

October also sits within the Season of Creation, an in important focus for Christ

October greets us with its golden fields, ripening fruits, and the crispness of autumn air—a reminder that we are entering the season of Harvest. It is a time when we gather to give thanks for the abundance, we so often take for granted: the food on our tables, the beauty of creation, and the communities we share.

Harvest is more than a celebration of agricultural bounty—it is a profound spiritual opportunity to reflect on God's generosity to us. From the beginning of scripture, we see a God who gives freely: the gift of life, the fruitfulness of the earth, and above all, the self-giving love shown in Jesus Christ. In every loaf of bread and every apple picked from a tree, we are reminded of the giver behind the gifts.

But with blessing comes responsibility. As we receive, so we are called to give. This season, I encourage us all to think about how our lives reflect the generosity of God—not just in what we say, but in how we live. What does it mean for us, in our time and place, to be generous?

One of the most tangible expressions of that generosity is through our charitable giving. This includes our support for the Church and its mission. The church's work in worship, pastoral care, outreach, and hospitality is only possible because of the faithful giving of its people.

If you haven't reviewed your giving recently, I would gently invite you to prayerfully consider how you might support the work of our churches in the months ahead in either giving generously of your time or money or a combination of the two.

October also sits within the Ecumenical Season of Creation, an increasingly important focus for Christians around the world. This season invites us to renew our relationship with God's earth and with one another. As climate change and ecological degradation continue to impact the most vulnerable, our stewardship of creation becomes not only a matter of faith but of justice.

In this light, generosity also means giving our attention, our voices, and our resources to care for our common home. From reducing waste and energy consumption to supporting environmental initiatives and praying for our planet—each action is a response to God's call to tend and keep His creation.

By the time this letter is published we will have already celebrated Harvest at Jenkin chapel, but we still have Harvest festivals to look forward to at Forest Chapel we celebrate Harvest with Evensong on the 5th October at 3pm and at Rainow we have a harvest Communion on the morning of the 12th October. At St Paul's we have an All-Age service to celebrate this wonderful festival and then on the evening of the 12th October at St Paul's we have an opportunity for worship at a Harvest Choral Evensong.

Following on from the success of the fund raising race night which was recently held we also have another opportunity for the two parishes to come together for a Harvest Supper at St Paul's on Saturday 11th October at 6.30 pm.

Rainow will also be having a bring and share lunch after the Communion service on the 12th October with the service starting at the later time of 10.30 am. All welcome.

Family History Research

Would you like to know more about your UK ancestors?

How I can help you:

If your ancestors lived in England and Wales, I can carry out an online search. This will usually trace families back to the late 18th century, although this can be tricky for very common surnames. Some online records go back further. Searching in Ireland, Northern Ireland, Scotland, Isle of Man or the Channel Islands will usually incur additional costs, and records are not so readily available.

HEALTH WARNING:

If you would be offended to find examples of ILLEGITIMACY, INSANITY or CRIMINALITY in your family, then do not search for your ancestors or cousins. These phenomena can be found in practically ALL families!

(But it can be quite interesting!)



breakfast courtesy of Saturday café.









BOOK EXCHANGE STALL

A reminder of what our thoughts for 'first phase' of the project are:

- · Re-roof the upper and lower rooves of the church, including modifications to the guttering to prevent water getting into the building in the future
 - · Replace and re-plaster all internal ceilings panels
 - · Re-plaster internal walls where needed
 - · Redecorate the building internally
 - · Re-light the building with energy efficient lighting
 - · Modernise the sound and media system
 - · Reheat the building in an energy efficient way
 - · Repair the spire where issues are arising

Matt, Nick and Vicar Simon had a positive meeting recently with Architect Ed Kepzyck and Sheena Wilson (Diocesan Buildings Advisor) about how to really begin to move the project on. Lots of discussion was had around what stages we need to complete to feel ready to move to the next stage. From the meeting we are going to do the following:

- Create a project brief (what do we want and why)
- Gain PCC approval for a Feasibility Study for the project to be completed by the Architect. APPROVED BY PCC IN JULY 2025.
- Arrange for Quinquennial Inspection to take place to aid the study. THIS WILL TAKE PLACE IN NOVEMBER 2025.
- Re-meet once completed and look to send the study to the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) for first thoughts and then wider sharing to all stakeholders.

The PCC have approved the undertaking of a Feasibility Study by the Architects, Butress of Manchester. This is a costly piece of work (approx £13,000) but a vitally important part of any project to be completed. The study will look at what we want, consultations completed, a survey of the building (above and beyond the Quinquennial inspection) options of project style including re-ordering. It is looking likely that this is something that we will have to consider extremely seriously to ensure the future of the building, ensuring worship space remains the focus but with a flexible community space to help us become a beacon of light in our community.

If anyone wishes to have a look an example study then please do ask and we will ne happy to show you.

The study will take 2-3 months to complete from start date and we anticipate the start to be happening soon.



BUILDINGS UPDATE



The rain is back and so are the buckets in various places, namely in the tower! We are going to ask Baileys to come and take a look at the tower to ascertain where so much water is coming from!! It could be a blocked gutter or something else.

We continue to monitor the plaster work in some parts and you may have noticed a few pews roped off. This is due to damaged plaster that has dried out and gone powdery falling. We are looking at what remedial work we can do to remedy this. Please bear with us.

We are still awaiting Bailey Steeplejacks to come along with their big ladders to replace some of the upper level lightbulbs for us.

Electrical testing has been completed and there is some remedial work to be completed which is in hand with the contractors. PAT Testing has also been completed. Services of the church boiler and centre boiler are due to be arranged ahead of them being in more frequent use as the weather cools down!



We need to look into doing some work on the Louvres of the south side of the church as these have become incredibly dislodged and will almost certainly be letting rain water in. We have been in contact with a contractor who could help and they are fully booked up until early 2026! We are going to ask for a quotation so we can have an idea of cost.

RAMBLINGS OF A READER

As I woke up this morning and looked out to the fields behind our house there was frost on the around, and as I look out of our front window, the leaves on the Virginia Creeper are turning a beautiful shade of red a sure sign that Autumn is on its way. The season of mists and mellow fruitfulness' as a famous poet once said, but it is also the season of folk tales and mystery. The most famous being Halloween. As a child I'd never heard of this. It seemed to creep in during my son's childhood, with the introduction of many American TV shows. But you may be surprised to know that many of the customs behind Halloween started in Britain and went over to America with those who emigrated, probably in the 18th century, for that is when the word Halloween came into being, a shortened form of All Hallows Eve or All Holy Eve, because it was the day before the festival of All Hallows Day, or as we know it today All Saints Day.

But let's go back to the beginning so to speak. The custom of dressing up at this time of year goes back to the 18th century and was called guising and comes from Scotland and Ireland, where children would go from door to door asking for gifts usually fruit and nuts.

So, you may be wondering where does the pumpkin lantern come from? Well, people have been making jack-o'-lanterns at Halloween for centuries but the practice originated from an Irish myth about a man nicknamed 'Stingy Jack', and there are many versions of the story. The following goes like this....

Stingy Jack invited the Devil to have a drink with him. True to his name Stingy Jack didn't want to pay for the drink so he convinced the Devil to turn into a coin that Jack could use to buy their drinks. The Devil agreed, but Jack decided to keep



the money and put it into his pocket next to a silver cross so the Devil couldn't turn back. Jack eventually freed the Devil on condition that he wouldn't bother him for a year, or claim his soul if he died. Jack tricked the devil a second time to climb a tree to pick fruit, then carving a cross in it so the Devil couldn't get down until he agreed to not bother Jack for ten years.



Soon after, Jack died but the legend says, God would not allow such an unsavoury figure into heaven and the Devil, upset by the trick Jack had played on him, wouldn't allow him in Hell so he sent Jack off into the dark

night with only a burning coal to light his way. Jack put the coal into a carved-out turnip and has been roving the earth ever since. The Irish refer to the ghostly figure as Jack of the Lantern and then simply Jack O Lantern.

In Ireland and Scotland people began to make their own version of Stingy Jacks
Lantern by carving scary faces into turnips to put in their windows or on the doorstep to scare Jack away. As I said earlier the emigrants took the tradition to America but finding no turnips there but lots of pumpkins a fruit native to America, they found they made prefect Jack o' Lanterns, and they were also much easier to carve.



I love folk tales, stories made up to help us understand things that we don't understand, but also to frighten us a little and think about things we do, do.

The church over the ages hasn't always agreed with folk tales and customs, Halloween being very much a no no. I remember one vicar we had at St Peters who was very much against it, and a couple of the children in the congregation, who are now grown up, and one with children themselves, still hasn't quite forgiven their mother, who was church warden at the time, for banning all mention of Halloween and the trappings that went with it.



So in the 21st century is there still a place for these customs? Shops will tell you yes. Fancy dress costumes and pumpkins are big business at this time of year, and many will say it's a bit of harmless fun. I'll leave each one of you to make your own mind up, but remember you don't need a candle in a turnip or a pumpkin to give you light in the darkness. Just turn to the one who's light shines in that darkness, and follow his light always and he will lead you, and walk with you on the right path always.


