

Janet's Farewell Speech to Revd Debbie

When I was trying to get inspiration for this special day I was trying to think of one good thing about Debbie, then I realised that there were many good things that I could say and we would be here until Christmas!!!!

When I first met Debbie, June introduced us, I thought what a nice pleasant quiet shy person she was! I very quickly realised that she was neither quiet nor shy.

We have come a long way on our journey as I was also new and had only just begun as churchwarden. We got on from the very first day and work so well together.

We have had our ups and downs over the last 4 years, we have laughed and cried together. Reverend Debbie has had her curacy training cut short due to unforeseen circumstances however she never complained she just stepped up and kept the church going of which we are all eternally grateful. I will just touch on some of the hard times we had.

The funeral of Brianna Ghey the young girl that was murdered in Culcheth was held in this church Debbie presided over it and was a constant help to Brianna's family during their time of grief

The funeral of Lucy the young lady who died in America was also held here and again Debbie was a great comfort to the family.

As I said Debbie stepped up to the plate during June's illness. The first time she was hospitalised she was still of help to Debbie and when she recovered enough to come back to the church on a part time basis Debbie made sure she did not overdo it.

Sadly June was admitted to hospital again in April of last year. Debbie soon realised how poorly June was and visited her regularly. When June was moved into St Rocco's Debbie took her communion, I must tell you this short story Debbie was administering the communion June was very poorly and when it came to the part where we say together the Lord's Prayer Debbie had a mental block and said to June I cannot

remember the Lord's Prayer. I am sure that June would have given her a smile even though it would be a weak one. Sadly June died in July last year and Debbie was again remarkable as she had her own grief to deal with as well as mine and everyone here. It was one of the darkest times we have ever had in this church. Again Debbie was a great support to June's daughter Bethany.

We have also had funerals of members of our congregation and one of our previous rector Revd Canon Mike Finlay and I cannot end this part without a mention of our Reader Emeritus Ray Whitticombe who sadly died in December. All these funerals did have an emotional effect on Debbie but she handled everything with great professionalism.

I do not think there is anyone in this place whom you have not helped in one way or another in their time of need.

The introduction of healing during both Sunday services has proved very successful. I am hoping we can carry this on.

Revd Debbie was also very popular with the teachers and pupils of our school arranging for them to come in to church to join us for our Wednesday morning Eucharist. I must say I am in awe of you Debbie as at the end of the service you invite questions and you always answer them no matter how difficult they may be. I often thought after particular difficult questions how on earth is she going to answer that one and amazingly you always did so well done on that.

As I said at the beginning Debbie was not known as shy and quiet and I have picked out a few instances where this has been proven. We were at a deanery synod meeting and were discussing how we could utilise space in our churches. A voice next to me (Debbie) said we could grow mushrooms in the cellar at St Elphins !!!! The room went quiet I did not know where to look. I am serious she said, we did get quite a few funny looks!

Another time, more recently there was a service at Church of Ascension on Ascension day which some of us attended one of the hymns was Freely, freely give and the chorus starts with the words Freely, freely. Now when you come to the chorus it is customary to

sway - so far so good - well Debbie was on one side of me and Dianne on the other and both decided to sway which would have been fine if they had both gone the same way so you can imagine me stuck in the middle getting squashed. Again we got a few strange looks!

As I said at the beginning I could go on and on but I think I have said enough there will be plenty of time after the service to chat to Debbie there is also a buffet so please stay and help us to send Debbie on her way in true St Elphins fashion.

Before I finish I would like to get a bit personal as I have learned so much from Debbie and of course June. Never in a million years did I think I would be able to get the contactless giving machine up and running and know what to do if it stops working as it does from time to time and it was both of you who gave me the confidence and helped me to believe in myself and that there is nothing I cannot do if I put my mind to it so thank you from the bottom of my heart

The Benefice of Bagnall with Endon and Horton's gain is our loss as they are getting a very experienced priest, they do not yet know what they are letting themselves in for!!

We do wish you well Debbie I know you will smash it. You will be missed. I will miss you as I feel that we are not only work colleagues but friends also.

We had a whip round for you and I would like you to accept these gifts as a reminder of your time at St Elphins and do please stay in touch.

May God bless you and guide you as you continue in your ministry

Am I my brother's keeper? (Genesis 4:9)

A marine biologist was swimming near the Cook Islands in the South Pacific when a 50,000 pound humpback whale suddenly appeared and tucked her under its fin. The woman thought her life was over. But after swimming slowly in circles, the whale let her go. Its then that the biologist saw a tiger shark leaving the area. The woman believes the whale had been protecting her – keeping her from danger.

In a world of danger, we're called to watch out for others. But you might ask yourself, 'should I really be expected to be responsible for someone else?' Or in Cain's words; 'Am I my brother's keeper?' The rest of the Old Testament resounds with the thunderous response: Yes! Just as Adam was to care for the garden, so Cain was to care for Abel. Israel was to keep watch over the vulnerable and care for the needy. Yet they did the opposite — exploiting the people, oppressing the poor, and abdicating the calling to love their neighbours as themselves (Isaiah 3: 14-15).

Yet in the Cain and Abel story, God continued to watch over Cain, even after he was sent away (Genesis 4: 15-16). God did for Cain what Cain should have done for Abel. It's a beautiful foreshadowing of what God in Jesus would come to do for us. Jesus keeps us in His care, and empowers us to go and do likewise for others.

Brother, Sister, let me serve you Let me be as Christ to you; Pray that I may have the grace to Let you be my servant too.

Donated sewing machines and materials from the Diocese of Exeter have enabled sewing groups to be set up across the Solomon Islands, where women and girls not only learn valuable sewing skills, but also find safe, empowering spaces.

Earlier this year, Katie Drew, diocesan member and Executive Director, Melanesian Misson, had the privilege of visiting the Solomon Islands and spending time with some truly inspiring Mothers' Union members.



Book Review from Mara

<u>The Girl from Montego Bay</u> – The Autobiography of Britain's First Black Woman Bishop, Rose Hudson-Wilkin



It is rare that I sit down a read a book in one sitting, but I stayed up way past my bedtime to read this, as I truly could not put it down. Bishop Rose is a trailblazer, but wishes that accomplishments like hers would become the norm in her lifetime.

Rose is open about her challenging childhood in Jamaica, and walks through her call to train as an evangelist at the Church Army College in London, where she met her future husband, Ken.

She has been at the heart of change for over four decades, and been guided by the Spirit and her tenaciousness to not go where the path leads, but to go where there is no path and leave a trail. From ministry in Hackney, of working in Parliament, being appointed MBE in 2020, to having a role at the Coronation of King Charles in 2023, you might imagine it has been plain sailing, but this is far from the case. Rose faced (and continues to face) discrimination due to her gender and minority-ethnic background, yet her humour, grace and energy shine through in her stories. It is very much as if you were sitting talking to Bishop Rose as you journey through her book, and she is excellent company!



Transfiguration of our Lord, Wednesday 6th August

About eight days after Jesus said this he took Peter, John and James with him and went up onto a mountain to pray. As he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became as bright as a flash of lightning. Two men, Moses and Elijah, appeared in glorious splendour, talking with Jesus. They spoke about his departure, [a] which he was about to bring to fulfillment Jerusalem. Peter and his companions were very sleepy, but when they became fully awake, they saw his glory and the two men standing with him. As the men were leaving Jesus, Peter said to him, 'Master, it is good for us to be here. Let us put up three shelters—one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' (He did not know what he was saying.) While he was speaking, a cloud appeared and covered them, and they were afraid as they entered the cloud. A voice came from the cloud, saying, 'This is my Son, whom I have chosen; listen to him.' When the voice had spoken, they found that Jesus was alone. The disciples kept this to themselves and did not tell anyone at that time what they had seen.

Church Finances for 2025

For the last few years, I have been providing details monthly of the income and expenditure on the general account only. This account pays most of the church expenses including gas, electricity, insurance and clergy housing and other expenses. Therefore, this report for 2024 and 2025, now includes income and expenditure on all accounts including fabric fund, and investments.

<u>Income</u>

January 2025 income included £15,000 from the estate of Paul Nener. Feb 2024 included £40k in Legacies. April 2025 includes £2469 tax relief and £11649 bank interest, May 2025 includes £5,602 in bank interest.

Expenditure

Expenditure is currently running about £3k more than the same time in 2024, mainly due to the reduction in the Parish Share, and the cost of roof repairs to the clergy vestry.

Many regular donations are now either through the Parish giving scheme or through other electronic means which means less visits to the bank and less cost to the church as banking cash and cheques incur additional charges. Thank you for those who are now using these methods, If anyone would like to know more about how to donate or about the church finances please see me.




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
