

A message from Revd Anne

The saying 'if you can remember the 60's you weren't really there' almost applies to me – I was born in 1968 in a tied cottage opposite the church in a tiny village in Herefordshire and most of the excitements of that decade passed me by!



Before I was 2 along with my new baby sister we had moved a couple of miles up the hill out of the village to a smallholding. My parents have not really grasped the concept of retirement and are still there.

I was fortunate to be brought up in a churchgoing family and in a community where church events and services strongly shaped the year. My primary school — which was not a church school — was another strong influence on my faith, through assemblies and, especially, hymn singing. I was confirmed at 12, and for a year or so at 17 I even joined the PCC.

After A levels I worked for a year on a dairy farm in Derbyshire, and then went on to Agricultural College in Aberystwyth with a sandwich year on an agricultural research station in Berkshire. I started my first 'proper' job with the Scottish Agricultural College, working first in Ayr and later in Dumfries. I spent the next decade very happily measuring grass, talking to farmers and students about grass and measuring the rate (in bites per minute) at which grazing cows ate the grass. Throughout this time I attended the local parish churches wherever I was living, so a mixture of Church in Wales, Church of England and Church of Scotland congregations.

At some point around the turn of the century, I started to feel an itch to do something more useful. It took a while to work out what was going on but that itch eventually became a journey of discernment and vocation that lead to me heading back to Herefordshire. For the next few years I combined working for Herefordshire Council with working my way through the C of E's discernment process and studying with the local ministry scheme for the Dioceses of Hereford and Gloucester.

I was ordained deacon in Gloucester cathedral and served my title as Curate in Cheltenham and then worked as a Team Vicar in Exeter for four years. These two posts gave me the chance to work alongside some wonderful colleagues and congregations and to develop my ministerial skills and gifts. For the last nearly 11 years I have been the Team Rector in South Wye in Hereford. The two churches and nearly 22,000 parishioners of this benefice, together with lay and ordained colleagues and volunteers have taught me so much and been wonderfully supportive.

All of these experiences have been part of my formation as a priest and as a person and I am greatly looking forward to finding out what I will learn at and with the people of St Elphin's. I would be grateful for your continued prayers as I prepare for the move and my licencing with you.



Pause for Thought with Norma Fox

As harvest comes around again I think of the popular hymn:

We plough the fields and scatter, the good seed on the land, but it is fed and watered, by God's almighty hand.

It makes us joyful and grateful for the abundance of God's blessings.

It would seem that we are a nation of growers, people love to grow their own food, fruit and veg, farmers grow arable crops to fees the nation. Growing food is so important and necessary as part of survival, but spare a thought for another form of growing, that of growing the Gospel. It works in the same way, God gives us the seeds of love, kindness, faith and trust to sow in the hearts and minds of those around us, and He will do the rest.

I found this short story to illustrate my point:

A woman planned an event at a local park and invited all the neighbourhood children to join in. She was excited about the opportunity to share her faith with her neighbours. She recruited her three grandchildren and to high school students to help her, gave the assignments, planned a number of games and other activities, prepared food, prepared a bible story about Jesus to present to the children, and waited for them to gather.

Not a single child turned up the first day, or the second day, or the third. Yet each day the woman went through that day's activities with her grandchildren and helpers.

On the fourth day, she noticed a family picnicking nearby and invited the children to join in the games. One little girl came, entered into the fun, ate with them and listened to the story about Jesus.

Perhaps years from now she'll remember. Who knows what the outcome will be? God through the book of Galatians, encourages us 'Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will

reap a harvest if we do not give up. Therefore, as we have opportunity let us do good to all people'. (6:9-10)

Don't worry about numbers or other visual measures of success. Our job is to be faithful to set the seeds of God's love and then leave the harvest to Him.

All good things around us are sent from heav'n above, then thank the Lord, O thank the Lord, for all His Love.

A New Pilgrim at Walsingham

On Thursday, 14th August, 23 pilgrims from various churches, led by St James Latchford, undertook a pilgrimage to Walsingham, England's Nazareth. After an uneventful journey, with two stops *en route* and slow moving traffic on the motorway and A roads, we left the hustle of everyday life, I noticed the peace and quietness as we followed the route into the village, singing the Pilgrim's Hymn.

We arrived at the Shrine and this calmness surrounding the area was a real surprise to me because my husband's experience in Lourdes had led me to expect people attempting to sell me all manners of goods. It never happened. Prayers were said outside The Shrine before we entered to see an altar which had a blue and white depiction of the Annunciation and then Dianne read Luke1:26-38. From there we continued into the Shrine for further readings from scripture and prayer as preparation for out time there.

As we left the shrine and collected our luggage to go to reception, the peace of the place was evident with the serene movement of other pilgrims, both day and residential. The group from St Elphin's was placed in Mileham. I was in the room opposite Dianne where we shared a bathroom and both of us had 3 beds in our room. Meals were provided in the Refectory. The food was basic, but well-presented and enjoyable.

After dinner on the first night, we went to St Mary's Parish Church for a short service and a candlelit procession. As I entered the church, there was a beautiful smell of various herbs, including rosemary, thyme and bay leaf etc, that were along the aisles. You can imagine how the herbal aromas



were released as we walked through the church. We left the church singing hymns and processed to the Catholic Church for a reading, John "1-11 (The Wedding Feast at Cana) before going on the Shrine where we assembled around the Altar of the Mysteries of Light.



I have gone into detail on this to some idea of what give you happened while we were there. There were many services in which I participated, some with standing room only, but the two that touched me most were evening prayer in the Barn Chapel on Friday and the of anointing, Saturday service healing, confession and processing around the garden singing as the organ thundered out through the speakers. I found this most uplifting as it vibrated in your soul.









This description can only give a brief outline of what a most spiritual and worthwhile experience. It helped me examine myself in my faith in the company of likeminded pilgrims. I should offer a big thanks to Barbara for her organisation and if you want to soul search, then I wholeheartedly recommend it.



Book Review from Mara

What does Israel fear from Palestine? by Raja Shehadeh



I have been bought to my knees so many times in the last year and ten months at the news from Gaza and Israel. My heart breaks at the news daily, but I wanted to understand a little more.

When the state of Israel was formed in 1948, it precipitated the Nakba or disaster, the displacement of the Palestine nation, creating fracture-lines which continue to erupt in violent and tragic ways today.

In the years that followed, while the Berlin Wall crumbled and South Africa abolished apartheid, the Israeli government rejected every opportunity for reconciliation with Palestine.

Raja Shehadeh, a human rights lawyer and arguably Palestine's greatest living writer, suggests that this does not mean the two nations cannot work together as partners on the road to peace, not genocide.

In graceful, devastatingly observed prose, this is a fresh perspective in a time of great need.

Church Finances for 2025

For the last few years, I have been providing details monthly of the income and expenditure on the general account only. This account pays most of the church expenses including gas, electricity, insurance and clergy housing and other expenses. Therefore, this report for 2024 and 2025, now includes income and expenditure on all accounts **including fabric fund, and investments.**

Income

January 2025 income included £15,000 from the estate of Paul Nener. Feb 2024 included £40k in Legacies. April 2025 includes £2469 tax relief and £11649 bank interest, May 2025 includes £5,602 in bank interest, July includes £10,194 in bank interest.

Expenditure

Expenditure is currently running about £3k more than the same time in 2024, mainly due to the reduction in the Parish Share, and the cost of roof repairs to the clergy vestry.

Many regular donations are now either through the Parish giving scheme or through other electronic means which means less visits to the bank and less cost to the church as banking cash and cheques incur additional charges. Thank you for those who are now using these methods, If anyone would like to know more about how to donate or about the church finances please see me.
