they need God's help to live a good and honest life are blessed because God will watch over them and help them,

but those people who are proud and think that they are better than other people and that they don't need God's help, will not receive God's blessing.

The next thing Jesus told them was, "Blessed are they that mourn: for they shall be comforted." These words sounded strange to the people who were listening they didn't realise that God loves to comfort people

who are weary and sad.

"Blessed are the meek:" Jesus told them next, "for they shall inherit the earth." The apostles must have wondered what on earth that meant; but Jesus explained that gentle, kind people who don't lose their temper and become cross and discontented will be happy and will enjoy the blessings God gives.

The next thing that Jesus said was, "Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness: for they shall be filled." Righteousness means living according to what God wants us to do, learning, praying, being kind and thoughtful and helping others.

Only those people who really try their hardest to do these things and believe they can only do them with God's help, will be blessed.

"Blessed are they who show mercy to others," said

Jesus; "for mercy shall be shown to them. And blessed are they
who have pure hearts; for they shall see God. And blessed are
they who make peace among men, for they shall be called the
children of God." The apostles understood these words, because
they knew that God would bless people who show mercy, and
people who don't allow themselves to get mixed up in bad things,
and people who bring peace where there is trouble.

And finally, Jesus said: "Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness; for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." These words must have sounded strange to the apostles! Persecution means causing someone to suffer or treating them unfairly, it can involve hurting them, scaring them, or making their

lives very difficult. The apostles must have wondered how the kingdom of God could belong to them when trouble was filling their lives. But Jesus explained to them that people who are persecuted in their life on earth can be sure that they will find peace and love in heaven.

This long speech that Jesus made to his apostles became known as The Sermon On The Mount. All of the things that Jesus told the apostles in this sermon were his way of explaining to them and the other people who were listening, how Christians should live. He



taught them how they should pray, how they should treat their enemies and their friends, and he also told them about God's love and care for those who trust him.

When Jesus finished speaking, he said: "Those who hear my words and do them are like the man who builds his house on a rock - when the wind blows

and the rain falls, that rock will stand firm, and the house will not fall. But those who hear my words and do not obey them are like the man who builds his house on a sandy beach. When the wind blows and the rain falls, that sandy beach will be washed away, and the house will fall."

Jesus meant that people who heard him and followed his instructions would be saved and find peace and love in heaven, but people who heard him and chose not to follow his instructions for leading a good Christian life, could not expect to be saved and find peace and love in heaven.

When Jesus finished his sermon, the apostles and all of the people looked at each other in surprise. They wondered who could obey such commands as these: "Love your enemies." "Pray for them who treat you wrongly." "Do good to them who hate you." But they also knew that Jesus's words were the words of God, and over time, many of them learned that even the hardest commands could be obeyed by those who truly loved and believed in God.
