#### A Blast from the Past.....

Most of our readers will know that during the **Spire Repair Project** last year we were blessed to have a very generous grant from the Lottery Heritage Fund. This was conditional that we research the Church's History and share our findings with the community.

Helen Richards was appointed to fulfil this task and she unearthed lots of facts we didn't know about the history of our parish. She recently gave a talk at our **Tuesday @ 10 Café** which was founded during the Project. Many members of the community came to share their memories of the church in past years. Below is an extract from her talk which even our most senior members didn't know before.

In his 'Centenary History of St John's Church' (Straw. W 1967) William Straw mentions that George Hounsfield, a Sheffield businessman and landowner who was looking to develop the Elms estate in Worksop, was asked for his assistance in securing a suitable site for the new church.

Mr Straw suggests that George Hounsfield was one of the 'Sheffield moneyed people beginning to take an interest in the town' following the coming of the railway, but George also had a preexisting connection to Worksop as his parents had married at Worksop Priory in 1804.

The site eventually chosen for the New church was purchased by Lady Milton, just south of George's landholdings. In acknowledgment of her generosity Lady Milton was invited to lay the foundation stone.

George died in 1870, leaving his wife Maria a wealthy widow. Maria's father was one of Birmingham's first two MPs, and her brother later held the same seat. Maria then married William Overend MP in 1871. William had been a longstanding friend of George and was a Queen Counsel, chairing the Sheffield Inundation inquiry and the commission into the Sheffield Trade Union outrages.

The new Mr & Mrs Overend made their home at West Retford House, now the West Retford hotel, where you can see the portrait of an unnamed lady who bears a strong resemblance to the portrait of Maria Hounsfield (nee Schofield, later Overend), held by Sheffield Teaching Hospitals Trust in acknowledgment her generous support of numerous Sheffield medical charities.

Worksop remembers Maria through the name of Overend Road.

Oh yes, he has been up inside the one at St John's and Lincoln, and is looking forward to finding more.

Now he is off to Cornwall for a while, so there will be more travel news to come.
