
On 26th October St John's will have a Harvest Celebration: see page 10 for details.

Greetings WORD Readers!

Have you ever seen a leopard without any spots?

I'm not sure they exist in real life, but I recently saw a painting of such a leopard that really spoke



to me. I was at a worship event where some of the worship team practice something called, 'prophetic art'. It's where one or more people will paint during an extended worship time and believe that God will speak through the art that is created. It can be quite remarkable. In fact, I have a piece that was gifted to me at one such event after the attack in Southport in 2024. A few hundred people in that event prayed over me and over Southport at that event and I was gifted one of the paintings that was titled, 'Impartation of Restoration' which depicts a person being closely engulfed by a horse which for the artist, is representative of the Holy Spirit, God.

The leopard without its spots was an inference to the saying, 'a leopard doesn't change its spots'. The message was one of sanctification. Ultimately, we, as followers of Christ will not be fully sanctified or made holy until we meet Jesus face to face. Although this is true, we can come against the lie that sometimes we might succumb to, that we cannot change. Paul says in 2 Corinthians 3:18 'And we all, who with unveiled faces contemplate the Lord's glory, are being transformed into his image with ever-increasing glory, which comes from the Lord, who is the Spirit.'

Jesus is transforming us to more closely resemble Him. Note, this transformation comes from the Lord. So, if there is some issue, some sin that you are struggling with, perhaps a struggle that you have given up trying to change because, 'a leopard doesn't change it's spots', maybe this is the encouragement you need to hear today. Change is possible when we keep our eyes fixed on Jesus. 'Remain in me and my words remain in you'...said Jesus in John 15:7 'and you can ask for whatever you wish.'

The best way to keep your eyes fixed on Him, to remain in Him, is to read His Word. Read the Bible, read it every day. Even if it is only one verse each day, read it, meditate on it, pray about it, talk to God about it, ask Him to give you a deeper understanding. The more you remain in His Word, the more you will be transformed and the more you will naturally be empowered to step away from the things you might find yourself doing that you do

not want to do, the things that fall short of God's glory.

We are human, we are fallen which is why Jesus came to take our place, to make a way for us to be with God. We all fall short of His glory, every one of us. God is gracious, forgiving and His mercies are new every morning. When we turn to Him, He will help us. But we first have to take that step, we have to turn. We have to want to make changes that will draw us closer to God. God never called an army of robots, He calls you, His child, and He gives us the opportunity to make positive choices, to follow Him and to change, by doing so we can continually become more and more like His Son.

You could never do anything that would make God stop loving you. He loves you, and He is with you even if there are times when you feel unworthy. The truth is we are unworthy, but He is worthy and thanks to Christ, we are seen through His worthiness. A heart that truly loves the Lord will always turn to Him and strive to do better. Our spots can indeed be changed.






MIDWEEK COMMUNION SERVICE

The Change You Need

The Text: 2 Corinthians 5: 11-19 NIV

11 Since, then, we know what it is to fear the Lord, we try to persuade others. What we are is plain to God, and I hope it is also plain to your conscience. 12 We are not trying to commend ourselves to you again, but are giving you an opportunity to take pride in us, so that you can answer those who take pride in what is seen rather than in what is in the heart. 13 If we are "out of our mind," as some say, it is for God; if we are in our right mind, it is for you. 14 For Christ's love compels us, because we are convinced that one died for all, and therefore all died. 15 And he died for all, that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for him who died for them and was raised again. 16 So from now on we regard no one from a worldly point of view. Though we once regarded Christ in this way, we do so no longer. 17 Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here! 18 All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: 19 that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. Work In Brazil

The Text: Mark 4: 35-41 and 5: 1-20 NIV

Chapter 4

35 That day when evening came, he said to his disciples, "Let us go over to the other side." 36 Leaving the crowd behind, they took him along, just as he was, in the boat. There were also other boats with him. 37 A furious squall came up, and the waves broke over the boat, so that it was nearly swamped. 38 Jesus was in the stern, sleeping on a cushion. The disciples woke him and said to him, "Teacher, don't you care if we drown?" 39 He got up, rebuked the wind and said to the waves, "Quiet! Be still!" Then the wind died down and it was completely calm. 40 He said to his disciples, "Why are you so afraid? Do you still have no faith?" 41 They were terrified and asked each other, "Who is this? Even the wind and the waves obey him!"

Chapter 5

1 They went across the lake to the region of the Gerasenes. 2 When Jesus got out of the boat, a man with an impure spirit came from the tombs to meet him. 3 This man lived in the tombs, and no one could bind him anymore, not even with a chain. 4 For he had often been chained hand and foot, but he tore the chains apart and broke the irons on his feet. No one was strong enough to subdue him. 5 Night and day among the tombs and in the hills he would cry out and cut himself with stones. 6 When he saw Jesus from a distance, he ran and fell on his knees in front of him. 7 He shouted at the top of his voice, "What do you want with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? In God's name don't torture me!" 8 For Jesus had said to him, "Come out of this man, you impure spirit!" 9 Then Jesus asked him, "What is your name?" "My name is Legion," he replied, "for we are many." 10 And he begged Jesus again and again not to send them out of the area. 11 A large herd of pigs was feeding on the nearby hillside. 12 The demons begged Jesus, "Send us among the pigs; allow us to go into them." 13 He gave them permission, and the impure spirits came out and went into the pigs. The herd, about two thousand in number, rushed down the steep bank into the lake and were drowned. 14 Those tending the pigs ran off and reported this in the town and countryside, and the people went out to see what had happened. 15 When they came to Jesus, they saw the man who had been possessed by the legion of demons, sitting there, dressed and in his right mind; and they were afraid. 16 Those who had seen it told the people what had happened to the demon-possessed man—and told about the pigs as well. 17 Then the people began to plead with Jesus to leave their region. 18 As Jesus was getting into the boat, the man who had been demon-possessed begged to go with him. 19 Jesus did not let

him, but said, "Go home to your own people and tell them how much the Lord has done for you,

and how he has had mercy on you." 20 So the man went away and began to tell in the

Decapolis how much Jesus had done for him. And all the people were amazed.



REVIVE INTERNATIONAL RESTORING LIVES, RENEWING HOPE

A recent newsletter from our Mission Partner in Brazil

Proverbs 4:6-7 (NIV):

"Do not forsake wisdom, and she will protect you; love her, and she will watch over you. The beginning of wisdom is this: Get wisdom. Though it cost all you have, get understanding."

Divine wisdom surpasses all human understanding, giving us the ability to lead and resolve conflicts in an extraordinary way. The wisdom of the Holy Spirit equips us with understanding that comes from God. That is why our daily prayer has been: Lord, grant us wisdom to have a vision that comes from above. Every life that arrives at Reaviva is very precious, and we recognise that we are in need of the wisdom that comes from God. It is this wisdom that enables us to carry out our responsibilities and to fulfil God's purposes here on earth.

At the end of July, we welcomed **M.E., aged 10**, who was transferred from a municipal shelter. She was taken in because she frequently ran away from home, and there is a suspicion of sexual abuse — most likely the reason for her repeated escapes from her mother's house. She had also begun associating with drug users.

Also at the end of July, K.V. returned from her mother's home. Despite a gradual approach and close support, the adaptation was unsuccessful for both sides, making it necessary for her to return to care. We immediately began a transition plan for K.V., as she is already 17 years old and needs to prepare for her near future, whether that involves returning to her mother or another arrangement. We were able to secure an apprenticeship position for her at ALEPE (Legislative Assembly of Pernambuco), where she is now working. This opportunity will be very valuable for K.V., helping her to gain autonomy and to build her future. In August, we welcomed P.O., aged 7, who had already passed through nine different homes without receiving the proper care she needed. She was taken to the Guardianship Council by her brother, who said he could not look after her. Her mother is a drug user and lives on the streets. Please pray that God may grant us wisdom in caring for P.O., as she is very much in need of affection.

We also have news in the adoption cases: **T.V.**, **aged 13**, was registered with CEJA (State Judicial Commission for Adoption of Pernambuco). We have already started the introduction process with a couple, and their first meeting was very positive. Soon, **M.C.** will also begin the process of meeting her new family. Our prayer is that God's will be done and that both may find in their new homes acceptance, love, protection, and care.

We had the joy of sharing a very special time with Andy and his family — Rose, Sofia, and Julia! During the time they were with us, we experienced moments of fellowship and learning that filled our hearts with gratitude. It was wonderful to celebrate together each step forward and every blessing God has granted us, further strengthening our faith and hope.

We are living through challenging times, with many children in our city facing neglect and suffering violations of their rights. Last month (August) we reached our maximum capacity of care. At the end of July, we welcomed a newborn baby boy (1 month old), who left the hospital and went directly to the foster family's home, where he is receiving all the care, affection and protection he needs. In August, we also welcomed another child, a 5-year-old girl.

Despite the challenging reality, we remain confident that, step by step, we are strengthening the right to family and community life and transforming lives.

"The new incumbent should be sympathetic to our musical tradition"- The new incumbent must be able to play the organ as well as lead the Services. "While cherishing our traditions, we see the need for change" – We always see the need for change, but alter anything at your peril.

"Plans for church renovations are in hand" – The building is in imminent danger of collapse.

"We have a large range of church groups" – You will have to run a large range of church groups singlehandedly.

"The vicarage is being refurbished" – The vicarage is a death trap. Its rising damp and dangerous electrics will not be fixed for many months yet.

"There is opportunity for developing ecumenical relations" – No one in living memory has ever spoken to clergy of other denominations in our town.

"The new incumbent should have a sense of humour" – He or she will need it when reading this specification.

In the event of Medical Emergency at St John's:

We have two trained First Aiders: Rev Jennie, and Janette Law.

If neither of them is available there are two points of contact: Clive Morris and Stuart Baker. They are not trained First Aiders but if they are available they can be contacted and they will contact the emergency services if necessary or give access to the First Aid kit which is kept in the church hall kitchen.

We have a Defibrillator machine. This is in the entrance lobby in the church hall next to the door which opens into the corridor leading to the church. Instructions for use of the



Defibrillator are contained in the machine.

We recommend that worshippers and other visitors to our church should carry a mobile phone with them. We do **not** have a payphone in the church or hall.



The Canterbury Tales

Stuart Baker revisits some of these stories in search of their moral lessons. This month he looks at

The Canon's Yeoman's Tale

At the completion of the Second Nun's tale of Saint Cecilia, a Canon, riding a dilapidated old hack, and his Yeoman, on an even worse hack, rode up to the pilgrims. The Host welcomed them and asked whether either had a tale to tell. The Yeoman answered immediately that his master knew much about mirth and jollity, and then he began to tell the secrets of their trade and all he knew about alchemy. Seeing that the Yeoman planned to tell everything, the Canon slipped away in shame.

The Yeoman explained that once he had had good clothes and a comfortable living, that he and the Canon were alchemists, and that he was so in debt because their attempts at alchemy always failed. He then tried to explain their occupation, their failed attempts at alchemy, and their elusive search for the Philosopher's Stone. Then he told this tale:

A canon who practised alchemy borrowed a mark (an old coin) from a priest. In three days time, the canon returned the mark and offered to reveal a couple of his discoveries. He sent for some quick silver and, by tricks, made the priest believe that he had turned the quick silver into real silver. Unaware of the trick, the priest was very pleased. Three times the canon tricked the priest, each time "turning" a less valuable object (quick silver, chalk, and then a twig) into silver. The beguiled priest bought the secret from the canon for £40, and the canon promptly disappeared. The Yeoman ended his tale with a broadside attack on the subject of alchemy and a conglomeration of all the ridiculous terms used by alchemists.

[Alchemy was an ancient tradition which combined elements of chemistry, philosophy, medicine and spirituality. One of its key goals was turning base metals such as lead into gold or silver. This was, of course, impossible but unscrupulous alchemists took advantage of ignorant folk by trickery.]

The moral lessons of this tale:

We can think of alchemy as a metaphor for deceit and fraudulence. The tale offered a warning against greed and the desire for quick riches.

The tale does not have a particularly satisfying end because the perpetrator of the fraud got away with £40 of fraudulent gains, and left a gullible victim to suffer the loss.

The lessons which we can all learn and always remind ourselves about are these:

- if something looks too good to be true, it probably is;
- sometimes it is sensible to look a gift horse in the mouth with great care!.

The Nicene Creed:

By Canon Paul Hardingham

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son He is worshipped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets.

This month we are considering what the Nicene Creed says about the Holy Spirit.

'We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life': The original version of the Nicene Creed ended simply 'We believe in the Holy Spirit.' However, the phrase 'the Lord, the giver of life' was added to counter the teachings of Macedonius (Bishop of Constantinople), who viewed the Holy Spirit as a creation of the Son. The Holy Spirit is part of the Trinity who shapes us, according to Christ's image, through His fruit and gifts: 'the Spirit gives life...we are being transformed into His image with everincreasing glory, which comes from the Lord, who is the Spirit.' (2 Corinthians 3:6,18).

'who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son He is worshipped and glorified': In the late 6th century the Latin churches added the phrase 'and the Son' (the Filioque Clause), which was rejected by the Orthodox Churches. Augustine described the Spirit as 'love proceeding' from the Father and the Son, so we can know God: 'When the Advocate comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who goes out from the Father, He will testify about me.' (John 15:26).

The Creed is clear that the Holy Spirit is due equal status and worship with the Father and the Son, as a distinct divine person: 'May the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.' (2 Corinthians 13:14).

'He has spoken through the Prophets': Why does the Creed include this activity of the Spirit? It is not just referring to the OT prophets, but the whole of Scripture. He has inspired Scripture, so that we have God's word communicated by human writers: 'All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness' (2 Timothy 3:16). When we read the Bible, the Spirit enables us to hear what God is saying to us.

In what areas of life have you felt the Holy Spirit at work in you?

An Introduction to Books in the New Testament: Galatians

Canon Paul Hardingham continues his series exploring books in The Bible.

Paul's letter to the Galatians has been described as the 'Magna Carta of Christian Liberty', because it emphasises the freedom that we have through faith in Jesus Christ. Paul vigorously defends the truth that people are justified ('made right with God') by faith in Jesus Christ alone. Our standing with God is not determined by what we do, but by dependence on what Christ has done.

It is generally believed that Paul wrote this letter in 48/49AD to the churches in the southern area of Galatia (in the central part of modern Turkey), which he planted on his first missionary journey. It was written before the Council of Jerusalem (Acts 15), making it the earliest of Paul's letters.

Paul is dealing with Jewish-Christians (or Judaizers) who were advocating ceremonial practices of the Jewish law, including circumcision, in addition to faith in Christ as the means of salvation. They were undermining Paul's authority as an apostle, by asserting that his gospel didn't agree with the apostles in Jerusalem.

In response, Paul defends his apostolic authority and presents the true gospel, by emphasising the unique importance of Christ and His cross in salvation. He argues that 'a person is justified not by the works of the law but through faith in Jesus Christ' (2:16). He appeals especially to the examples of Abraham (3:6-9) and Hagar and Sarah (4:21-31), who stand in contrast as being a 'slave' under the law and 'free' in Christ.

'It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery.' (5:1). We are justified through faith alone and it is by faith alone that we live out our new life in the freedom of the Spirit.

God in the Arts

The Revd Michael Burgess surveys great works of sacred art.

'He gave us eyes to see them': Lucas Cranach's 'Adam and Eve'

In October we traditionally give thanks for the good gifts of God's creation at harvest time. In the

readings for our worship, we often return to that original goodness in the Garden of Eden, described for us in the opening chapters of Genesis. We glimpse that scene of paradisal harmony in Lucas Cranach's painting 'Adam and Eve.' It shows a wonderful menagerie of birds and animals around the couple, all unaware that the harmony will be shattered as Adam takes the apple from Eve.

One version of this painting is in the Courtauld Gallery of Somerset House in London. It

is a large, neoclassical building by the Strand in the centre of the city. In the summer months 55 fountains play in the courtyard outside, while in the winter people skate on the ice rink. Somerset House was built on the site of a Tudor palace and dates from the 18th century. It is now a centre for the visual arts with an impressive collection of paintings.

Lucas Cranach, this month's artist, was born in 1472 in what is now Bavaria. He became a court painter to the Electors of Saxony until his death in 1553. Cranach was a close friend of Martin Luther, but also had Catholic patrons. Like the Electors, they marvelled at his mastery of landscape and animals. In this painting we are invited into the garden to look on all the beauty and wonder there. Among the animals we can see a hog, a lion (although Cranach would never have seen a lion in the flesh), a sheep, and a stag, a symbol of Christ. There are birds as well, including a pair of partridges, who traditionally represent the

power of love, but also deceit. The roe deer drinking from the pool in the foreground is a reminder of Psalm 42 and the soul thirsting for God. But dominating the scene is that moment of turning from God: there is a glorious tree, laden with fruit, and in front Adam and Eve, whose hands clutch an apple, while the serpent slithers down the trunk in a moment of triumph.



The painting is reminiscent of medieval tapestries and, like them, has a beguiling quality. All is beautiful and harmonious: it is Isaiah's vision of the lion lying down with the lamb amid the fruitfulness of nature and the oneness of creation. As we look on, we know that the defiance of God and the temptation to eat will lose this paradise. But we also know that creation will be redeemed by another fruit. Around Adam and Eve are the vine and grapes: they represent the Eucharist, the gift of Christ's body and blood.

The fruit of the tree in the painting leads to a fall from grace, but the fruit from that other tree, the vine, will redeem and lift humanity again to share in the bread and wine, the gifts of creation given at harvest and shared at every Holy Communion.

THE INFLUENCE OF RELIGION ON LAW

Reflections of Lord Denning, one of the foremost English Judges of the twentieth century.

"PUNISHMENT FOR CRIME"

Whilst civil wrongs are redressed by compensation, nevertheless there still remain all the criminal wrongs which must be met by punishment. The command that you are to love your neighbour does not mean that those who do wrong should not be punished. In the Epistle of St. Peter it is said that governors are sent by God 'for the punishment of evil-doers." What then is the right way to punish them? What is to be done with people who are enemies of society, men who prey upon it by theft and fraud, men who assault innocent women and children, men who are murderers? At one time the law held that they should be exterminated. Nearly all serious offences were punishable by death. But under the influence of a more humane jurisprudence, or rather, I would say of a Christian outlook, capital punishment was abolished in all cases except murder and treason. Now it has for practical purposes been abolished altogether. In any discussion of punishment it is important to recognise, as Christianity does, that society itself is responsible for the conditions which make men criminals.

It is a commonplace that broken homes produce juvenile delinquents. The child, who has lost his sense of security, feels that he must fight for his interests in a hostile world. He becomes antisocial and finally criminal. The broken home from which he comes is only too often a reflection on society itself, a society which has

failed to respect the sanctity of marriage, a society which has failed to maintain its standards of morality, a society which has lost its religion. When we try to reform the criminal, we are only treating the symptoms of the disease. We are not tackling the cause of it. The best way to deal with it is to reform society itself: and in this regard, I need hardly say that the leaders of society have an especial responsibility. It is disturbing to find how many broken homes, how many matrimonial offences, exist among those in high positions.

[Editor's note: Lord Denning's repeated use of masculine nouns and pronouns was in keeping with the way in which these issues were addressed at the time when he wrote. But, of course, his views apply equally both to male and female offenders.

Reflecting Faith: Glory to God by Rev. Dr. Jo White

For the last few months we've been looking at the way that church services are put together. Last time we looked at how we begin by recognising how great and amazing God is, and therefore apologise for all the things we've done wrong – or should have done and haven't – in the light of His 'perfection'.

We then receive God's forgiveness. At this point, recognising how gracious and forgiving God is, we are asked to rise from our knees and stand together to give 'Glory to God'.

Known in Latin as 'The Gloria'. You will recognise those words from those spoken by the angels announcing the birth of Christ to the shepherds on the hills over Bethlehem: "Glory to God in the highest, and peace on earth to people of good will" (Luke 2:15)

Traditionally this 'angelic hymn' has been sung and begins with praise to God the Father. It then asks for the mercy from God the Son, the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world.

The final lines soar into the blinding mystery of the Trinity: 'Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father'. Because it is so full of joy it is not included in worship during Advent and Lent.

This hymn dates back to the third century of the Church. Tradition holds that it was first composed as a prayer in the East, and then translated to Latin by Saint Hilary of Poitiers around the year 360.

Because this hymn is so special over the years there have been limitations on who was allowed to sing or recite it. At first it was only bishops and then in the 11th century priests were allowed to do so. Now we all sing or say it



together. That means we take our place in our Christian heritage alongside those angels singing or saying it each week.

What a privilege!

To St Luke, whose feast-day is 18th October, we owe a beautifully written gospel as well as the Book of Acts. He was a Greek physician and faithful travelling companion to St Paul. Under house arrest near the end of his life Paul noted, 'only Luke is with me'. Luke's gospel focuses on the compassion of Christ, and offers us moving parables, such as the Good Samaritan and Prodigal Son. Women figure more prominently in Luke's gospel than in any other: look out for the extended story of the Virgin Birth, and stories of Mary, Elizabeth, and the woman who was a sinner. His gospel also features more poor people, more lepers, more 'sinners', who are all shown to be 'inside' the love of Christ. In Acts, Luke skilfully links sacred and profane history, as subsequent archaeology has shown. He tells of how the early Christians moved away from Jerusalem into the pagan world, and especially on to Rome.



God in the Sciences

Continuing the Celebration!

On 6th-13th October this year many people around the world will be celebrating the Jewish festival of Tabernacles, or Sukkot. They will celebrate the Harvest, and also remember God bringing the Israelites out of Egypt and through 40 years in the desert.

The biblical book of Deuteronomy contains a description of what Tabernacles should have been like back then. "Celebrate... for seven days. Be joyful... you, your sons and daughters, your male and female servants, and the Levites, the foreigners, the fatherless and the widows who live in your towns."

These festivals were not just a celebration, but also an expression of gratitude to God: "celebrate the festival to the Lord your God...For the Lord your God will bless you in all your harvest and in all the work of your hands, and your joy will be complete." Tabernacles was a proper holiday, with two whole days off normal work and seven days of feasting.

Farming looks very different today. Very few of us have had to sweat long hours over crops, so we're not as ready for (or deserving of) a rest and a party as our ancestors were at this time of year. That might be

even more the case in future, as the agri-tech revolution unfolds. For example, small autonomous tractors are already becoming available that do less damage to the soil and make better use of steep or oddly shaped fields.

Many arable farms already hire contractors to do the routine work with large specialist GPS-equipped machinery. In future years those people might find themselves using very different kinds of high-tech kit, acting more as land-management advisors, helping farmers to gather data and to find ways of improving soil quality, biodiversity and the water cycle.

I'm very grateful for the food that arrives on my shelves. Instead of worrying about whether or not we earned it, our modern-day Tabernacles or Harvest celebration could include ways of encouraging those involved in agriculture and developing new agricultural technologies, as well as enjoying how we can learn about and benefit from God's creation through Science.

So, after you celebrate Harvest at church, why not follow it up with a trip to a local farm this month? Why not learn from the ancient Israelites, and follow it up with a meal together? It stands to reason that those of us who live in countries where food is plentiful and cheap could do with being proportionately more generous in our gratitude and giving. Should we throw better parties? Probably!

The scary amount of money spent on Halloween

When did you first spot Halloween-themed items in the shops this year? Some were on sale in August. Seriously. August.

THE GOOD KINGS AND BAD KINGS OF ENGLAND

Dennis continues his research into our Kings and this month he looks at

Edward the Confessor the last Anglo-Saxon King


There is some disagreement about his traditional image of being unworldly and pious and the claim that he was an unsuccessful King who had difficulty in making decisions and who was easily swayed. He had no military capabilities. He spent a quarter of a century in exile. He was described as being the proper figure of a man, tall and distinguished by his snow white beard, pleasant, dignified and graciously affable to all. It was thought that his childlessness was the cause of his devotion to virginity and that a chaste life gave him his nickname.

He was born in about the year 1003 in Islip, Oxfordshire the only son of King Ethelred the 2nd and Emma the daughter of Richard the 2nd Duke of Normandy. When the Danes invaded England, the family fled to Normandy; a year later, Edward returned to England with the negotiators for the return of Ethelred to England. Ethelred died in 1016.

The Danes again invaded England and Edward went to live in Normandy and did not return until 1041 when he came to London, to the court of his half-brother King Hardecanute. Edward seized his mother's property because she had plotted against his succession to the throne.

He came to the throne in 1042. However for the first 11 years of his reign Godwin, Earl of Wessex, was the real master. Edward married Edith, Godwin's daughter, in 1045 but in 1049 a breach occurred between them and Edward outlawed the Godwins and dismissed Edith, thereby losing his popularity among the people. He brought in foreigners, some of whom were Normans, and gave then high positions. He made a successful policy with both Wales and Scotland. After warring between opposing factions in Scotland, Malcolm Canmore* (who later became King Malcolm III of Scotland, and who is believed to have slain King Macbeth in 1057) was exiled as a child to Edward's court in England.

Godwin and his sons gathered their forces against the King forcing him to recall his wife



from exile and to exile all the foreigners, some of whom were his favourites.

In 1053 Godwin died and his son Harold Godwinson became the most powerful figure in the Kingdom.

Edward died on 5th January, 1066. There was confusion as to whom he had named as his successor. This was to have a serious consequence for England: William, Duke of Normandy, claimed to be the rightful successor which led to the Battle of Hastings in 1066, and as they say, the rest is history....

Edward the Confessor was Canonised by the Pope in 1161. It had been claimed that a number of miracles had been attributed to him.

Translated, means Big Head.

[Why "the Confessor"?

In early Christian tradition a 'confessor' was someone who publicly 'confessed' (which meant professed) the Christian faith and lived a virtuous life but who was not martyred. In other words, a person whose virtuous life was itself a confession of faith. Edward is reputed to have been generous to the poor, devoted to prayer, and a patron of the church. He commissioned the construction of Westminster Abbey. He was said to have lived a chaste life although this may have been a way of attributing his childlessness to a cause other than his or his wife's infertility. Ed.]

WHERE ARE WE GOING?

People have continued to progress in ways of living since time began to the present day. I am interested in what is the driving force that brings these changes.

I feel a personal affinity with the philosopher G.W. Leibniz (1646-1716) who I believe never wrote a substantial treatise but through the works of other philosophers and poets set out philosophical ideas in short articles. Leibniz claimed that God must have had reasons to create our world in the way it is; a theory he developed into the "Principles of Sufficient Reason." He claimed that it would be incompatible with the genius of God not to bring the best possible of all worlds into existence.

How we progress in this world is, of course, mostly down to our styles of behaviour. To this end I would like to quote the final verse of Benjamin Zephaniahs poem, which is in the form of an update along the lines of Rudyard Kipling's famous poem "If".

If you can speak the truth to common people Or walk with Kings and Queens and live no lie.

If you can see how power can be evil And know that every censor is a spy. If you can fill an unforgiving lifetime With years of working hard to make ends meet.

You may not be wealthy, but I am sure you will find

That you can hold your head high, as you walk the streets.

To my mind these sentiments express the sort of worthwhile progress we may make in this life. The progressive nature of current scientific enquiry is probably the most impressive example of the way we are making physical progress in today's world. I think that the latest interesting development in helping us progress can be seen in the research behind the production of the Covid vaccine. Following on from the discovery of penicillin we are much better prepared today in progressing with treatments and cures for what historically would have been incurable.


As I said, we have no idea for certain how we will indeed progress in this life. It may then be wise then to follow the words of James (Ch4 verses 14-15), "Yet you do not even know what tomorrow will bring. What is your life? For you are in a mist that appears for a little while then vanishes. Instead you ought to say: if the Lord

wishes we will do this or that".

John Stuart Mill (1806-1873), believed passionately that everyone should have the freedom to both speak and think freely. He argued that without discussion involving progress and changes, we would end up with a life based on prejudicial views. Positive ways of thinking are the basis of an approach called Cognitive Bias Modification (CBM), where we train our brains to seek all the positives in our lives. Mill's message was complimentary to this thinking, known as The Harm Principle. Ideally our thinking and lives should be free to follow our beliefs as long as we harm no one by this process.

None of us can be sure of what is out there, or what is in store for us. I leave you with the following proverb, "Keep a sponge to wipe away the past, a rose to sweeten the present, and a kiss to welcome the future".

Was it really that long ago?...

65 years ago, on 12th October 1960 at a meeting of the UN General Assembly in New York, the Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev is reported to have removed his shoe and pounded his table, in protest at a speech by another delegate.

Also 65 years ago, on 30th October 1965 Diego Maradona was born. The Argentine football player, manager and coach is regarded as one of the greatest football players in history. (Died 2020.) Just a pity that he was a cheat: viz. the notorious "hand of God" goal against England in the 1986 World Cup competition.

60 years ago, on 8th October 1965 the Post Office Tower (now the BT Tower) in London was officially opened. It was the tallest building in the UK until 1980.

50 years ago, on 9th October 1975 the IRA detonated a bomb near the Ritz Hotel in Piccadilly. One person was killed and at least 20 injured.

40 years ago, on 1st October 1985 riots broke out in Toxteth in Liverpool and Peckham in London. Five days later (6th October) Metropolitan Police Constable Keith Blacklock was murdered in the Broadwater Farm housing estate riot in Tottenham. He was the first British constable to be killed in a riot since 1833.

25 years ago, on 26th October 2000 the BSE Inquiry Report was published in the UK. It concluded that the BSE (Mad Cow Disease) epidemic was caused by the use of infected meat and bone meal in cattle feed.

20 years ago, on 3rd October 2005 Ronnie Barker, TV comedian, actor and writer, died. Known for The Frost Report, The Two Ronnies, Porridge, Going Straight and Open All Hours.

Also 20 years ago, on 18th to 26th October 2005 Hurricane Wilma, the most intense Atlantic hurricane ever recorded, hit the Caribbean, Central America and the eastern USA. 63 people died. The storm caused £18.1 billion worth of damage.

15 years ago, on 13th October 2010 33 Chilean miners who had been trapped underground for 69 days following the collapse of the San Jose copper-gold mine were rescued. Around one billion TV viewers around the world watched them being pulled to the surface one-by-one, in a specially designed capsule.




