What we leave behind

Jesus told a story of a rich man who delighted in his wealth. His crops were great, indeed he had to build a bigger barn to store the harvest. The phrase 'eat, drink and be merry' comes from this parable, with its warning shot 'for tomorrow you die' being applied in hindsight. The rich man did not know that he would die the next day, so he didn't get to enjoy his wealth. We can't take it with us when we're gone, which is why Jesus also taught us not to store up treasures on earth but in heaven, investing in our faith and the good works that flow from following Jesus.

Unlike the rich man of the parable, we can exercise some insight into what happens to our belongings when we are welcomed into God's heavenly home. It is good practice to have a will, and to regularly check and update it as our circumstances change. Perhaps we need to add provision for children, to remove guardianship provision when they no longer need it, to add provision for grandchildren or other loved ones. It's certainly something I'm thinking about, with new grandchildren in my life.

When you are making or revising your will, spare a thought for St Peter's. Legacies make a huge difference to our church. However big or small a gift, they are used for the things that the church really needs, or for the special things we couldn't otherwise afford. Those things help us to remember our friends who have headed to heaven before us and are dedicated in their memory. For example, our lovely matching water and wine cruets, which were bought in memory of Douglas Joll. As I write this article we are ordering much needed replacement radio microphones which will make a big difference to the quality of our services, and when we wear them we will remember Peggy Graves. You will also in due course hear about how we will use legacy money from Richard Pestell.

We are always hugely grateful for these posthumous gifts, which make a qualitative

difference to the church as well as helping us all to remember our friends. Please consider leaving a gift to the church when you write or revise your will. What is Diocesan Synod?

Every diocese has its own Diocesan Synod consisting of bishops, archdeacons, elected laity and elected clergy. Diocesan Synod has a varied and wide-ranging role in the governance of the diocese. It considers matters affecting the Church of England in the diocese; it advises the diocesan bishop where requested to do so; it acts as a forum for debate of Christian opinion on matters of religious or public interest; it formulates diocesan policy on a wide range of issues; it deals with matters referred to it by General Synod.

St Peter's members are Canon Beverley, Revd Doug, Clare Pearce and Hilary Spenceley.

Bishop Debbie is keen to revitalise diocesan governance, hence the recent review carried out by external consultants. Its findings are being considered by senior managers in the diocese. Diocesan Synod, as a part of that governance, is embarking on a more active programme of work, the first session of which was held in July when the diocesan budget was rigorously discussed by a large gathering of synod members and church treasurers.

As you will see from the introductory paragraph the brief of Diocesan Synod is wide and influential. As a forum for debate of Christian opinion it welcomes your views, which St Peter's members would be happy to discuss with you.

Communication between the "person in the pew' and diocesan leaders is made possible through the synodical structure. Hence the importance of having elected representatives at all levels to help you feel connected and valued in diocesan matters.

What does St Peter's offer for school aged young people?

At St Peter's we value our young people, encouraging and developing their Christian faith through specific groups.

Young Voices is the junior section of our Church Choir for school years 3 - 11. Some members sing with us on a regular basis, others occasionally.

Young Disciples for all those at school, meets in the vestry during our 10am Sunday morning service, leaving the main service after the Gospel and returning at the Peace. Sessions focus on the Sunday theme through a bible passage or story, discussion and activities.

Youth Café for school years 6, 7 and 8, meets 1st and 3rd Sundays each month, 6.30-8.00pm, Church Hall. This really has nothing to do with coffee but describes the style of the sessions which are informal, include food and drink, chat and creative activities for our young people. Each session has a focus, maybe biblical, maybe topical or maybe a special visitor; followed by games, quizzes and fun with the dual aim of learning about our faith, living Christian lives, and wanting to come back for more in 2 weeks' time.

Youth Life is a group for young people in Year 9 and above which meets at the same time, 6.30-8.00pm, in The Rectory. We enjoy games, chats, chilling out together, and a more focussed Christian learning group discussion, often led by the young people themselves, with topics that are relevant to their lives in the 21st century.

Its founder was inspired when in 2002 he met a mother dying of AIDS in Malawi and her son. His dream in life was "I want to have enough food to eat and to go to school one day." More than 2 million hungry children eat a simple but nutritious "Mary's meal" each school day, encouraging them to attend school and enabling them to learn. The meal is named after Mary, mother of Jesus. Every meal is a little act of love, for children of all faiths or none.

prepared to enjoy the fun of the raffle and to donate generously to the charity.
