

September has a unique feel about it. The air starts to carry that gentle crispness, leaves begin to hint at their autumn colours, and the long, unhurried days of summer, give way to a more purposeful rhythm.

For many families this month marks an important milestone. Children in freshly pressed uniforms and slightly too big blazers and new shoes head through school gates for the first time or return to familiar classrooms with new teachers, new subjects, and new challenges. There's a mixture of excitement and nervousness in these moments, both for the children and the parents watching them, as they take another step forward. It's a reminder that life is full of seasons, and each season brings with it fresh beginnings. In the Christian life this rhythm of ending and beginning is woven deeply into our story.

Scripture is full of people stepping into new chapters. Abraham leaves his home to journey to an unknown land. Ruth begins a new life in Bethlehem. The disciples drop their nets to follow Jesus into an entirely different way of living. Each time there's a blend of uncertainty and hope in letting go and trusting in God's leading.

For children starting school there is so much that is unfamiliar. New faces, routines and expectations. For parents and carers there is the bittersweet letting go, entrusting our precious ones to the care of others. As Christians we can take comfort that God is present in every "first day." Psalm 139 tells us that God has gone before us, that he knows our comings and goings, our sitting down and our rising up. This means that before a child walks into the classroom, God is already there preparing the way.

New beginnings are also moments of spiritual renewal. Just as children learn their ABC and numbers, we're continually called to grow in our knowledge and love of God. September can be a time for all of us, whether we're in school or far beyond our school days, to consider what God might be inviting us to learn. This season, where is he calling us to step out in faith?

The apostle Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 5:17: "If anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come, the old has gone, the new is here!" Every day is an opportunity for us to live more fully as that "new creation". We do not need to wait for January to make resolutions. September offers an invitation to begin again with God's help whether that's in our prayer life, service to others or our relationships.

So as we wave goodbye to summer and step into a new term, let's pray for our children, teachers and families. Let's also open our own hearts to the fresh things God may want to do in our homes, in our parishes and in our lives.

Druze, Alawites and Christians killed in Syrian sectarian violence

The violence in Sweida first broke out on 13th July between the Sunni-majority Bedouin tribal group and the Druze, an Islamic sect regarded as heretical by many Sunnis. Syria's transitional government deployed the Syrian Armed Forces to the region, supposedly to restore peace. These forces are alleged to have carried out attacks on civilians, including the unlawful execution of 83 Druze as well as the killing of the believers at the Church of Jesus the Good Shepherd. Christians are also among 2,000 people displaced by the violence.

The current government, headed by interim president Ahmed al Sharaa, came to power in December 2024 following an armed rebellion. Al Sharaa, also known as Abu Mohammad al Jolani, is the leader of Hay'at Tahrir al-Sham (HTS), a designated terrorist organisation that was formerly affiliated to Al Qaeda. When he first returned to Syria from Iraq in 2011, al Sharaa worked closely with Abu Bakr al Baghdadi, who later declared himself the caliph of Islamic State (IS – also known as ISIS, ISIL, Daesh). After the split between IS and Al Qaeda, the HTS remained affiliated to Al Qaeda.

More recently, al Sharaa has sought to present himself as a moderate who will protect religious freedom. However, a Reuters investigation has uncovered evidence that Syrian government forces massacred 1,500 Alawites, another minority group, in western Syria in March 2025. At least 12 Christians were killed during this wave of violence.

Church leaders have criticised the government for failing to prevent an Islamist suicide bombing on 22nd June in Damascus, which claimed the lives of at least 25 worshippers and injured more than sixty during a church service.

Pakistani Christian man freed after 23 years on death row for "blasphemy"

A mentally ill Christian man convicted of blasphemy in Pakistan has been released after 23 years on death row. Anwar Kenneth, now 72 years old, was cleared of the charge on 25th June after doctors confirmed that he was mentally ill when he committed the "blasphemy". The court ruled that someone not of sound mind cannot be held criminally liable, so his conviction was overturned.

Anwar was arrested in 2001 for allegedly "blasphemous" letters he was accused of writing about Muhammad, the prophet of Islam. In 2002 a court in Lahore, Punjab, sentenced him under section 295-C of the Pakistan penal code, which stipulates the death penalty for anybody who "defiles the sacred name" of Muhammad, despite Anwar's mental illness being already confirmed. Anwar was also fined five million rupees (at that time around £55,250).

In 2014 when the sentence was appealed with medical reports confirming Anwar's mental illness, the court upheld the ruling. Anwar is due to be released in the next few days.

Anwar's lawyer, Rana Abdul Hameed – himself a Muslim – said that Anwar's family "will need to arrange for his protection" following his release from prison, as he will be facing death threats from Islamist extremists who consider it a religious duty to kill "blasphemers". Hameed shared that following a press conference he held where he demanded an independent probe into misuse of "blasphemy" laws, he himself had received such severe threats that policemen have had to be stationed outside his office.

Mob violence following accusations of "blasphemy" in Pakistan is a common occurrence. Such accusations are often believed, even in the absence of evidence or following an acquittal.

There are few of us who will not experience the loss of a loved one during our lives. Whether that loss is sudden or expected, we are likely to be devastated, and then face a period of adjustment, of learning to live without the person who is so important to us. Family and friends can be helpful, but this can feel like a journey we are making alone.

Even though grief is universal, it is not always easy to find places where we can share our sorrow with others. Oasis was set up in March 2022 to be a safe place of anyone struggling with bereavement. A place where people are welcome to talk about their loss, their feelings, the ways they are coping (or not). No-one has to say anything unless they want to but even though everyone's grief is different, those who come may have had similar experiences and their speaking and listening can bring support. There are tears and laughter as friendships are built and strengthened which is done as we share a free lunch.

We do not provide counselling but can signpost you to helpful resources and organisations.

"Open The Book" team

Our Open the Book team has been presenting especially rewritten Bible stories to whole school assemblies at Minsterley Primary for over nine years. Ms Wilcox, the headteacher, joins us for Open the Book assemblies and is very supportive of our work. Both she and the children tell us how much they enjoy our visits.



Open the Book started as an independent charity but is now part of the Bible Society. Over 3,500 schools in England and Wales receive visits from teams of volunteers, and after twenty-six years numbers are still growing. In addition to this the

scheme operates in schools in Ghana, Kenya and Albania, Argentina, The Gambia, Portugal and Uganda.

We present a story once a month on a Friday morning and meet during the week to rehearse.

We present Old and New Testament stories, without preaching or evangelism, so that children of all faiths and none can watch and interact with the stories in their own way. Open the Book handbooks provide clear guidelines and directions for presenting the stories and the messages within them. Amateur dramatics, make do props and costumes bring the stories to life. We try to present stories which reflect the School's theme of the week and give the children the opportunity to take part. Before the story we sing a song together.



Minsterley Parish Council

The Chairman from Shropshire Association of Local Councils attended the last Parish Council meeting to report on membership of S.A.L.C. The cost to Minsterley would be in the region of £1,000 per year, if it joined the organisation as a Member.

As part of the Environmental Act 2021, the Parish are in discussions with Pontesbury Parish Council regarding biodiversity issues.

The ongoing request by the Parish to obtain a reduction in the speed of traffic using the A488 from the School to the Waterwheel continues. The new Leader of Shropshire Council has been contacted regarding the issue.

The House of Commons Environmental Audit Committee visited the Parish in July. They were shown and explained the difficult problems that occur in the village during storm periods.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be at 7pm on Tuesday 9th September in Minsterley Parish Hall.





On 3rd September the church remembers St. Gregory the Great (540 – 604AD), one of the most important popes and influential writers of the Middle Ages. The son of a very rich Roman senator, Gregory converted as a young man and then sold his vast estates to found six monasteries in Sicily and a seventh in Rome. He gave generously to the poor and became a monk.

Christians in England owe him a great deal. When Gregory came across some English slaves for sale in Rome, he asked who they were, and was told, "They are Angles." Moved with compassion for these despised men he replied, "They are not Angles, but angels!" He planned to go to England to evangelize the Angles, but plague broke out in Italy about 590, and during this time he was elected Pope. But Gregory did not forget the Angles. In 596 He sent Augustine to England, and so indirectly became the apostle of the English.

World War II Memories

Continuing our series of reflection on the war by those of our village who endured it

I was born in Rugby on 19th December 1936 in a village called Brownsover which is a few miles from Coventry. I remember the bombers flying over to Coventry which was very frightening to a child. There were eight children so we kept ourselves amused.

I remember during the raids and we had to go into the shelters. Ours was a big brick one with a solid concrete roofs we were not too scared – we kept ourselves busy by singing or playing games.

My father, being older than my mum, used to go out doing ARP duty.

We were well fed as we had an allotment and bred rabbits which we cooked and had rabbit stew three days on the go.

I remember going to school with our gas masks. We had to walk to school which was about a mile each way. Growing up I remember ration books and later the street parties. We had two railway stations, LMS and LNER; Rugby was very famous. We had happy and sad times and how people were rejoicing when the war ended and helped one another.

I moved to Minsterley in 2012 with my husband John who I met in Rugby at the RBL. John was born in Old Churchstoke in Wales and wanted to come back. Sadly he passed away in 2014. Memories will always stay with me.
