PHILP SMITH - REFLECTIONS

THE other day, while waiting for a bus at a Park and Ride in Chelmsford, I got into casual conversation with a man from Halstead.

Somehow the subject of Church arose. It turned out he was a staunch and practising Roman Catholic who had many concerns about his Church of today, and especially where the path that it trod would lead to in the future.

Essentially this related to falling congregation numbers, the difficulty of recruiting Priests and the uneconomic use of buildings.

Now where have I heard that story before? But I suppose there is some consolation in knowing that we are not alone.

During the course of the conversation he told me about a friend who lived in another part of the country who is a Baptist. Apparently there are three Baptist Churches in the area, and each averages just a handful of people at Sunday Services.

Why did they not combine into one Church, he asked, thereby saving money and easing the Minister problem while at the same time creating a stronger congregation and thus a stronger Church.

This man was passionately irate, in a gentle sort of way, because, he said, those problems are diverting attention away from the main two purposes of the Church with a capital C. These are to promote our own love of God and to try to help others to find God.

You could see where this man was coming from, and it would be very easy to say he is right. But it is such a fine line we tread. Those two purposes certainly do head our priorities. However the question arises of how best, in the present circumstances, we should go about achieving them.

Neither closing churches nor reducing the number of Services within them, seem to me generally to be the right answer; in exceptional circumstances there may be little choice, but overall, the fewer churches and the fewer services, the lower the attendance figures will be. And as those numbers decline there will inevitably follow an even greater decline in the number of Priests seeking positions in rural areas.

We just cannot afford such a downward spiral to go on for too long. As with Global Warming there will be a tipping point beyond which it may not be possible to retrieve what is lost.

Church buildings and the religious activities that go on within them provide a visible sign that Christians are alive and well and continue to go about their business. While such exists there is always hope for the future; once they are lost they cannot be replaced.

At the same time we do have to face financial realities and in the end accept that we need to cut our coats according to the value of our cloth.

While the General Synod continues to try to find ways of investing in local churches (among other things), we obviously remain for the moment between a rock and a hard place.

In these circumstances, it seems to me, the Lay leadership of Services – already a major factor – should be given increasing encouragement. Making it easy for volunteers to be involved, providing easily accessible training and offering support and care to the welfare of those involved, are all essential for the Church of today.

That way we can keep our Churches open and in use particularly on Sundays when no Priest is available. So good for keeping us all in touch with God, but also so good for our image in that those around us are kept aware of our presence, our commitment and our activity.

But there is also a potential further benefit. There is always a possibility that participating in Lay Leadership may lead to appropriate people moving on to Ministerial training. It's happened twice in Little Totham, and what a good thing that has been.

God helps those who help themselves, as the saying goes.
