I was talking to a friend who had just come back from a holiday in Egypt, and it never went below 50 degrees, so they spent most of the time inside the air-conditioned hotel. It makes me yearn for those childhood holidays in a caravan in rain-soaked Wales which we always seemed to have. Playing board games while the rain battered down onto the roof of the caravan keeping everyone awake. Perhaps the hot weather is better after all!

To see what is available to help our sleep in these very balmy hot nights I have taken to looking at the Web to see what is on offer. I never realised there are so many different fans, ductless air conditioning units, air conditioning units available. St Mary's has a connection with Dovedale of course, firstly St Bertelin left the embryonic 'Staitheford' (Stafford), and went to live at Ilam, near to where Dovedale House is situated, and then our famous Izaak Walton, who's birthday we will celebrate on 10th August, wrote his book the 'Compleat Angler', about his fishing experiences on the River Dove near to Ilam, and other rivers. Those of you who are Walton afficionados will know the 'Compleat Angler' is supposed to be either the second or third most read book in the world after the Bible, depending on who you read on Google.

But my personal interest in the article by Jeremy Oakley was his description of he and his friend walking over the stepping stones at Dovedale. For me the last time I walked over those stepping stones was a moment of high drama and personal danger. It was New Year's Day 2015, and I went with two of my sons and two of my grandsons to walk along Dovedale. A nice invigorating New Year's Day Walk I thought, till about two miles up Dovedale I slipped and tore my left Quadricep Muscle, which holds the top part of the leg to the bottom part, leaving me with a left leg that didn't work at all.

My two sons had to literally carry me out of Dovedale, but crossing the stepping stones, with the river Dove in full flow, crashing over the stones, was

literally a nightmare. One son had to hold me up while the other had to get in the river and hold me up from below, so we could inch our way across to the other side and towards the car park where my car was parked. I was in a strange knee calliper contraption for three months and having to walk with crutches. An experience I will never forget.

Well, that's enough rambling for one episode.

Ordained Ministry / Celebrating 50 years Fr Michael Newman

I have recently acquired a new cassock, a belated gift from Eileen to mark my appointment as a Prebendary back in 2002! It looks very smart.

Our eldest daughter Helen said "Well Dad you won't be wearing it for long." She is right. After 50 years of active ministry 10 years more would be a miracle. I live in hope.

I was ordained 29th September 1975 at the Collegiate Church of St Michael and All Angels in Tettenhall near Wolverhampton. It was unusual in those days to hold such services in a parish church but the Vicar persuaded the Bishop to make it part of Tettenhall's millennial celebrations.

The service was quite overwhelming. It was the culmination of years of discernment and training but it had lighter moments. I will never forget the sight of the Archdeacon losing control over the stoles on his arm. They slivered away landing on the floor like so many snakes! As was the custom two posts as curate were to follow.

Serving with David Tustin at Tettenhall was a formative experience. He had been a curate here at St Mary's. He was a kindly family man endowed with understanding and wisdom beyond his years. I owe him a huge debt of gratitude for all he taught me about the priestly life and parochial ministry

There was, however, much more to David's ministry than I realised at the time. He was an excellent linguist and in his episcopal ministry did much to strengthen relationships with the German and Nordic churches for which he was awarded Lambeth Doctorate of Divinity. In his 91st year we are still in regular contact with each other.

Three years later we arrived in Uttoxeter to serve with the Preb. William Henry Osmund Moss. He was old school and had been a wartime chaplain in the Royal Navy. He was full of amusing stories, generous and warm hearted and if at times tactless, he was the perfect foil to the independently minded farming community of the area

In retirement Osmund conducted a campaign against home made communion wine. In advance of my arrival in Rugeley he banished "the iniquitous brew "from the parish. A good bottle of port was required. I will remain forever grateful.

Incumbencies were to follow at Norton Canes and then as Team Rector and later Rural Dean of Rugeley. I cannot pretend that ordained ministry has been easy but it's certainly been rewarding. It's quite remarkable how we have always seemed to arrive in the right place at the right time. I owe much to the Team Vicars, Curates, Wardens and so many parishioners for their support in ministry over the years.

It was to St Mary's we came in 2015 following retirement. It was the church where my parents had married in 1945. It has been a privilege to share in the life of St Mary's together with the congregations of St Chad's and St Leonard's.

Father Richard was most generous in his

welcome. In his own words he took great care to provide retired clergy with "a sanctuary" from which to maintain a ministry to the extent that health permitted. I had once thought only retired donkeys were admitted to a sanctuary but now I know differently! I hope that Richard will soon find his sanctuary.

In all this I have been sustained by the love and support of Eileen and the family. I will be presiding at the 10am Eucharist at St Mary's on Sunday 28th September. We do hope that you will be able to join us for the celebration.

Below is some information from Concordis International about their work.

Hello everyone at St Mary's

You have recently made a very kind donation to the work of Concordis International in Central Africa. Firstly, thank you for your support; we appreciate it financially, but also as a way of knowing you are standing with us

Secondly, you may be interested to know a bit about where your money is working.

We are peacebuilders. Concordis staff support communities who live where conflict is fought and felt, to help them find workable solutions that address the root causes of conflict and contribute to lasting peace and economic development. We do this in 5 places: Sudan, South Sudan, Abyei, Central

African Republic, Chad and Cameroon.

Peacebuilding is a process: it does not happen fast. We engage for the long term to build trusting relationships on all sides of the conflict, so that we can bring people together to talk and resolve their differences. The solutions found are sustainable and long lasting, because they are created by the communities who will implement them. We see change, even in the midst of awful situations and because of that we feel hope.

One such story of hope comes from Sudan, which is facing the worst hunger crisis in decades. Following Concordis' community peacebuilding initiatives in South Darfur, parents encouraged their sons to become farmers rather than soldiers, protecting their families by growing food. The consequence: there will not be famine this year in the part of Darfur where we work. The dependency on aid is reduced and self-reliance is restored.

Service to Commemorate the End of Second World War

On Saturday 21st June a service was held in St Mary's Church to commemorate the end of the Second World War, encompassing both VE and VJ Days. There was a large congregation of ex-Service men and women, including the Vice Lord-Lieutenant of Staffordshire and the Mayor of

Stafford.

During the service wreaths were laid at the Borough Book of Remembrance, which is kept in our church, and young people representing the Navy, Army, Royal Air Force and St John Ambulance took part in the prayers and lit a 'Candle of Peace'.

One of those present was George Wright BEM, who joined the Royal Navy in 1943 aged 16, and because of his age he was not allowed to take part in any fighting, so he was a boat boy, which meant he had to carry the ammunition from the ammunition holds up to the guns, which was probably far more dangerous than being on deck taking part in the fighting.

In 1944 George was on HMS Aurora at the Battle of Sicily, the battles take and retake Italy and Operation Dragoon, on the South Coast of France diverting German troops from the D Day landings.

After the war George returned to civvy life but after three years joined the Parachute Regiment and served for many more years and then served as Sergeant

Major in the Army Cadet Force. Having served the Royal British Legion for many years he was awarded the British Empire Medal for his outstanding service to his country.

It was a truly memorable service, honouring those who fought for peace and freedom, and especially those who gave their lives.

It was a deliberate decision to commemorate both events on the same day as previous events had seen a sharp decline in attendance for the VJ Day event and the combination proved to be very effective as there were people in the congregation who were there to commemorate each individual event as well as both. It was truly a poignant and memorable service and the organisers would like to thank Rev John and the church authorities for providing such a wonderful service to so many people.

We aim to raise awareness of the issues faced by people both in developing nations and within the local community; and to be a focus for charitable giving within St. Mary's.

Some of the activities through which we seek to achieve this are:

- We focus on a main overseas charity through a project lasting 2 to 3 years. At present, as our regular readers will know, this charity is Hospice Care Kenya. Thanks to the generosity of all those who support the charity, money is raised from:
- Lent and Harvest donations
- Collection at the Christmas Tree Festival Carol Service
- The Cross in my Pocket available in exchange for a donation
- Charity Coffee Concerts during the year
- Other initiatives such as an envelope savings scheme
- 2. We support two local charities House of Bread and Christian Food Help Stafford. Collection boxes at the back of St. Mary's and St. Chad's churches are used throughout the year, and we make sure that donations from the congregations and friends are passed on regularly to our contacts at the charities. At times such as Harvest Festival, Christmas and Lent we organise focussed collections asking for specific items.
- 3. Short term projects may be used when one off issues arise. One of these was Toilet Twinning having supported this a few years ago, we had a mini-project more recently to help Soroptimists International of Stafford achieve their aim of making Stafford a Toilet Twinning town. (The certificate is on the wall outside our own toilet)

The One World Group noticeboard has been updated and moved to the new display area in the north transept in St. Mary's. At the time of writing this is a "work in progress" but do go and have a look!

At present we have six members: Chris Bown, Sarah Haszard, Brian Lloyd, Pauline Roycroft, John Savage and Jenny Stewart; we're looking to increase our membership. If this is



You may have noticed 'Julian Meeting' on the list of contacts at the end of Centrepiece and wondered what it was, in fact Dee asked me if it still existed. Indeed it does!

The Julian Meetings are a network of like-minded people fostering contemplative prayer in the Christian tradition. The name is taken from Julian of Norwich.

Yes, we can pray silently on our own but there is something very powerful in experiencing this together with others.

When we gather we sit upright, comfortably letting go of tensions, relaxed, but alert and aware.

Each meeting begins with an appropriate reading either from scripture or a poem or from a spiritual writing. Sometimes meditative music is played leading into silence. It can help to use a mantra, a word or phrase, perhaps from the reading just heard, or for example, 'Be still and know that I am God'.

When the mind wanders, as it will, bring it back into focus using the mantra to expel the thoughts that inevitably come rushing in. The silence is usually held for half an hour, then music, another reading and a prayer end the meeting.

The Stafford Julian Meeting gathers on the 2nd Tuesday of each month at 10.30am at the Quaker Meeting House in Foregate Street. We come from a range of different denominations, the Quakers kindly offering us hospitality. For more information see the notice board in the North Transept or speak to Sheila Young.

Redefining Rest

Apparently, Summer = Rest and relaxation. Two things most of us need more of. As we enjoy the blue skies and sunshine (obviously alongside the very British moaning about the weather, "it's a bit hot isn't it!") many people start thinking about holidays.

My experience is that holidays don't necessarily equate to rest and/or relaxation! Whether it's the anxiety of travelling, the cost, the kids (no we're not nearly there yet!) or simply the fact that even on holiday there's so much to do!

There is a wealth of information 'out there' that stresses the importance of rest and relaxation for our mental and physical wellbeing, and Jesus said we would find rest with him (Mt 11v28). But that's not always the easiest. I believe that Jesus was quite a fan of wellbeing – he wanted us to be ourselves, not strive to be someone we're not and he stressed the importance of resting.

I recently read an email that reminded me of the importance of looking after our own wellbeing and a specific line hit me "We are our own responsibility after all". The article continued by suggesting that if we don't look after our own wellbeing then our ability to truly embrace who we are, and to live that out, will reduce.

There is truth in this. Jesus commented that everything rests (excuse the pun!) on two things – Love the Lord your God and love your neighbour as yourself (Mt 22:37-39). If we focus on the last bit of that I believe it means that we need to be able to love ourselves – who we are – and to pay attention to how we look after ourselves; we need holistic rest (mental, physical, emotional, spiritual). Only then are we able to serve and love others.

Rest looks different for everyone, it's not just about stopping and sitting quietly (although that can be good), to me it's something that gives you chance to put aside work/life etc for a few minutes and focus on something that feeds your soul. This could be nature, exercise, art, coffee with friends, dancing, computer games etc etc.

For many of us the summer doesn't automatically equal holiday, rest and relaxation. Life goes on; churches have summer fetes and regular services need to function with various people on holiday; kids are off school and after two days are bored and searching for things to do – often whilst parents and carers are trying to juggle who has the kids whilst they try and juggle work! So yes, rest and relaxation can be a tall order to reach.

Jesus doesn't ask us to be perfect though (phew!) - he simply nudges us to find small nuggets here and there where we can rest – in whatever way helps us.
