There has been more good news Ray Turner has been given PTO (Permission to Officiate) as a lay reader to work, initially in St Aidan's. As Ray and I met last Monday morning to say morning prayer, a line from our New Testament reading jumped out at me:

Let us therefore no longer pass judgement on one another...Do not let what you eat cause the ruin of one for whom Christ died.

'One for whom Christ died'. We are all one for whom Christ died - the ones of us who bow and the ones who wave. The ones who like 'thees' and 'thous' when they worship and the ones who would be happy with everything unscripted. Imagine if, every time we saw someone from one of the four churches in the group we thought to ourselves 'there goes someone for whom Christ died'. How would that change what we did, or thought or said next? Something special happens when what binds us together overpowers all the little things which act as stumbling blocks between us and it is called the kingdom. Long may it reign!


Matthew 6:26



At least you still have time to do this, as, whilst the first flush may be over, there are many varieties of roses in bloom ready and waiting to impress you with their scent.



Shafts of light

On one of our trips to the North-east a few years ago we came across a signpost just outside Ashington, (the largest pit village in the country some 15 miles north of Newcastle upon Tyne and on the very edge of the Great Northern Coalfield). This indicated a museum of coal mining in the area. Sadly, when we arrived at the site, Woodhorn Colliery, we found that we had misread the sign and the Museum was not yet open to visitors.



Rooting around in the local bookshops I came across a book relating to The Mining Art in the Great Northern Coalfield.

The book paints a fascinating picture (excuse the pun!) of the often hidden and latent talents of those men, and boys, who spent their working lives in difficult and appalling conditions in the dimness and oppressive atmosphere underground, winning King Coal for their masters.

Names such as Oliver Kilbourne, Jimmy Floyd, Fred Laider and many others and their links with groups such as The Ashington Group and the Spennymoor Settlement where they were encouraged to develop their artistic talents in many different ways.

And, of course, the whole way of life encapsulated and epitomised at the annual Durham Miners' Gala where the sounds of Colliery Bands could be heard playing the Durham Miners Hymn "Gresford" during the annual service in the cathedral, where the Miners' Memorial in the south aisle is located with the inscription -

"Remember before God the Durham Miners who have given their lives in the pits of this County and those who work in darkness and danger in those pits today".

Perhaps one of the more well known of the artists is Rob Olley. Starting life as a painter and decorator, he soon joined his father and brother working down the pits around his hometown of South Shields, (Westoe and Whitburn.)

His picture of The Westoe Netty, whilst not included in Shafts of Light, is probably better known than many thus featured. It has been said that it has made the artist a small fortune over the years and has travelled the globe.

The picture is perhaps one of his more humorous attempts at recording pit village life. The Westoe Netty (c1960) depicts an outdoor urinal and a distracted little boy not realising what he was doing.

It is said that when this outdoor urinal was being demolished, Olley took it upon himself to organise the reclamation of the materials and arranged for them to be stored locally until the time came when a suitable site could be found for its reconstruction for the sake of posterity.

Well that time did come in 2008, when the said structure was rebuilt at the outdoor Beamish Museum near Stanley in Co Durham.

My child it's not hard, it's not something to be forced.


Focus on me, turn your thoughts and heart towards me and you are in my presence.


In the busyness of this world take a breath and still your mind and refocus on me. It can be as little as five minutes or as long as you want it to be...

So, what is the correct tune?

How many times have we heard the comment after a service.....

"Why didn't they have the proper tune for that hymn this morning?

And of course in their mind and memory "they" did not play the proper tune. "They" being the organist, possibly in cahoots with the Preacher.

There are countless hymns across the whole spectrum of Hymnody of all denominations and if you look at them, many have been set to different tunes down the ages, possibly bowing to the whims of the editor or Venerable Hymn Committee of a particular collection or to reflect changes in style or preference of the Minister or Vicar.

I don't think it is a bad thing to have a variety of different tunes to a particular hymn just as long as the musical setting does not detract from the words and message. In the hands of a capable and sympathetic organist or indeed music group, there should be no insurmountable problems over the musical interpretation.

It is only if the organist throws in something totally out of keeping (with connotations far from a song of praise), such as The Muppet Theme Tune to that old favourite "O Jesus, I have promised to serve thee to the end", or even The Star Wars Theme for Ye Servants of God, that fur is likely to fly! I can assure you that with some minor adjustments the tunes fit the words!

One particular hymn springs to mind in terms of the "correct tune", and that is "O Master, let me walk with thee".

O Master, let me walk with thee, In lowly paths of service free, Teach me thy secret; help me bear the strain of toil, the fret of care. (verse 1)
And Verse 4

In hope that sends a shining ray far down the future's broadening way, In peace that only thou canst give, With thee, O Master, let me live

The words were by an American Congregational Minister, Washington (naturally!) Gladden and it was his wish, nay instruction, that the only tune for his words was to be MARYTON. This was written by an Anglican priest, H Percy Smith, who had set it originally for the words of John Keble, "Sun of my Soul".

However, over the years a number of different musical settings have been applied to these words. The on-line Hymnary website notes that the hymn is to be found in over 500 collections. Suffice to say that I have not looked at all of them but have focussed on those relevant to our own and associated Hymn collections.

Rather sadly this hymn has been dropped from the latest Methodist hymnal Singing the Faith, likewise the tune Maryton does not feature either in this collection.

Scanning through the Salvation Army Tune book of 1928 I found another setting, this time to a tune by Alan Jackson (and harmonised by Clement Hill), which he called Silver Hill** but by 1987 this tune, although still in the Tune Book was no longer allocated to O Master. In 1987 O Master was being sung to Maryton.

Having spent some time delving into the history of this hymn and its various settings, and about to wind down on this particular topic I suddenly came upon another variation. I quite often find myself surfing the net to chase down hymns and tunes and recently came across this one from the Salvation Army stable, but sadly not available from SA Supplies.

It was a recording on the Oshawa Temple (Canada) website and sung by the Melbourne (Vic) Staff Band Singers. It was not a tune which I recognised, but asking around it transpired to be an arrangement of a very old (17thC) lullaby "Golden Slumbers". The arrangement was by Lt Col Norman Bearcroft (1926-2020) who with over 180 published works across band and vocal journals, was regarded as one of the Salvation Army's most prolific and respected composers.

Stanley and Kettering are both DLM or 8 line stanzas, and with quite strident melody lines whereas Maryton and Golden Slumbers are LM (88.88) 4 line stanzas and a much gentler melody.

I could find no instance however of Maryton being used as the set tune in any Methodist

Hymnary.
