TODAY'S READINGS

First Reading: Proverbs 25: 6-7

The Proverbs advise against pushing too eagerly forward to gain the favour and attention of the powerful. They warn that it is better to be raised up in the presence of a king, than pushed away from the seat of power.

Second Reading: Hebrews 13: 1-8, 15-16

The writer to the Hebrews rounds off his letter with snippets of advice for the early Christians. Above all, they must praise God, do good, and share with others.

Gospel: Luke 14: 1, 7-14

Jesus uses two stories about tables and table manners to teach about the kingdom of God: how it will upset the established order, and create a new one where the poor and disadvantaged are given pride of place.

FIRST READING Proverbs 25, 6–7

- 6 Do not put yourself forward in the king's presence or stand in the place of the great;
- ⁷ for it is better to be told, 'Come up here,' than to be put lower in the presence of a noble.

SECOND READING Hebrews 13. 1–8, 15–16

- 1 Let mutual love continue.
- ² Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it.
- ³ Remember those who are in prison, as though you were in prison with them; those who are being

- tortured, as though you yourselves were being tortured.
- ⁴ Let marriage be held in honour by all, and let the marriage bed be kept undefiled; for God will judge fornicators and adulterers.
- ⁵ Keep your lives free from the love of money, and be content with what you have; for he has said, 'I will never leave you or forsake you.'
- 6 So we can say with confidence, 'The Lord is my helper; I will not be afraid. What can anyone do to me?'
- ⁷ Remember your leaders, those who spoke the word of God to you; consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith.
- 8 Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and for ever.
- 15 Through him, then, let us continually offer a sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of lips that confess his name.
- ¹⁶ Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God.

GOSPEL Luke 14. 1, 7–14

- 1 On one occasion when Jesus was going to the house of a leader of the Pharisees to eat a meal on the sabbath, they were watching him closely.
- ⁷ When he noticed how the guests chose the places of honour, he told them a parable.
- 8 'When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honour, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host;
- 9 and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, "Give this person your place," and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place.
- 10 But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he

- may say to you, "Friend, move up higher"; then you will be honoured in the presence of all who sit at the table with you.
- 11 For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted.'
- 12 He said also to the one who had invited him, 'When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbours, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid.
- 13 But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind.
- 14 And you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous.'

COLLECT

O God, you declare your almighty power most chiefly in showing mercy and pity: mercifully grant to us such a measure of your grace, that we, running the way of your commandments, may receive your gracious promises, and be made partakers of your heavenly treasure; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**
